Time for the Capital City to Make a Move to Secure a Road Across the Valley.

It is high time to take hold of the project of building a railroad from Salem to the sea. If Salem would maintain her proud record as the second city in Oregon...

A local company should be organized and incorporated at once to put surveys in the field on a line from Mehama to Salem, McMinnville and the sea. Active steps should be taken to secure right of way and local support which is tendered all along the line.
