REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION

A republican convention for Mar-
ion county, is called to meet in the
city of Salem, Wednesday, the ninth
day of April, 1890, at 11 o'clock a.
m., for the purpose of selecting
twelve (12) delegates to the state
republican convention to be held in
Portland, Oregon, April 16, 1890,
nominating a county ticket to be
voted for at the next general election
and transacting such other business
as may properly come before the
convention.

The county convention will be
composed of 165 delegates, ap-
portioned one delegate at large for each
precinct and one for every fourteen
votes or fraction over half that num-
ber cast in the precinct for Binger
Hermann for member of congress at
the general election in June, 1888, as
follows:

The primaries will be held at the
usual place in each precinct at two
o'clock p. m., Saturday, the 6th of
April, 1890, except in the precincts
of Salem, East Salem, and North
Salem.

In these three precincts the mat-
ter of appointing judges and clerks
and opening the polls at the pri-
maries and the time thereof is left
to the direction of the precinct com-
mittees.

In the other precincts open pri-
maries will be held unless otherwise
ordered by the precinct committee
or the primary convention.

WAR ON THE TRUSTS.

The intelligent and disinterested
people of this country, without re-
gard to political affiliations, are en-
gaged in making war on all kinds
of trusts. Oil trusts, sugar trusts,
insurance trusts—and trusts of every
description must go. They are
organized trade conspiracies to rob
the producer and the consumer, and
take profit upon fictitious capital in
addition to all other legitimate
charges and percentages and mar-
gins allowable in legitimate trade.
The standard oil trust and the lum-
ber trust are fair samples of the way
these piratical combinations stand
like a robber of the middle ages over
some great industry, and, while
they depress the price to the pro-
ducer of the raw material, they ad-
vance the price to the consumer.
They swing a two-edged sword that
cuts a slice both ways and cuts deep
into the pockets of every man who
has to buy the necessities of life.
Insurance and money-lending trusts
multiply the legal technicalities by
which they enmesh their unfortu-
nate victim with all the inventions
and devices of a horde of high-
priced lawyers. On the other
hand they make their contracts
read so that every avenue of escape
lies open to them to take advantage
of.

Mar. 10th, the sugar trust of New
York declared a dividend of two
and a half per cent on its fifty mil-
lions of certificates and had the
audacity to ask a court to confirm
the legality of this clear steal from
the people, that throttles competi-
tion and advances the price of a
prime necessity. Any court that
sanctions such a levy on the pockets
of the masses and gives it the pro-
tection of law should be summarily
dealt with. The day is coming
when these fictitious forms of financ-
ing will be swept away and robbery
in any form will be dealt with by
the people as it deserves.

AND STILL THEY COME.

Crumbs Cast Upon the Waters
Begin to Return.

THE IOWA PEOPLE LIKE OREGON.

The Journal Receives Numerous In-
quiries From the Hawkeye State.

To show the readers of the JOUR-
NAL the intense interest in Oregon
manifest in the East, we have sev-
eral times in the past published ex-
tracts from letters of inquiry re-
ceived at this office from prospective
emigrants. During this time the
JOURNAL has also sent two large
special editions to the E. st, largely
to Iowa, and now the letters are
coming too numerous to mention.
Many of them form very interesting
reading, and would be published in
these columns if space allowed.
However, we are tempted to give
these letters some recognition in the
JOURNAL to show its readers what
attention our city is attracting and
reveal the main points of inquiry
that are made by these people.

Gen. Hoskins writes from Ash-
ton, Iowa: "The weather here is
very cold—thermometer 20 degrees
below zero. One of my neighbors
tells me that in his well 30 feet deep,
water froze in the bottom two inches
thick. Still this has been a good
winter for Iowa, yet give me Oregon
every time. I get the JOURNAL
all right."

Edmund Stowe, of Polk county,
Minn., says: "Send me a copy of
your JOURNAL and you will confer
a favor on one who has lived in the
Red River valley for nine years, and
is tired of snow and blizzards, (one
is now raging). I think I will like
your country."

Henry O. Newell, of Plymouth
county, the finest farming region in
Iowa, sends for a paper, and adds:
"I am in the land of blizzards."

L. Y. Ehrlich, of Clayton coun-
ty, Iowa, writes: "I would like
some information about Oregon, and
would be pleased to hear from you.
Am a young man with family—a
miller by trade, and not much cap-
ital (probably about 1000), but plenty
of push and energy. Any maps,
pamphlets or statistics will be thank-
fully received, and, as some of my
acquaintances would like to know
about land, I would like any infor-
mation you could furnish about the
price of land, improved and unim-
proved; also if there is govern-
ment land still to be had." A
young man with the proper
amount of push is sure to get to the
front here, and of course his capital
will be a help. Oregon has still
much government land, although,
as in other states, the best of it is
taken up.

J. A. Aupperle, a capitalist of
Sioux county, Iowa, says: "If all
is well, you will be apt to see me
early in May to see what I think of
Salem. If I think as you do, I will
be apt to invest there."

Aside from the above the JOUR-
NAL last week also received fourteen
letters from Iowa, parties simply
asking for sample copies of our pa-
per, thus showing an interest in our
place. Nothing has so good an in-
fluence with a man looking for a
new location, as the reading of a
