FROM AUMVILLE.

To the Editor of the Capital Journal:
Being in Salem a few days ago I
passed by where the new cannery
is building, and seeing the work go-
ing on there, I am moved to say a
few words on the subject; as we
raise berries and fruits, and therefore
have a kindly interest in the can-
ning and drying industries. Upon
the supply of the raw "material,"
and the prices at which it can be fur-
nished, depends the success of the
canneries. The canner is the manu-
facturer, and the farmer is the
producer of "raw material." This
leads to the subject of corn, for
which I see from four to five dol-
lars a ton in the husk will be offered.
This is the price paid in the east-
ern corn regions, so I am informed.
Can Oregon farmers raise corn and
deliver it in Salem for that price?
I doubt it. Corn is certainly worth
five dollars a ton of ears in the husk
for feed at home; and I doubt if the
husks and cobs of a ton of sweet
corn, is not worth five dollars to
feed to cows and horses in and
around Salem. It is excellent feed
for milk cows, and horses on dry
feed. I have tried it. But can the
canneries here pay more than is paid
east? They must compete or else
form a canning "trust." An inter-
state tariff will hardly be obtainable.

The canneries and dryers must
get their supplies at prices that will
leave them a profit, and at the same
time must pay such prices as will
induce parties to plant for that
market. And the figure to the pro-
ducer must be such as will justify
him in hiring labor, which present
offers will hardly do.

Canning being in its infancy in
Oregon, the subject is an interest-
ing one, especially to us farmers
"mud-sills." That the canneries
already help us some, was demon-
strated last season on berries. Two
seasons ago when the usual glut in
the berry market came, there was
no outlet for our surplus blackberries
and we made a barrel of wine.
There was no pay in it, but we got
expenses out of it, and had an un-
usual number of friends while the
wine lasted; but last season we sent
our surplus to the Woodburn can-
nery, and realized a small profit.
Not enough however, to induce us
to plow up our little hop yard and
set it to blackberries. Yet if we
had a cannery near enough to haul
to, and save the freight charges, in
our excellent blackberry land we
would risk it to plant out more. So
also of other berries, and peaplant.
Hope the canneries will multiply.
There is material enough to run a
small one, that goes to waste every
year, within a radius of four miles
of Aumville. F. S. MATTHEWSON

RUSSIAN BRUTALITY.

The Methods Adopted for the Counter-
action of the Stories Abroad.

LONDON, March 19.—The recent
outrages committed by the Russian
officials in Siberia upon helpless
male and female prisoners have led
to inquiry on the part of various
correspondents and others into some
of the methods employed by the
Russian government to suppress
facts and create favorable impressions
with the result of ascertaining that
a vast number of persons of the
higher classes are engaged in the
work of representing the Russian
empire as a veritable paradise and
the czar as an angel of mercy. The
articles written by George Kennan
and published in the Century depict-
ing the horrors of the Russian prison
system, obtained a wide circulation
in Russia until the censors succeed-
ed in preventing copies of the mag-
azine containing the articles from
passing through the post offices, but
the seed had been sown and the
government found it necessary to
take steps to destroy the crop and
at the same time render the effect
of the articles in America as nearly
as possible nugatory. With this object
in view the government lately sent
to the United States 50 spies, or
agents, 35 women and 15 men,
charged with the duty of endeavor-
ing to modify the impression made
by the articles on the American peo-
ple, and also to secure the passage
of an extradition treaty looking to
the return to Russia of fugitive po-
litical offenders. These emissaries
are under assumed names, and are
known only to the secret police at
St. Petersburg. They are well sup-
plied with money and are instructed
to hold no open communication
with one another. The ostensible
object of their visit to
America is to lecture on Russian
subjects, which discourses will be
supplemented by the publication of
articles in the various newspapers
laudatory of the czar and his gov-
ernment. Ten of the 50 are directed
to go to Washington to ingratiate
themselves with the members of
both houses of congress and to ulti-
mately gain an entrance into the
best American society. Already
three of these emissaries have ar-
rived in America, two ladies of high
birth and one gentleman of equally
high social position, an officer in
the Russian army. One of the la-
dies is delivering lectures and giv-
ing readings on Russia in the
Western states and other is similarly
engaged in the Southern states,
while the gentleman is sojourning
in Washington cultivating desirable
acquaintances, writing occasional
newspaper articles pertinent to his
mission and taking a general sur-
vey of the field pending the ar-
rival of his colleagues.

The policy of the new French
ministry will be one of active work
and political reconciliation, and es-
pecial attention given to the ameli-
oration of the condition of the labor-
ing classes.
