COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Marion County Republicans Meet and Effect an Organization.

The scene at the corner of State and Commercial streets during yesterday evening and this morning was lively and exciting.

An intelligent and earnest body of Marion county citizens gathered at Reed's opera house at 11 o'clock, and was called to order by Geo. H. Burnett, chairman of the county central committee.

The result of the ballot was, for Burnett 87 votes, Armstrong 69 votes and scattering 6 votes.

Mr. Burnett thanked the convention in a short address.

On motion R. D. Allen, of Silverton, was chosen temporary secretary and D. W. Hall, of Woodburn, assistant.

J. M. Poorman made a motion to appoint a committee of five on order of business, but withdrew it, and a motion of Wm. Armstrong to appoint a committee of five on credentials was adopted.

Now upon Mr. Poorman's motion a committee of five on order of business was named by the chair as follows: J. M. Poorman, of Woodburn; C. B. Moore, of East Salem; J. E. Hammond, of Silverton; N. H. Looney, of Jefferson; F. U. Hull, of Mehama.

Upon motion of D. W. Matthews a committee of five on permanent organization named as follows: D. W. Matthews, of East Salem; J. L. Calvert, of Hubbard; S. S. Kerr, of St. Paul; Wm. King, of Sublimity; Dexter Robbins, of Marion.

Upon Squire Poujade's motion a committee of five on apportionment of delegates to state convention was named as follows: L. H. Poujade, of Gervais; A. L. Hodson, of Turner; Geo. E. Good, of Salem; D. W. Smith, of Howell Prairie; J. H. Porter, of Stayton.

The committee on credentials presented its report of delegates entitled to seats in the convention as follows, which report was adopted:

The proper committee reported in favor making the temporary organization permanent, and that an additional assistant secretary be appointed, which report was adopted and on motion appointed to such position R. B. Herrick.

Committee on appointment of delegates to the state convention reported as follows, there being one delegate to the state convention for every 25 votes in this convention.

Delegates: Salem 16, East Salem 22, Horeb 3, Hubbard 5, 2, North Salem 9, Labish 5, Turner 6, Marion 3, Jefferson 2, 1, Aurora 6, Abiqua 6, Garfield 3, 1, Gervais 7, Butteville 6, Champoeg 2, Silverton 13, Fairfield 2, 1, Mehama 5, Sublimity 5, Stayton 5, 1, Woodburn 6, Howell 7, St. Paul 2, 1.

One delegate to be chosen at large, making 12 delegates in all. The report was adopted.

The committee on order of business reported in favor of nominating candidates for the several offices in the following order:

First 2 senators, Second 5 representatives, Third county judge, Fourth county commissioners, Fifth county sheriff, Sixth county clerk, Seventh county recorder, Eighth county treasurer, Ninth county assessor, Tenth county superintendent, Eleventh county surveyor, Twelfth county coroner, Thirteenth county central Com., Fourteenth county delegates to state convention.

The chairman was empowered to appoint four tellers, and appointed those who served in the morning.

Nominations for senators being then in order J. W. Pate, of Jefferson, placed in nomination the name of J. B. Looney, of Jefferson, and C. B. Moore, of East Salem, nominated Edward Hirsch, of Salem. Senator J. B. Derrick was placed in nomination by Mr. White, but his name was withdrawn by J. L. Calvert of Hubbard.

These being but two names before the convention, H. S. Jordan, of Salem, moved that Mr. Looney and Mr. Hirsch be chosen by acclamation. The motion was carried with a ringing hurrah.

Nominations for representatives were made at follows: by L. H. Poujade, of Gervais, McKinley Mitchell, of that precinct; by J. M. Poorman, of Woodburn, J. H. Settlemeier, 104; Jos. A. Baker, 109; Henry Rogers, 82; W. E. Her, 91; Wm. Armstrong, 102; T. T. Geer, 91; John Minto, 99, and several scattering.
