

## PENNOYER FOR GOVERNOR.

## Proceedings of Democratic State Convention.

## IN SESSION AT PORTLAND.

The Evening Journal Specials up to the hour of going to press.

Special report to the Journal:

PORTLAND, Or., April 24.—The democratic state convention is in session here to-day. The attendance is not as large and the interest is not as great as at the republican state convention. It is generally conceded that Governor Pennoyer will be re-nominated, and will have much to say who shall be his running mate. He is by all odds the strongest man in the party, and, as the democrats believe, a man who has won the confidence and devotion of the masses of the people by his warm heart and generous impulses. He has made the state a fatherly, old-fashioned governor and shows his love for the masses to the extent that the Oregonian, which represents the Shylocks and privileged classes, constantly refers to him as a demagogue.

State Treasurer Webb will be his own successor on the ticket and is universally well liked in his party. He is considered a clean man, thoroughly honest and devoted to the best interests of Oregon.

The leading candidate for congress is M. R. A. Miller. In an interview in the Oregonian yesterday he is reported as having said:

"There is a great fermentation going on among the voters of the state, probably necessitating a new alignment of parties. There appears to be considerable opposition to Thompson, McElroy and Hermann. The rest of the ticket there is very little hope of defeating. There are a great many old republicans who will vote the democratic ticket. The agitation which the labor party has opened up, may tend to our advantage or disadvantage. It may prove to draw only the old prohibition vote. The adoption by the republican state platform of the old democratic doctrine may eventually prove to be only a declaration which shall leave the people free to vote for their preferences outside of party lines. The recent state election throughout the country would seem to indicate that the people are beginning to repudiate the republican doctrine of protection."

The statements in yesterday's Oregonian, assailing the characters of Thayer and Bush, are not endorsed or authorized by any respectable democrat here. The same paper to-day does not bring a single fact to back up its assertion that "there seems to be a disposition to put up a man who will have no strings tied on him, and whom the people of the state will have confidence in to give a right decision." It is evident to a great many people that Judge Thayer is one democrat who has not proved servile or subservient to the Oregonian crowd.

The Oregonian's insinuations against Hon. Asahel Bush are just as unfounded and lacking every element of truth. Democrats generally express their doubts and condemnation of the following in yesterday's Oregonian:

Quite a number of delegates are outspoken in antipathy against Chairman Bush for re-election. Grave charges are made against him. It is alleged that some \$3000 were subscribed in Multnomah county for the campaign, and that when application was made to him for Multnomah's share, he replied: "You must take care of your own fight in Multnomah county." He is charged to have sent \$1200 into Lake county, or at least to have claimed to have sent it there, where, as Lake county went republican, being usually democratic. It is also alleged that the funds of the democratic central committee were used for the sole purpose of electing Strahan, in the interests of Joe Simon, and that no effort was made by any other member of the ticket.

Prominent democrats who are posted say Multnomah county never gave half the sum of \$3000. Chairman Bush is not a candidate for re-election. Replying to the statement that Mr. Bush had misappropriated democratic funds and used the money to help elect Judge Strahan, Secretary D'Arcy, of the state central committee, says in an interview:

"This statement does Mr. Bush a great injustice. He was not chairman of the committee four years ago when Strahan ran for judge. In fact, he was sent there. Not a nickel was sent there. In fact, when Mr. Bush became chairman the committee did not have enough money to pay the legitimate expenses of the campaign and Mr. Bush contributed out of his own funds to defray expenses. He will not be a candidate for re-election as his private business takes all his time."

## TEMPORARY ORGANIZATION.

called to order in Turn Hall at 11 o'clock this morning by the chairman of the democratic state central committee, Hon. A. Bush, of Salem.

Hon. P. H. D'Arcy, of Salem, was chosen temporary chairman, and C. J. Trinchard of Astoria temporary secretary.

Committees were then appointed as follows:

A committee of ten on credentials, a committee of five on order of business, and a committee of one member from each county on platform.

At 12 o'clock convention took a recess until 3 p. m. to allow committee on platform time to report.

## The Landlords' Bill.

Parnell Moves Rejection of the New Scheme.

LONDON, April 23.—In the commons to-day Parnell moved that the Irish land purchase bill be rejected. He said the measure justified the claims of the nationalists made nine years ago. He welcomed Balfour as the latest recruit to the ranks of land reformers. While accepting the government's recognition of the principle of the land for the people, Parnell declared that he could not admit the bill was a satisfactory solution of the land question. The experience gained by the discussion of Gladstone's land bill in 1887 showed that the taxpayers would not go far enough to finally settle the land difficulty. The present bill was meant simply to enable one-ninth of the owners of land in Ireland, those being the larger absentee landlords, to sell out at exorbitant prices, leaving their poorer resident brethren in the lurch.

Parnell said he objected to the bill because it did not carry out what it proposed, while it exhausted the only Irish credit available. Presenting further objections, he said the principle of the bill was to purchase whole estates. For this purpose £4,000,000 was ridiculously inadequate. Ireland contained 14,000,000 acres, of which area the poor-law valuation was £9,000,000. At this valuation the total at eighteen and one-half years' purchase would amount to £166,000,000, which sum would be necessary to provide a solution of the land question.

Parnell said that the true test of the worth of the guarantees provided would be for Goschen to take them to the London market and try to see what he could realize on them. The securities, he said, can not be real unless they effect a complete settlement of the question under local authority, otherwise the scheme is a fraud on land purchasers, and a swindle on English taxpayers. He continued in an elaborate criticism of Balfour's view, contending against the advantages Balfour suggested would accrue to the landlords and tenants under the bill.

## Bullion Certificates Redeemable in Lawful Money.

## MONTHLY PURCHASES OF METAL.

Notes to be Receivable For all Dues to the United States.

WASHINGTON, April 23. Special to the Portland Oregonian.—The republicans of the house and senate have agreed upon a basis for the preparation of a silver bill. The agreement is in harmony with the measures adopted by the senate caucus committee, with an important amendment. The bill provides that the secretary of the treasury shall purchase from time to time silver bullion to the aggregate amount of 4,500,000 ounces of pure silver each month, at the market price thereof, not exceeding \$1 for 371 25 grains of pure silver and issue in payment treasury notes of the United States, to be prepared by the secretary in such form and such denominations, not less than \$1, nor more than 1000, as he may prescribe.

The treasury notes issued will be redeemable on demand, in lawful money of the United States, at the treasury or by any assistant treasurer, and so redeemed may be re-issued, but no greater or less amount of such notes shall be outstanding at any time than the cost of silver bullion then held in the treasury purchased by such notes, and such treasury notes shall be receivable for customs, taxes and all public dues, and when so received may be re-issued, and such notes when held by any national banking association may be counted as a part of its lawful reserve.

Provided, that upon the demand of the holder of any of the treasury notes provided for, the secretary may exchange for such notes an amount of silver bullion which is equal in value at the market price thereof on the day of exchange to the amount of such notes. The secretary of the treasury shall coin such portion of the silver bullion purchased under the provision of this act as may be necessary to provide for the redemption of the treasury notes provided for, and any gain or seigniorage arising from such coinage shall be accounted for and paid into the treasury. Silver bullion purchased under the provisions of the act shall be subject to the requirements of the existing law and the regulations of the mint service governing the methods of determining the amount of pure silver contained, and the amount of charges of deduction, if any, to be made.

So much of the act of February 28, 1878, entitled "An act to authorize the coinage of the standard silver dollar and restore its legal-tender character," as requires the monthly purchase and coinage into silver dollars of not less than \$2,000,000 nor more than \$4,000,000 of silver bullion is hereby repealed. This act shall take effect thirty days from and after passage.

Senator Teller, of the subcommittee, dissented. Later he said he would make an effort to secure free silver coinage. Failing in that he would accept the next best thing he could get. When the measure came up in the senate he would move to make the certificates legal-tender.

At the republican caucus to-night the silver bill, given above, was adopted with but few dissenting votes, the objecting members opposing the bill because of its failure to give the full legal-tender quality to the treasury notes provided.

In addition to the provisions of the bill already stated, it is provided that money now held in the treasury to redeem national bank circulation in case of liquidation of banks, banks reducing circulation, etc., is to be covered into the treasury. This fund is estimated at about \$75,000,000, which will be restored to the circulation.

## CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

Massachusetts protests against a duty on oranges.

The floods on the lower Mississippi continue, and suffering is great.

Chicago pool-rooms are running, without interference by the police.

The republican congressional caucus has endorsed the Morrill pension bill.

It is announced by the conductor of the Casino at Monte Carlo, that the winnings of the bank during 1889 were 90,000,000 francs.

Charley McFarlane, convicted of the murder of two railroad surveyors in San Pete county last September, has been sentenced to the Utah penitentiary for life.

At Oregon City, Charles Dart changed his plea on the indictment for horse-stealing to guilty, and was sentenced to three years in the penitentiary. Dart and Cummings were taken to Salem.

The San Pedro hotel, San Pedro, Cal., was burned to the ground Wednesday morning, the guests barely escaping with their lives. Loss, \$15,000; insurance, \$7000.

J. McD. Cromars, agent at Edmonston, Canada, of the Peoples' bank of Halifax, who left the country with \$10,000 belonging to the bank, has been captured at Sand Beach, Mich. He will return voluntarily for trial.

Hon. Francis Dana Stedman died in Boston Wednesday, aged 89 years. Stedman was the last surviving grandson of William Ellery, of the signers of the Declaration of Independence, and son of Hon. Wm. Stedman.

The Pennsylvania railroad statement for March, shows an increase of \$68,171 in the net earnings over March 1889. For the first three months of 1890, the net earnings have increased \$287,110 over the same period of 1889.

At a late meeting of the stockholders of the Portland Savings bank it was decided to increase the capital stock of the bank from \$125,000 to \$250,000. This with a surplus of \$50,000, which the concern has, will make it a solid institution.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23.—President Fuda this morning telegraphed John L. Sullivan as follows: "The California elite has voted a \$20,000 purse for yourself and Jackson. Do you accept?" The colored champion was sent similar message.

CHICAGO, April 23.—The fact that the California Athletic club had agreed on a \$20,000 purse was telegraphed Peter Jackson to-day, and the answer came back promptly: "I accept those terms." Sullivan's answer is now awaited.

An Eastern Oregon man says that John Nutting, a brother of George Nutting, who disappeared in Crook county several years ago, and was supposed to have been murdered, has also disappeared and fears are entertained that he too may have been a victim of foul play.

Texas has a great flood. Continuous rains have fallen for three days past. The rivers and bayous in many places are over their banks, bridges swept away and travel delayed. A great deal of stock in the lowlands has been drowned, but no loss of life is yet reported.

The excursion of pioneers from New England, 150 strong, are at San Diego. They start north on a special. The arguments of early days are lost in wonder at time's changes. "We laid the corner-stone and you built the edifice," is their boast. About sixty members of the party were here in 1849.

The Nottinghamshire miners, comprising the constituency of John Edward Ellis, Gladstonian member of parliament for Roshcliffe, have served notice on that gentleman that unless he will give his unqualified support to the movement for a general working day of eight hours they will consider that he has forfeited their confidence. He has not replied to the notice.

A special London cable says: There are rumors in shipping circles to the effect that an attempt is being made to create a corner in grain. It is alleged that a well-known merchant bought up sixty floating cargoes. An unusually large Atlantic grain freight season is expected this summer, so that even if these unfounded rumors have any foundation the result is not likely to amount to much.

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Sheriff Sampson, of Clackamas county, brought up two prisoners, one an ex-convict. Each for three years for horse stealing.
