## COUNTY CONVENTION.

The Republican Round-up Terminates Successfully.

A STRONG TICKET NOMINATED.

Full List of the Nominations for County Officers and New County Committee.

THE EVENING JOURNAL yesterday contained a complete report of the republican county convention including the first ballot for representative, and our report had the results of the day's work as far as announcing the nomination for county judge. Following is the conclusion of the work of the convention:

## SECOND BALLOT.

Motions and counter motions were made and finally it was resolved there should be a free fight for the fifth delegate, without being tied down to those having highest votes on first ballot.

The result of this ballot was as follows:  
Geer, 89; Iler, 37; Mitchell, 34; scattering a few, and Hon. T. T. Geer was declared duly nominated as the fifth candidate for representative.

## COUNTY JUDGE.

Nominations being now in order for county judge, Hon. Alex. LaFollett, of Labish, said that inasmuch as Salem had nominated about four out of seven of the legislative ticket and was expected to capture nearly all the other officers, he thought the country ought to have the county judge, so he would name Hon. W. C. Hubbard, A. W. Drager named Hon. J. C. Peebles; Frank Hull, of Meham, named Hon. Geo. P. Terrell, for the reason expressed by Mr. LaFollett; Chas. Claggett of Salem named Hon. Wm. Waldo, and J. W. Pate, of Jefferson, named the present judge, Hon. T. C. Shaw.

The result of the first ballot was:  
Hubbard, 29; Peebles, 23; Terrell, 24; Waldo, 68; Shaw, 24—no choice.

Second ballot—Hubbard, 25; Peebles, 18; Terrell, 22; Waldo, 86; Shaw, 14. Mr. Waldo having received a majority of all the votes was declared the nominee of the convention for county judge.

## COUNTY COMMISSIONER.

For the office of county commissioner the following nominations were made: Isaac Needham, of South Salem, by D. W. Matthews; D. R. Hibbard, by R. D. Allen, of Silverton; J. M. Watson, by a Turner gentleman; Lemuel Hobson, of Stayton, by G. W. Carnell; J. W. McKinney, of Turner, by Henry Keene; by Dr. J. T. Mason, J. E. McCoy, of North Salem.

The first ballot resulted: Needham, 55; Hibbard, 29; Watson, 37; Hobson, 35; McKinney, 20; McCoy, 9—no choice.

Second ballot—Needham, 33; Hibbard, 25; Watson, 57; Hobson, 39; McKinney, 3; McCoy, 7—no choice.

Third ballot—Needham, 5; Hibbard, 17; Watson, 127; Hobson, 14; J. E. McCoy, 1.

J. M. Watson having received a majority of the votes was declared elected.

Next came the nomination for sheriff, when somebody arose and quietly named E. M. Croisan, the present efficient incumbent, and there was such cheerful feelings exhibited as foreshadowed the result. Somebody moved to make the nomination unanimously by acclamation and the motion went through with such a unanimous yell as was a terrible warning to any democratic aspirants who might be present.

The same happy result was had in the nomination of county clerk, when Capt. F. J. Babcock was nominated in the wildest enthusiasm, by acclamation.

Upon the question of county recorder there was not such unanimity, the call for nominations bringing out the following candidates: S. A. Jones, of Labish, by Alex. LaFollett; J. B. Starr, of East Salem, by C. B. Moores; A. L. Downing, of Sublimity, by W. J. Humphreys; J. B. Leatherman, of Woodburn, by W. W. Hall; J. H. McNary, of Salem, by Capt. L. S. Scott.

The result of the first ballot was: Jones, 37; Starr, 34; A. L. Downing, 27; J. B. Leatherman, 11; J. H. McNary, 54; scattering, 1—no choice.

Upon the call of a new ballot, the name of Prof. Leatherman was withdrawn.

Second ballot—Jones, 43; Starr, 22; Downing, 13; McNary, 84. J. H. McNary having received a majority was declared the nominee of the convention for county recorder.

The next being county treasurer, the present incumbent, A. O. Condit, met the same generous treatment as the sheriff and clerk and was made the unanimous nominee by acclamation.

The assessorship seemed to be a rival of the recordership as a bone of contention, C. Cleaver, of Abiqua,

Bushley, of Meham, said they had lost their county judge and had withdrawn by mistake their candidate for legislature, and they would like to get something in that end of the county—assessor, coroner, or most anything,—and with this well received sally of fun he named P. N. Lathrop, their recent legislative candidate; Willis Dunnigan, of Garfield, named J. E. Moore; J. L. Wood, of Silver Creek, named W. F. Simmeral; David Simpson, of East Salem, named A. H. Cornelius, of Marion, present county commissioner; G. H. Hunt, of Stayton, named C. R. Briggs; and a Turner gentleman named A. L. Hodson.

The first ballot resulted: Cleaver, 46; Lathrop, 28; Moore, 27; Simmeral, 28; Cornelius, 13; Briggs, 12; Hodson, 9—no choice.

Second ballot—Cleaver, 74; Lathrop, 19; Moore, 23; Simmeral, 22; Cornelius, 7; Briggs, 5; Hodson, 6—no choice.

The names of Messrs. Moore, Cornelius, Briggs and Hodson were now withdrawn and the third ballot resulted:

Cleaver, 122; Lathrop, 15; Simmeral, 23, and C. Cleaver having received a majority of all the votes was declared the nominee of the convention for assessor.

When the county superintendent of schools was reached, J. C. C. Lewis, of Champoug, moved the nomination of Prof. D. W. Yoder, the present incumbent, by acclamation, which was carried with the usual hurrah.

W. J. Culver, the present county surveyor, was treated in like manner and made the unanimous nominee by acclamation.

For coroner, two candidates were nominated, G. C. Brown, by A. L. Hodson, of Turner, and Dr. J. S. Stott, of Gervais, by Squire Poujade. The first ballot resulted, Dr. Stott 137, and Brown 17, upon which Dr. Stott was declared the nominee for coroner.

A motion to adjourn until half past seven o'clock in the evening was voted down with determined force.

Giesy, Aurora, Abiqua and Garfield; W. S. Taylor, Gervais, Eutleville and Champoug; Wright Foshay, Silver Creek and Fairfield; W. H. Hobson, Meham, Sublimity and Stayton; John Newsome, Howell Prairie, Woodburn and St. Paul.

For delegates at large, J. E. Hammond, of Silverton; J. G. Wright and Thumson Ford, of Salem, were nominated; also C. B. Moores, but he declined. The first vote stood: Hammond, 85; Wright, 30; Ford, 38. J. E. Hammond was declared elected.

Previous to a motion for adjournment, which was carried, some enthusiastic delegate proposed three cheers for the whole ticket, which were given with such a will as made the big building shake, and the chairman in adjourning, gave the further assuring announcement that the ticket would be elected from top to bottom.

CONVENTION NOTES.

Those who have watched the conduct and progress of political con-

ventions were surprised yesterday at the expedition with which the great amount of business was transacted, and Chairman Burnett justly received the credit for it, his clearness of voice, quickness of eye, firmness of character and knowledge of parliamentary usage causing the work to proceed without friction or delay. He is certainly a model presiding officer. The secretary, R. D. Allen, and his assistants also did excellent work, while the tellers, who had a most tedious task, could not have been better chosen. It would be difficult to find two as clear, accurate callers as Jasper Pinto and Harvey Jordan proved to be. The whole gathering was finely conducted.

## COUNTY CHAIRMAN.

After the close of the convention a meeting of the members of the county central committee was held in the hall, and they organized by electing John Knight, of Salem, chairman for the ensuing two years. John has been a willing puller in the harness since he knew enough to take a hold, and he will make a careful and successful leader.
