ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION.—Articles of incorporation were filed with the secretary of state yesterday as follows: The Oregonian Railway company limited; the business in which this corporation proposes to engage shall be, and is, to construct and equip a railroad and telegraph line from Portland to East Portland, thence southerly on the east side of the Willamette river by way of Milverton, Clatsop and Springfield and the middle fork of the Willamette river to the northern boundary line of California; from Portland on the west side of the Willamette river to Astoria; with all necessary branches; principal place of business at Portland; the capital stock is \$3,000,000, divided into 3,000 shares of \$100 each; R. Koehler, Geo. H. Andrews and W. A. Grandahl, incorporators. The Pacific Real Estate company; principal place of business, Astoria; object, to deal in real estate; capital stock, \$5000; incorporators, A. T. Brakke, S. A. Miller and N. Deyish.

Oregon Installation Investment and Loan association of Umatilla county, by D. J. Phelps and J. L. Elam; investments; stock \$10,000. Brower & Thompson, Lumber Co. Brower, Multnomah Co. The latest from Astoria reports more favorable prospects at the gas well. Hard rock has been struck, and the indications are that when this is penetrated, there will be a liberal flow of gas. Experts have been sent for with a view to make a thorough exploration. Little can be done toward more extended prospecting with the crude implements now on hand, but boring machinery will soon be on the ground, and then the work of prospecting will be proceeded with in earnest.

HAS THE MARSHAL POWER.

Interview With the City Attorney About Cleaning up the City.

A reporter of the JOURNAL interviewed the city attorney this morning in regard to a proposed ordinance empowering the marshal to detail the police to aid in enforcing city health laws. The reporter learned that the printed laws contain full authority and power to enforce a general clean-up and the marshal recognizes the fact that it is his duty to supervise it and compel private parties to clear up about their premises. Two-thirds of the filth of the city is private filth and the general police powers of the city are sufficient to protect the public health, and all the city marshal has to do is to exercise it. No further ordinance is necessary. Pools of filth in front of stores and rotting rubbish in back yards and alleys can be removed by the aid of the police.

THE UNION PARTY CONVENTION.

A Good Attendance at Reed's Opera House.

The convention was called to order by King L. Hubbard who announced the purpose of the convention. Mr. Hubbard was chosen as chairman. He addressed the convention briefly, declaring that the platform was unobjectionable and one that no honest man could object to. The republican platform was copied largely after the Union platform and was in many respects like it.

Mr. J. M. Payne of Salem was made secretary.

Mr. J. M. Batchelor was made assistant secretary.

On motion the chair appointed a committee on credentials: Messrs. Kennedy of Stayton, McCully of Woodburn, and Jory of South Salem.

The chair stated that some precincts had not held primaries, and if individuals were present from those precincts they had better be put on as delegates.

The following committee were appointed: On permanent organization, William Stimpson, Ashley, White and M. Small.

On order of business: S. T. Darby, Dr. Wyatt, and R. C. Ramsey.

Mr. Robertson, of Turner, was called upon to address the convention. He expressed his entire devotion to the cause represented. Mr. James Dodge, of Waldo followed. He declared that the political glasses have been knocked out of his political spectacles.

Messrs. Small, Simpson and Ramsey, followed with spicy speeches.

The committee on credentials reported. About 75 delegates were present.
