as may properly come before the

convention.

composed of 165 delegates, ap-

portioned one delegate at large for each

precinct and one for every fourteen

votes or fraction over half that num-

ber cast in the precinct for Blinger

Hermann for member of congress at

the general election in June, 1888, as

The primaries will be held at the

usual place in each precinct at two

o'clock p. m., Saturday, the 5th of

April, 1890, except in the precincts

of Salem, East Salem, and North

Salem.

In these three precincts the mat-

ter of appointing judges and clerks

and opening the polls at the pri-

maries and the time thereof is left

to the direction of the precinct com-

mittees.

In the other precincts open prima-

ries will be held unless otherwise

anyone that the thing that they are most afraid of is that the republicans will keep their promises to the people and that they do mean business in proposing to carry out their pledges.

WHAT IS NATIONAL REPUBLICANISM?

It is securing to every citizen of the nation a right to cast his ballot free as a bird, uncontrolled and uninfluenced by class, capital, caste or condition.

It is the development of every industry capable of being developed on American soil, and the workers paid American wages and on an American scale of family life.

It is the extension of American commerce to every land, and not playing second-fiddle to the effete monarchies of Europe in this respect.

It is the subjection of all public or quasi-public corporations to the control and regulation of the government, and not permitting them by watered stock or any other fiction to plunder the producers. Fair pay for fair service to the people, is a fundamental principle of national republicanism.

National republicanism requires that the government issue a national currency not based upon any interest-bearing debt, but secured and guaranteed by the wealth and resources of the nation, and kept on par with silver and gold by the ordinary processes and methods of sound business principles, and liberally adjusted in volume to meet the wants of the people.

National republicanism means the development of American shipping and water ways and not turning the whole commerce of the nation over to the railway corporations.

These are the doctrines that are enunciated since years in republican platforms and if the people will arise in their majority and sustain the republican party in control of the government, they can be carried out.

A LESSON FOR AMERICAN YOUTH.

A neatly dressed young man from Boston stepped into the JOURNAL office the other day and asked for work. We referred him to the want column of the paper and he ran his eye over the list. There was only one job and that was for a farm hand, about four miles in the country. He asked the way and started on foot through mud and mire to get it. He arrived just after the farmer had engaged his man, and had to return without securing employment. We admire his pluck and on inquiry learned that he had been employed in a clerical capacity in a mill near Boston; had served in a bank at Montreal and had been in an insurance office in New York. Losing his health he had come around the Horn in a cheap sailing vessel, restoring his lost color with a 165-day sea voyage, and landing on the coast with the world before him.

We believe that young man will succeed. He has the right kind of pluck. He is not afraid to tackle any kind of work. He does not ask a soft snap. He is not ashamed to go at hard labor on the farm. The average town youth wants nothing less than a clerkship or some speculative way to make a living—anything but labor. These young men who would succeed by avoiding work of a menial kind, as they are apt to term hard labor, should know that all the great men and all the great fortunes in the world began by patient devotion to toil of the humbler sort. If they do not know it, they are now expecting to achieve results without applying those time-honored principles.

A POPULAR MEASURE.

Congressman Mansur, of Missouri has been before the committee on Banking and Currency and made an argument for his bill to issue \$25,000,000 of fractional paper currency. To the shame of this nation, for many years the people have been without a small paper currency and have had to do up silver money, or stamps, or go to the expense of buying exchange when they preferred sending sums of \$2.00 or under through the mails. Of course it has been a bonanza for the banks, the express company, and even the postoffice department has made money at it. But why should the postal department be enriched if the people prefer to take their own risks and slip small amounts in letters and entrust them to the mail without registration? What if a great many of them are lost? The government is the gainer. The people want this fractional paper currency for convenience in sending small amounts. We do not know what Mr. Mansur's politics is but we know that he has a popular measure that should not longer be denied the people in the interest of the money changers. Every republican and every honest friend of the people should vote for it or be made responsible to his constituents. This is one of those small matters which will not cause anyone to agitate or petition for, but it is important all the same.

FROM WASHINGTON.

Mr. D. D. Prettyman writes the JOURNAL from Hazlet, Lincoln, Co., Wn., under date of March 17, 1890:

DEAR SIR: I thought I would give you a few weather items. Our first snow fell on the night of the 5th of December, and has been on since—and it is now about twenty inches deep. Stock are dying at a fearful rate. Two men named Cole and Rogart, who bought a band of 100 head in Lane county, near Eugene City, and brought them in here last fall—now have twenty-three head left, the rest have all died; another one brought out seventy odd head of horses—came in from his claim on snow shoes, a short time since, and said all he had left him stood on those two boards—(his snow shoes)—our local papers place the loss at 60 per cent.

On the first of January the mercury was down to 15° below zero, and again on the 16th got a little warmer about the last, and gave us another heavy snow, drifting badly. During last week it got colder again, and was down to 25 and 30° below zero. The 25th of February was the coldest of the season; it hovered around zero all the week. Look out for the tide flowing down to the Willamette valley. There are a great many going back East, saying it is as bad here as there. Just think of three months of snow, and no promise of a let up yet. We have had good sleighing all the time, where it was not drifted so deep we could not get a team through it; there are places where it is drifted ten feet. You can expect one Web-foot, sure.

There is a great lack of wood here and some have burned their out buildings and fence posts, for fuel. Parties who live along the R. R. burned the ties and cut the telegraph poles and burned them. I tell you, it is fearful, the way the people have suffered here by loss of stock and suffering with cold. The JOURNAL reaches me very irregularly, but always is a welcome visitor.
