THOMPSON LIKELY FOR GOVERNOR.

Marion County Divided Between
Moody and Thompson—McBride,
Baker and McKelroy Sure.

(Special to the Capital Journal.)

PORTLAND, Or., Apr. 16, 1890.
The republican state convention
assembled in Masonic Temple at
11:30 and was promptly called to
order by Louis T. Barin, chairman
of the state central committee.

Senator Thomas H. Tongue, of
Washington county, was elected
temporary chairman and E. M.
Rands, of the Oregon City Courier,
temporary secretary, after which
the convention adjourned until 1
o'clock, p. m.

There is no question but the fol-
lowing nominations will be made
without contest: George W. Mc-
Bride, secretary of state; E. B.
McElroy, superintendent of public
instruction; Frank C. Baker, state
printer.

David P. Thompson stands the
best show for governor as it now ap-
pears and Phil Metchan, of Grant
county, and J. P. Faulk, of Baker, a
member of the present state railroad
commission, are strong candidates
for state treasurer.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The convention was called to
order at 1:15 p. m. The committee
on credentials reported every county
fully represented. L. T. Barin,
United States marshal for Oregon,
headed the Clackamas county dele-
gation. The report was adopted.

The committee on permanent
organization recommended that the
temporary organization be made
permanent and reported an order
of business.

Multnomah has the front chairs
as to be able to take advantage
of any situation that might be de-
veloped and spring a Portland
scheme on a moment's notice. Mr.
E. M. Rands, of the Oregon City
Enterprise, secretary of the con-
vention is a former Iowa editor and
a friend of the JOURNAL editor.

Marion County was put well to
the rear and evidently was not in
favor with the powers that controlled
the seating.

James Lotan, the alleged Port-
land boss, was a conspicuous figure
in the convention. He is a man of
powerful frame and strong features,
dark hair and heavy moustache.
He is an iron-master and the head
of the Willamette Iron works. He
has some fame as a boss but a great
reputation as a sterling Republi-
can worker. The convention was
remarkable for the number of prom-
inent-nosed men, which means it
was a "git thar" crowd.

A strong effort is being made by
the friends of Cartwright, of East-
ern Oregon, to secure him the nom-
ination for state treasurer.

The committee on resolutions not
being able to report, it was moved
to proceed with nominations. This
was objected to and the sergeant-at-
arms was instructed to find when a
platform might be expected. The
committee will not report until 3:30
and the convention has adjourned
to that hour. It is almost the uni-
versal sentiment of the delegates
that Thompson will be the nominee
for governor. The Multnomah dele-
gation concedes that any man that
Eastern Oregon presents for treasur-
er will receive their support.

The Marion county delegation are
nearly unanimous for Cusick, of
Albany, for treasurer, and all but
one for McElroy, for superintendent
of public instruction. The dele-
gation stands about evenly divided
between Thompson and Moody for
governor.

Marion County is not making any
claim on the joint senatorship. At-
torney Cross, of Oregon City, is
mentioned as a possibility.

Hermann will be our nominee for
congress.

The convention will extend into
the night.

Indications are that Metchan
will be nominated for treasurer.

college for deaf mutes at Salem
says in the paper printed at the
school: There are now from sixty
to seventy-five deaf mutes in this
state of school age. We have suf-
ficient room in this institution for
forty pupils. We have had a total
enrollment the present term of
twenty-nine. The remainder are
kept out of school on various flimsy
excuses, to their own detriment and
to the injury of the state. The
state ought to make the very best
possible provision for the education
of these classes, and then pass laws
to enforce attendance, or to require
parents to provide equal advantages
elsewhere.

Silverton Appeal has this of the
county of which Salem is the
county seat:—Marion county now
has on hands sufficient funds to
more than meet her obligations.
From early in July to January her
warrants were endorsed as not paid
for want of funds, but now holders
of the outstanding warrants are no-
tified that the money is on hand
with which to raise them and with
yesterday they ceased to draw inter-
est. County Treasurer Condit is
ready to pay all that a e presented.

The county has been out of debt for
several months, but as the tax levy
was late in being made and as there
was a great delay in collections on
that account the money was not in
the treasurer's hands until just now,
when the order calling in the war-
rants is made. This is a gratifying
fact, in so much as the past year has
been a trying one on the finances of
the county, on account of the loss
of bridges and destruction of roads.
