At Seattle the police Tuesday morning raided the Alma House in the Whitechapel district and captured eight thieves, one of them being a woman, and recovered a large amount of stolen property. The place has long been regarded as a den for thieves.

Gov. Hill, of New York, has sent to the legislature a message renewing his recommendation that candidates for office and political chairmen of the committees be required to furnish sworn itemized statement of their expenses in election campaigns.

Mrs. Wilfred Lawton Willingham, a niece of General Lawton, formerly minister to Russia, committed suicide at Washington. She came to secure a government position and failed. She was about 30 years of age, and leaves a daughter of 10. Her remains have been sent home.

A Socialist Member of Parliament Declares Himself.

LONDON, April 22.—In the commons-to-night Bradlaugh severely attacked Cunningham Graham for inciting a strike among starving laborers. He contended that the condition of the working classes had enormously improved, and that in this respect England stood in advance of every country in Europe. Graham made repeated but futile efforts to interrupt Bradlaugh, and denied that he had incited the people to violence, but said he would do so the moment the workers became powerful enough.

LONDON, April 22.—It is stated that the case of Captain O'Shea against his wife and Mr. Parnell will not be brought to trial, but will be settled out of court within a very short time. The basis of settlement is not yet known, but it is understood to involve an unconditional retraction of the charges against his wife and the Irish leader, under the influence of newly-discovered and convincing evidence that the allegations were unfounded.

Oregon Blade: In 1883 the duty on wool was reduced. That year the imports of wool into the United States were \$3,047,967 pounds. But by 1887, under the reduced duties, the imports had increased to 114,404,173 pounds, and the number of domestic sheep had largely decreased. The country had 59,629, 626 sheep in 1883, and but 42,590,079 in 1889. Since the moderate tariff reduction of 1883 caused this great reduction in the number of sheep and the vast increase in the importation of wool, what would be the effect of total repeal of the wool duties? Very probably within a few years there would not be 20,000,000 sheep in the United States.

Baker City Blade: The men nominated as candidates for official honors on the State ticket are all old and respected citizens of the state. Ordinance No. 191.

An ordinance bill to amend section 7, title 2, chapter IV, of the City laws relating to nuisances.

Be it ordained by the common council of the city of Salem:

Section 7. Any privy or cesspool within the city limits which shall be maintained on any block in which there is a public sewer accessible thereto, without being connected with said sewer as provided by ordinance No. 189 and which shall be in such condition as to emit a noxious and offensive smell or endanger the general health, shall be deemed a nuisance, and upon being so declared by vote of the common council, the marshal shall immediately notify the owner of the premises where such nuisance may be found, to abate the same within ten days from the date of the service of such notice and in case the notice is not obeyed within the time limited the marshal shall abate the same at the expense of the city, and such expense when ascertained shall be charged to the owner of the premises where such nuisance existed, and the recorder shall enter the same against him on the books of city liens, and such expense shall be a lien on said premises as provided in subdivision 8, of section 6, of the city charter. Provided however that the time for connecting with such sewer may be extended by the marshal for good cause shown to him, and then only for a reason b' time.
