THE MILL DITCH.—Superintendent Lane of the asylum, and Superintendent Downing of the penitentiary, went to Portland to-day for the purpose of consulting the managers of the Scotch mills in regard to the improvement of the Santiam ditch, which furnishes water power for the use of both institutions. The head-gate of the ditch at the Santiam river was washed out by the February freshet, and the channel of the river was so changed that when the river rises its low summer stage the supply of water in the ditch will be cut off if something is not done. The idea of Dr. Lane and Mr. Downing is to put in a force of men, tap the Santiam at a new point convenient to the old place, put in sufficient head-gates and thus insure a full supply of water. For this purpose, they desire the consent of the company having title to the ditch, that there may be no trouble or litigation, but the refusal of such consent will necessitate absolute action on the part of the state, as those two institutions cannot afford to remain without the water advantages the aforesaid ditch provides.

THAT BOTHERSOME SEWER.—Residents in the neighborhood of the creek east of the city, through which passes the big sewer from the asylum and penitentiary, want the JOURNAL to kick for them because the break in the sewer has not been repaired. In accordance with the complaint a JOURNAL reporter interviewed Dr. Harry Lane, superintendent of the asylum, this morning and ascertained that he has been waiting only for the water in the creek to reach a sufficiently low stage so that work could be prosecuted successfully. He has all the pipes and other necessary material on hand ready and in a day or two will put a force of men on and repair the obnoxious break. The doctor regrets the existence of the foul nuisance as heartily as anybody and will do all he possibly can and as fast as he can to do away with it.

THE CONVENTION SAFE.—For the further guidance of the republican state convention, the following Salem gentlemen were seen taking the morning train for Portland: Councilman George Collins, Banker Eugene Breyman, Editor R. J. Hendricks, of the Statesman; Editor Ernest Hofer, of the JOURNAL; Superintendent Lane, of the asylum; Superintendent Downing, of the penitentiary, and these were accompanied by Governor Penoyer, of Portland, and Col. J. T. Bowditch, of Ashland, the last four being democrats but intent upon watching what "the other fellows" are going to do.

ACCOMMODATING OFFICER.—The evil that politicians do is usually fired at them during their lives, but usually the good they perform is overlooked, neglected or forgotten. There is one officer in the state house that should not be forgotten or neglected by the newspaper or its readers. It is Finley Perrine, the bailiff of the supreme court. Through his courtesy and unselfish work the reporter is enabled each day to walk into the court room and pick up the proceedings of that body, already written out and in shape for the printer. He is such an officer as engenders respect for the American citizen, either as a soldier or civil officer.

VIGOROUS OCTOGENARIAN.—Banker Flint, of Roseburg, is in the city, visiting his daughter, Mrs. R. H. Dearborn. He is also father of Mrs. Morgan, of Portland and Mrs. Dr. Swick, of Yamhill county. To see Mr. Flint going along the street with his spry step, upright bearing and generally well preserved appearance the observer would consider him between 50 and 60 years old, but he is in fact 82, and it is a pleasure to hope that such a man can and may live to pass the centennarian period.

INSANE COMMITMENT.—Deputy sheriff Lucy, of Jackson county, this morning brought to the asylum for inmate Jesse Titus, aged 56 years, who imagines his attendants are trying to poison him. Deputy Miner, of Portland, brought up a man named James last evening who is a confirmed maniac and does not recognize any person, nor can he give his own name.

The city council met in regular session last evening and in the absence of Mayor Williams, Councilman Lafore was elected to preside. FREE METHODISM.

Evening Services at Rev. Dollarhide's House of Worship.

A reporter dropped in at the evening service at the Free Methodist church house in Salem. He had never been at one of their meetings. The sermon was preached by Rev. Dollarhide. It was noticed that he spoke extempore, using neither manuscript nor notes. The text was from Malachi, chap. 3, v. 2: "But who may abide the day of His coming? And who shall stand when He appeareth? For He is like a refiner's fire, and like fullers' soap."

The sermon from this text was both eloquent and instructive. All, said the preacher, who have accepted Christ, repented of their sins, and forsaken the service of Satan, whose repentance has been accepted, and whose sins have been washed away with the blood of Christ, can abide the day of His coming, can stand when He appeareth, and rejoice that He has come.

The refiner of precious metals, said the preacher, watches and tends his fire with great care to keep the heat at a proper temperature, and when he can see his own image in the molten metal, he knows it has become pure. So when a man has been purified until the image of God may be seen in him, his conduct and his manner of living, he may abide the day of His coming; but the wicked, too late, shall cry for mercy, and quaking with fear, pray that the rocks and the mountains may fall upon them and hide them.

Of course this is a much compressed synopsis of the sermon which was of considerable length, judging too, of the discourse from its effects upon the congregation, it was powerful to awaken religious emotion. Many testified and rejoiced and shouted "Glory to God!" The confessions of which there were more than a score, were interspersed with prayers for mercy, and songs of triumph and gladness. It was a meeting, meet for the Lord's day.
