DIED.

ODELL.—At Portland, Or., March 31, 1890, after a protracted illness Mrs. Elisabeth F. T. Odell.

Deceased was the wife of a prominent citizen of Salem and Oregon, and herself a talented and distinguished woman, whose death will be regretted by a circle of friends and acquaintances extending all over the state.

For many years she made her home in Salem, and at the time of her marriage to General Odell, she was the widow of the late Congressman Thurston. No woman ever lived in this city who had a larger circle of friends to whom she was endeared, both by the ties of church and society, in both of which she was a leader and strong fellow worker.

For a half century she was an active working force in the M. E. church, where she was recognized in many ways for her marked abilities, and for her many Christian virtues. As a woman and a citizen, her sympathies were all of a broad character. She was an abolitionist and afterwards a strong national republican, taking liberal views on all subjects. She was a woman of culture, and devoid of that masculinity sometimes prominent in the strong-minded of her sex.

Mrs. Odell was a very able writer, and for several years was a contributor to the church Journal published by the ladies of Salem. In 1884 she wrote and published "A Semi-Centennial Offering," a historical sketch of the Salem church and Willamette University. Beautiful in her life, she was beautiful in word, thought and action, and her works and influences speak in her praise.

Of her long illness, suffering and final relief her friends are advised. The remains will be brought to Salem Wednesday. The funeral at her old home church, which she helped to found, will be conducted by Rev. Wm. Rollins, he preaching the sermon, assisted by Rev. Wire, who will give a biographical sketch and Rev. Newell will follow with a tribute. Prof. Parvin will conduct the service of song. The remains as before announced will be laid at rest in the Lee Mission cemetery at 10 a. m.

KINNEY.—At the home of her daughter, Mrs. Dr. Patton, at Drayton, on the night of Sunday, March 30, 1890, Mrs. Eliza Kinney, aged 77 years.

Mrs. Kinney was a life long member of the Baptist church and a large contributor to its support. She was an excellent lady in every respect, benevolent, charitable and a living epitome of christian virtues. The family of which she was a prominent member is one of the oldest and most highly respected in Oregon.

Her husband was Mr. R. C. Kinney, dead since many years but remembered as the proprietor of the East Salem mills. Deceased was the mother of a large family, of whom Mrs. Alfred and Augustus Kinney, Marshall, and William Kinney are still living. Among her daughters living are Mrs. Patton, Mrs. Jane Smith of Harrisburg, and Mrs. Walker of San Francisco. The funeral of this old resident takes place at the Baptist church, to-morrow, Wednesday, at 1 p. m., Rev. Robert Whitaker officiating. The remains will be taken to the I. O. O. F. cemetery.

Those who desire to escort the remains from the depot to the Baptist church, will please be at the morning overland train.

Miss Lulu Thompson, only daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. C. Thompson, April 1, 1890, of diphtheria. Born May 9, 1871.

Deceased was taken sick last Tuesday night and has had the most unrelenting care and attention, but passed away at 11 a. m. to-day. The time for funeral has not been set and arrangements will be announced to-morrow. The saddest day of their lives has fallen upon the members of this family and the awful reality of their loss cannot be fully comprehended. There was not a more talented young woman in Salem, she having graduated at the university conservatory with honors last year. She was modest, retiring and diffident by nature, and yet formed strong attachments among her young companions. Her devotion to home and mother were her second nature and her life was filled with sweetness and childlike innocence.
