FIGHT IN A CHURCH.

Ministers and Adherents Come to Blows.

ONE THROWN OUT OF DOORS.

The Other Preached a Deploring Sermon, Saying Christ was the Only Bishop.

CHICAGO, April 21.—The action of the two rival conferences of the Evangelical church in each appointing a pastor for every church in the state resulted in serious trouble at the Humboldt Park church in this city yesterday. Rev. Mr. Morlock was to preach his farewell sermon and his successor to be installed. The adherents and appointees from both conferences were on hand. Bishop Escher's conference had appointed Rev. John Vetter and the other faction, Rev. A. Heilman. When Pastor Morlock and Pastor-elect Heilman attempted to close the Sunday school, preparatory to other services, Superintendent Krueger and Pastor-elect Vetter demanded their authority. Immediately the congregation rose from their seats, and one party seized Vetter, while Heilman jumped down from the pulpit. The confusion was made worse by women and children rushing from the door, Vetter's friends shrieking, "They are killing our preacher," while their opponents yelled "out with him!" Vetter was finally landed outside, and notwithstanding his license from the conference, was refused admittance by Heilman, who stood in the doorway. When Vetter's adherents had retired Rev. Morlock preached his sermon, deploring the occurrence, but saying Christ was the only bishop they were recognizing in present. Excitement in that quarter over the affair is intense.

A SELF-MADE MAN.

Brief Sketch of James Lotan's Career—His Army Record.

Oregonian: The man who is to steer the republican ship of Oregon through the sea of the 1890 campaign needs no introduction to those business men in Portland with whom he has been associated here the past twenty-five years. Throughout the state, however, he is not so well known, and the following data will be interesting: James Lotan was born at Patter-son, N. J., in 1843. His schooling stopped at the age of 12, when he went to work in the machine shops. Enlisting in the army when under 19, he served for two years in the Ninth New York cavalry; from there he went for a time into the navy yard at Washington. In 1864 Mr. Lotan came to this coast, staying in San Francisco for a while, then in Victoria, coming to Portland just twenty-five years ago this month. He went to work first in the old Oregon Iron Works as a journeyman, finally becoming fore-man, a place he held for five years, then coming to the superintendency of the Willamette Iron Works in 1873. Here he has been ever since, and is now half-owner and manager, of the concern, which runs the largest machine shops north of San Francisco, and whose property is valued at \$300,000.

POLITICAL RECORD.

Mr. Lotan has been a republican all his life, always voting the republican ticket, commencing to take part in politics about 1870. He held the position of United States local inspector of steam vessels for seventeen years in Portland. He has been connected with the party organization, and on several occasions has served as chairman of the county committee. His present ascendancy has been brought about by his being forced into the position of a leader. With his experience and knowledge of politics, he thought he was entitled to a Lieutenantcy. He thought the captains were growing tired of the way others had been running things, and took advantage of the situation, rather than be forced to the wall. He said: "I have business enough of my own to attend to, and have more shrewdness than I really care about shouldering. Since I have got into it, however, I wish to make a success of it and secure the election of the ticket." CAMPAIGN GOSSIP. Questioned about the prospects of the ticket, Mr. Lotan says:

people from all the counties after the ticket was made. All appeared satisfied with it, and of the opinion that it would be elected from top to bottom. The only light the democracy seems to be making is on the gubernatorial. It must be recognized that Oregon is a republican state, and that while we now have a democratic governor, the state of affairs existing four years ago, the Chinese agitation and so forth, upon which, as a wave, Penneyer rode into victory, does not prevail now. While Penneyer had a majority in the county of something like 900, I am thoroughly satisfied in my own mind that Thompson will carry Multnomah county by over 2500 majority.

"So in the other counties where Penneyer led, I have every assurance from the people there that they will give Thompson a majority this time. That is why I think Thompson will be elected." "Yes, my influence, whatever it was, was directed toward the nomination of Metehan and Bean, because I thought they would strengthen the ticket. We wished to give the trusteeship to the strongest Eastern Oregon candidate. First, the caucus was proposed, but they could not agree on that, and we were left to estimate the situation by the balloting in the convention. Metehan proved to be the man that Eastern Oregon wanted most, so we went for him. "I propose to make an active and thorough campaign throughout the entire state, and to leave nothing undone necessary to elect the whole ticket. I don't consider myself a leader until the ticket which I have been instrumental in putting up, is elected."

Compliments for Salem. From the Woodburn Independent: There is a large store being built about midway between Salem and Hayesville, Salem will soon spread out over Hayesville.

The whole county, and the state, too, has to pay tribute to Salem. She has all the county buildings; the county officers all have their offices there, and every man who has official business in this county must go to Salem. She has also all the state buildings, the state house, asylum, penitentiary, deaf mute and blind schools, and the United States Indian school is located near the town. The legislature, county circuit and supreme courts meet there. Also the different state boards, railroad, swamp land and school commissioners. All of these things contribute directly to the benefit of the city and are of no especial benefit to the rest of the county.
