MOVING THE UNIVERSITY.—A

reporter of the JOURNAL interviewed President VanSoy, of Willamette university this morning in relation to the reported probable removal of that institution to a site more distant from the business center. He says there has been some talk in that direction, but that nothing definite has been determined. He thinks the matter will doubtless come up during commencement week, which will open on the 8th of June, but it is somewhat doubtful whether anything will be done. It is fully realized that the property occupied at present would sell at large figures for residence purposes, and that the university could thus raise a good sum of money for the better equipment and maintenance of the institution. But there is another serious view taken by people interested. The question is asked, if the authorities commence putting the university on wheels, is there not some danger of its being taken away from Salem altogether? It is known that Portland is putting hard for it, and if it is going to be "let to the highest bidder," the Portland efforts will be redoubled. Already there is an offer of \$50,000 to establish it there, and once start moving and their offer will be increased. Care should be exercised in this matter by the Salem parties who are in authority, that the interests of the city do not suffer through a desire for temporary financial assistance.

The ailing brother is afflicted with dropsy. He is believed to be the first person made an Odd Fellow in Oregon, the record showing him to be the first one initiated in Chemeketa lodge, about 1852. They found Mr. Zieher sitting up and feeling pretty good. The call of his lodge brothers did him a great deal of good and was thoroughly appreciated. Men who will thus leave their business and take a twelve-mile drive to see a sick man have a modicum of humanity and goodness of heart, to say the least. They did not intend this should get into print, but a good deed deserves recognition, even tho' it be done by men who have no disposition to advertise their good works, and are thorough believers in the motto, if you give with your right hand let not your left hand know what you are doing.

THE COLT EXHIBIT.

Final Rules Adopted Under Which Premiums Will Be Awarded in the Several Classes.

At a recent special meeting of the Willamette Valley Horse Breeders' association held in this city, the rules were revised under which colts are to be exhibited here on the 17th of May. The association decided to offer premiums for the best colts of the several breeds and classes and the schedule of premiums was arranged. The colts will be exhibited and awarded premiums under seven classes as follows:

Thoroughbred—\$10, first premium; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Standardbred—\$10, first; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Percheron—\$10, first; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Clyde—\$10, first; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Shire—\$10, first; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Graded roadsters—Free season to mare, for best colt exhibited under this class, first premium; \$6, second; \$4, third.

Graded drafts—Free season to mare, for first premium; \$6, second; \$4, third.

There will be no entrance fee, and the premiums are offered solely for the purpose of stimulating friendly rivalry and encouraging the breeders and owners in making as creditable an exhibition as possible.

Colts competing must be under three years of age and the decision of superiority and awards of premiums will be made by judges to be selected by the Breeders' association. There will be seven sets of judges—one for each class—and they will view the colts and award the premiums in time for the street parade at two o'clock.

FOR MEMORIAL DAY.—At Monday

night's meeting of Sedgwick post No. 10, G. A. R., of this city, the matter of preparing for a proper celebration of Decoration day, May 30th, was discussed, and a committee consisting of Gideon Stolz, Capt. J. W. Crawford and Capt. F. J. Babcock was appointed to have general charge of the whole arrangements, appoint sub-committees and take all steps necessary for the most complete and elaborate celebration of the day that has ever been had in Salem. The personnel of the committee is sufficient guarantee that such will be the result. They are all veterans who know what the occasion demands and who know just how to bring it about successfully. Sub-committees will be announced and the progress of preparations recorded as fast as developments occur.

HURRAH FOR THE ELECTRIC.—

The electric street railway company, whose track is now completed around by Liberty, Chemeketa and Eighteenth street and the extension of State street to the penitentiary, whose power house is built and ready near the creek on State street and whose whole apparatus is expected to be here and in full running order at least by the first of May, is to-day making the necessary measurements on Liberty street from State to Ferry and down Ferry to Commercial, these two blocks to be built as fast as men can do the work. It is expected this piece will be completed by the time the company is ready to run, so that the starting point will be at Commercial street by the Chemeketa hotel, opposite the postoffice and the CAPITAL JOURNAL office. Salem is getting to the front with improvements rapidly.

BLESSSED ARE THE POOR!—Child-

ren are apparently the poor man's riches. A New York paper sent reporters out for a novel kind of census the other day. They went first to a brown stone district, and found that 300 wealthy families there had added to the population just ninety-one children in the last ten years. Then they went to a tenement district, and found that 300 families there had increased the population in the same length of time by 600 children.

MILITARY BOARD.—This afternoon

is held in the capitol the regular quarterly meeting of the State Military board. The members present are Col. J. C. Shofner and Col. Freeman, of Portland, and Col. J. T. Bowditch, of Ashland, judge advocate. The business before the board is of a routine character and nothing of importance to the general reader is expected to come up.

LOOKING UP THE CENSUS.—Hon.

John Kelly, of Springfield, Lane county, supervisor of the U. S. census for the western district of Oregon, was in the city yesterday for the purpose of ascertaining the population of the several precincts with a view of properly apportioning the enumerators. He obtained all the requisite statistics at the court house and went north this morning to pursue the work at Oregon City and Portland.

A postoffice has been established in Bear valley and another on the South Fork, along the proposed route, but of what use is a postoffice without a mail line? We hope Binger will do what he can for us in this matter, and he will not only gain the everlasting friendship of the News, but will also win the gratitude and support of the Beaver and South Fork people, both democrats and republicans.

INTERESTING DEBATE.—The

members of the Alka-Hesperian society enjoyed an interesting debate Saturday night on the question, Resolved, "That the basis of population for representation in congress should be increased." C. B. Brown was leading champion for the affirmative and Wm. Kaiser for the negative, the latter convincing President O'Shea of the correctness of his views. The recently elected officers present were duly installed and a pleasant evening enjoyed. Next Saturday evening occurs the joint debate with the Philodarians.

A trial game was played Saturday afternoon, but as it was the first and no preparations were made for it, the score will not be published. named Mrs. Priscilla Miller arrived here this morning from Pittsburg, Pa., and says she has a brother named Wm. H. Hunter living three miles from Salem. She is suffering somewhat from the remains of a gripe and took a lengthy rest at the court house while overcome by fatigue in walking around. She says her husband was killed at Shiloh in 1862.
