REPUBLICAN COUNTY CONVENTION

A republican convention for Ma-
rion county, is called to meet in the
city of Salem, Wednesday, the ninth
day of April, 1890, at 11 o'clock a.
m., for the purpose of selecting
twelve (12) delegates to the state
republican convention to be held in
Portland, Oregon, April 16, 1890,
nominating county ticket, to be
voted for at the next general election
and transacting such other business
as may properly come before the convention.

The county convention will be
composed of 165 delegates, apportioned
one delegate at large for each
precinct and one for every fourteen
votes or fraction over half that number
cast in the precinct for Binger
Hermann for member of congress at
the general election in June, 1888, as
follows:

The primaries will be held at the
usual place in each precinct at two
o'clock p. m., Saturday, the 5th of
April, 1890, except in the precincts
of Salem, East Salem, and North
Salem.

In these three precincts the mat-
ter of appointing judges and clerks
and opening the polls at the pri-
maries and the time thereof is left
to the direction of the precinct com-
mittees.

In the other precincts open pri-
maries will be held unless otherwise
ordered by the precinct committee
or the primary convention.

FAIR POLITICS.

There is one principle that we
would impress on republicans, a gov-
erning principle at the coming pri-
maries. That is fair politics. The
republican party is the champion of
fair elections and a full and free
ballot for every man in the nation,
rich or poor, black or white, and
have that ballot honestly counted.
The republican party is the only
champion we know of, in the
national sense. Its platforms and
its leading men in congress are sound
on this question. The republican
party is founded on the principle of
equal political rights to all citizens,
and it wants the poorest and the
humblest black man of the South
to be as free as a bird to vote any
ticket he chooses, and it believes
under the constitution he should be
protected in so doing, if it takes a
regiment of soldiers at every pol-
ling place in the South to secure
him that right. No other party
champions this grand principle of
political freedom under the con-
stitution.

Now this principle applies just as
well to the primary elections in Ore-
gon as it does in Mississippi. Let
the primaries be conducted as fair
and the record be as free and as
sacred as the voting for president.
For delegates and representatives to
the different conventions let fair
men, who are representatives of the
masses of the people, be selected
without interference or dictation
from any source. Select intelligent
men who stand well with their
neighbors and who are not objec-
tionable to any large element of the
party for which they are to act.
The ticket put up by such men, if
they act disinterestedly, will be
successful and strong with the peo-
ple. In the problem of self-govern-
ment by the people, the republican
party has the burdens of the whole
nation upon its shoulders at present,
and it behooves every true republi-
can to lay aside his personal pre-
dications and work for the good of
the cause, and labor only to secure a
clean, strong and winning ticket.

POLITICAL DISCUSSION.

We print this week the reply of a
democrat to Mr. Geer's article of
last week. We have to shorten
these communications up some,
when it can be done without alter-
ing the sense. We allow ourselves to
write only short editorials, as a rule,
and we do not like to print more
than one or two over a column in
one week. We must say to our
good democratic friend that our one
other rule is based on the fact that
we are running a republican paper,
and therefore cannot give up our
space for campaign arguments to
make political propaganda for any
other opposing political party. But
any fair argument on any subject
will not be excluded when we have
room, especially when it aspires as
Mr. Geer and Mr. Taylor make
them. Only we must have control
of our space, as the JOURNAL is got-
ten up for all kinds of readers, and a
large number regard space taken for
political controversy as wasted any-
how. When the JOURNAL gets to be
as big as it may be some day we
can change these rules perhaps. We
want to impress all our honored
correspondents, and we are glad to
say we have some of the fairest men
in all parties contributing to the
JOURNAL, that brevity is essential
nowadays in all ordinary discus-
sions. So come right to the point
and clinch it with facts.

A Democrat After T. T. Geer's Scap.

To the Editor of the Capital Journal:

SUBMITTY, Mar. 28, 1890.—Having
noticed in the columns of your
excellent paper an attempt at fore-
casting the democratic platform, I
will, by your permission, attempt a
reply, as a part of Mr. Geer's in-
sultations were intended for me.
We thank the Hon. gentleman for
his complimentary remarks, so far
as they apply to ourselves, but deny
that we have been doing the heavy
writing for the governor's organ at
Salem, or that we have been making
the greatest efforts of our life in
behalf of the farmer and the laborer,
whom the great creator of this
universe made honorable when he
placed Adam and Eve in the
Garden of Eden and commanded
them to earn their living by the
sweat of their brow, which but
few of our politicians are doing.
The latest joke, he says, by this
happy combination was discovered
by the end-man who lives over by
Sublimity, to-wit:—that should
foreign ships come to the U. S.,
loaded with cheap goods instead of
sand and gravel as ballast, and not
rock, as the gentleman says, because
Portland authorities will not re-
ceive any more rock in this way
from foreign countries, having re-
ceived more already from the same
source than they can get away with.
There would be the advantage of re-
ducing the duty on all foreign goods
that might come to this country to
the lowest possible figure in the in-
terest of the people. Freight on our
surplus foreign products would be
reduced one-half, thus raising the
price of American products con-
siderably. The grain merchant
would be enabled to give a dollar a
bushel for the farmer's wheat, be-
cause of greatly reduced freight
charges and the reasonably cheap
goods which the grain merchant
would take in exchange for his
wheat; besides he would get an ad-
vance on the wheat he paid a dollar
a bushel cash for to the farmer, by
exchanging his wheat for cheap
foreign goods; sell those goods back
to the farmer for a small profit in
cash with which he would buy more
wheat.

Not one of our factories would
close down, as the Honorable gen-
tleman predicts, if free trade prin-
ciples were applied to them. Should
the endman's joke be realized by the
farmer under free trade it would be
a huge joke indeed. The English
farmer gets over a dollar a bushel
for his wheat, while in protected
America the farmer gets only 60
cents. Yet India wheat comes in
direct competition with English
wheat. Is further comment necessary,
Brother Geer?

We are satisfied from a thorough
investigation of this subject that
free trade would not injure our
home market, while its adoption by
the government would greatly en-
hance the profits of the farmer and
laborer. We are obliged to Mr.
Geer for recommending us as a
candidate for the legislature, but
would say that we have no political
aspirations and demand no prefer-
ment for our humble efforts in be-
half of the farmer and laborer, as
against the capitalists, who are
abundantly able to take care of
themselves.

The great state of Ohio in the recent
election, and a large portion of the
American people as well, are hon-
estly in favor of it, as well as free
commercial relations with the na-
tions of the earth. Sec. 4. Needs
no reply. Sec. 5. We repudiate
for the reason that it is discourteous
to call the other fellow a liar, espe-
cially when he is larger and smells
stronger of the tar. Sec. 6. Is not
partisan and needs no answer. Sec.
7. We endorse.

We fully endorse if the gentleman
means that we should modify our
tariff laws so as to enable us to com-
pete by the aid of our boundless re-
sources for a large share of the com-
merce of all nations, and that with-
out a doubt successful too, section 9
being only put in to fill up space,
needs no comment. Sec. 10. If the
gentleman means the cheapest
goods that can be bought, those
that can be bought at the lowest
price, leaving a reasonable price to
the producer, we will endorse with-
out comment. Sec. 11, is evidently
intended as a silly burlesque. Sec.
12, we heartily endorse. Sec. 13,
which indorses our governor for his
many meritorious acts, we heartily
applaud. Sec. 14, which says the
American people are in great need
of more money, we approve that
far and no farther. Sec. 15, says
in all governments where the rights
of the people are jealously guarded,
the rich never become richer. This
is intended as a burlesque on the
democratic party and falls wide of
the mark. We would have it read
thus: "In all governments where the
rights of the people are jealously
guarded, each and every citizen has
an equal chance before the law." Or
in other words, the few are not made
rich at the expense of the many, and
those there at that. In Sec. 15 the
Thom. T. T. defends the capitalist
against the poor laboring man. Sec.
16 says: Since with a single ex-
ception the dogmas of the Union
labor party constitute the creed of
ours, we welcome it to the political
arena as a faithful means of helping
us to the offices. We are fully
aware what objects this so-called
Union labor party has in view,
whether intentionally or not, to
wit:—to keep the warring republi-
cans firm in the republican ranks,
or get them to throw away their
votes on the Union labor candidates;
thus indirectly and substantially
aiding the republican candidates
to the fat offices for which the
latter have such a fondness, and the
Hon. gentleman not excepted. The
republicans propose through the
agencies of the Union party to
divide the democratic party, and
get unsuspecting democrats to throw
away their votes on the Union la-
bor candidates instead of voting for
the republican candidates. The G. O.
P. is driven to this course because it
knows that political defeat awaits it
in June certain and inevitable un-
less it can divide the votes of the
democrats by the aid of the Union
party. Now for the proof of the al-
legation: First, so far as we know
most of the leaders in this new
party just organized are leading re-
publicans, which looks very suspi-
cious. Second, they advocate dem-
ocratic principles with a vehemence
that knows no bounds, abusing the
republicans directly and indirectly
in the bitterest of language, a la
Bork at Stayton, and Robinson at
Aunsville.
