## REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION.

A republican convention for Marion  
county, is called to meet in the  
city of Salem, Wednesday, the ninth  
day of April, 1890, at 11 o'clock a.  
m., for the purpose of selecting  
twelve (12) delegates to the state  
republican convention to be held in  
Portland, Oregon, April 16, 1890,  
nominating a county ticket to be  
voted for at the next general election  
and transacting such other business  
as may properly come before the  
convention.

The county convention will be  
composed of 165 delegates, ap-  
portioned one delegate at large for each  
precinct and one for every fourteen  
votes of fraction over half that num-  
ber cast in the precinct for Binger  
Hermann for member of congress at  
the general election in June, 1888, as  
follows:

usual place in each precinct at two  
o'clock p. m., Saturday, the 5th of  
April, 1890, except in the precincts  
of Salem, East Salem, and North  
Salem.

In these three precincts the mat-  
ter of appointing judges and clerks  
and opening the polls at the pri-  
maries and the time thereof is left  
to the direction of the precinct com-  
mittees.

In the other precincts open pri-  
maries will be held unless otherwise  
ordered by the precinct committee  
or the primary convention.

## WORK FOR ANTI-MONOPOLISTS.

Why do not the granges take up  
the coal oil monopoly, and the pro-  
posed postal telegraph?—Athena  
Press. About four years ago the  
grange discussed the oil monopoly  
and its national organization took  
hold of it actively and pushed the  
Standard Oil Co. to the wall in sev-  
eral instances. But the subject needs  
a new ventilation to resist the con-  
stant encroachments of monopolistic  
power. Every farmer should aid  
the Postal Telegraph.

THE JOURNAL has not since heard  
from the bogus granger who last  
week in the Statesman tried to re-  
present that we had attempted to  
ridicule the work of the grange.  
He could not back up his insinua-  
tion with any proof, but we offered  
him the use of our columns. He  
must have been one of the kind  
who work the anti-monopoly re-

forms for the political influence and  
revenue there is in it, and at heart  
is opposed to anti-monopoly mea-  
sures. His attempt to show the JOUR-  
NAL out of sympathy with the  
grange was a flat failure, and this  
paper does not have to defend itself  
on that score. Its publishers fought  
the battles of the anti-monopolists  
in Iowa and expect to fight them in  
this state, without asking permis-  
sion from anyone to do so, when-  
ever those measures are in the real  
interests of the people. We do not  
believe in bogus grangerism and  
demagogical anti-monopoly politics  
for revenue only, as some play at  
that game. We want the genuine  
article all the year around, all wool  
and a yard wide.

A lot of other matters aside, every true  
anti-monopolist should throw the  
whole weight of his influence in  
favor of a continued warfare on the  
Standard Oil monopoly, and in  
favor of the Postal Telegraph. The  
officers of the existing telegraph  
monopoly have been before congress  
and virtually told the government  
that the people have no right to  
have the Postal Telegraph tried un-  
less they are prepared to plank  
down \$20,000,000 for watered stocks  
of a plant that has cost at a high  
figure less than \$20,000,000. 75 cts  
of every dollar that is collected to-  
day for telegraph charges is to pay  
earnings and dividends on watered  
stock that did not cost these tax-  
payers a cent. A still larger and  
more offensive form of plunder is  
that taken in by the oil monopoly.  
The merchant and farmer cannot  
thus hypothecate their properties  
and take toll from the pockets of  
the people. This fight will not be  
ended until every dollar of watered  
stock is eliminated from every avenue  
of the public service and from  
the furnishing of the necessities of  
life. Here is the line upon which  
the JOURNAL invites the  
people and every true friend of the  
masses to fight. It should not take  
any newspaper two minutes to say  
on which side of the struggle it shall  
be found.

## THE REPUBLICAN OUTLOOK.

The republicans of Oregon are en-  
tering upon the campaign of 1890 in  
a very hopeful frame of mind. The  
first state in the Union to hold a  
general election for state officers and  
members of congress and the senate,  
its verdict is always looked for with  
great interest by the people of all  
the other states. If the republican  
congress makes no fatal blunders,  
but goes right on doing its duty, we  
do not believe there is any power  
under the sun to keep Oregon from  
going strongly republican in 1890.

The following is the vote of this  
state at the last two presidential elec-  
tions:

It will be seen that Oregon re-  
publicans rolled up a majority of  
nearly four to one for Harrison over  
Blaine. This was in part due to  
the republican gains from immigra-  
tion, but more especially was it due  
to the free-trade attitude into which  
the southern leaders had forced the  
democratic party under the Cleve-  
land administration. By their su-  
perior organization the republicans  
were in a position to force the fight  
on the tariff issue and in many  
democratic wool counties in East-  
ern Oregon democrats wore wool  
taglocks in their buttonholes and re-  
turns showed big republican gains.  
While the tariff was the issue of  
success, the republican state central  
committee deserves great credit for  
the remarkable victory of 1888. As  
usual the democratic party was the  
biggest contributor to republican  
success.

Any careful observer who has  
noted the character of the immigra-  
tion of Oregon in the past two years  
must conclude, in view of the above

facts, that Oregon will give a safe  
republican majority on June 2, 1890.  
But it will not do to trust to the  
apparently favorable condition of  
things political. As Mr. Baris is  
known to be opposed to serving  
again, great care will have to be  
exercised in the selection of a chair-  
man of the new state central com-  
mittee. The selection of good, tried  
men for the county chairmanships is  
also important. Men of executive  
ability and great mastery of details  
are required. No doubt such can  
be found to prepare the deserved  
Waterloo for the democracy.  
But working republicans in all  
parts of the state need not wait for  
the ticket to be put up, nor for in-  
structions from the central com-  
mittee. The small bits of work in  
every nook and corner of the state  
count for more than the brass band  
and the torch-light demonstrations.  
The battle for supremacy in the state  
will be hotly contested and every  
one must bear his part. Clubs for  
reliable republican papers are as  
effective as any work that can be  
done, and if you get only one or two  
new names do not hesitate to send  
them in, and contribute your mite  
to electing a straight clear ticket  
throughout.

## THE SALEM BRIDGE.

THE JOURNAL has several more  
communications on the bridge. Its  
columns are open to any citizen who  
has an intelligent statement to offer  
on the subject. This paper repre-  
sents no interest but that of the peo-  
ple, who want a good bridge, will  
put up, and that the expenses con-  
nected therewith, be equitably pro-  
vided for.

On next Monday, March 31st the  
city council has ordered a special  
election to fill the vacancy caused by  
the resignation of City Treasurer E.  
J. Safford, and to decide whether the  
city of Salem shall issue another  
\$20,000 bonds for bridge purposes.  
An enabling act passed some years  
ago authorized the city to issue \$500,-  
000 bonded indebtedness beyond the  
limit fixed in its charter for ordi-  
nary indebtedness. \$30,000 of this  
debt was incurred, as we understand  
the situation, to build the bridge  
that was carried away by the flood  
a few months since. Having issued  
bonds and taken advantage of that  
enabling act to build one bridge,  
there is a legal point involved in  
the proposition to issue the remain-  
ing \$20,000 for another bridge at a  
different time. As is well known,  
enabling acts are strictly construed  
by the courts, tho' we have e-ni-  
dence that the city authorities  
have not omitted to have this point  
looked into, before proceeding to  
take chances.

It seems to the JOURNAL that this  
matter of building a bridge, that is  
to be done at the expense of all the  
taxpayers and that is to stand for  
future generations, should be en-  
tered into deliberately. We are not  
advised as to the inside plans of any  
of the parties who are engineering  
the new bridge. We represent no  
faction or financial circle who ex-  
pect to make money out of it in any  
way. We simply represent in a  
bumble way, the rights of the peo-  
ple to have no unnecessary taxation  
and to have the taxes that are ex-  
pended wisely and well expended.  
No bank or syndicate has any con-  
trol over the expressions of this pa-  
per or ever will have while we con-  
trol it. We cannot advise people  
how to vote on the matter next  
Monday.

It must be plain to any unpre-  
judiced mind that the Oregonian is  
not working for republican har-  
mony. It is making the most out  
of the Simon-Lotan controversy re-  
gardless of the welfare of the repub-  
lican party.

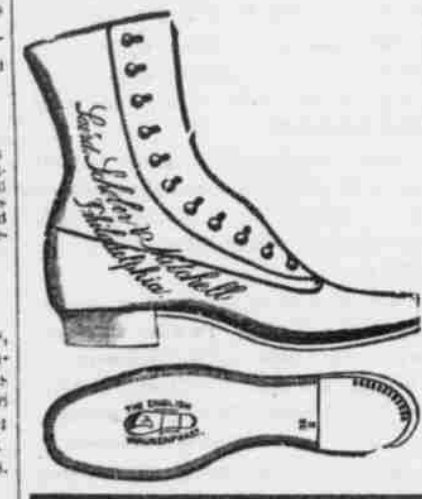
