Improve the Park.

ED. CAPITAL JOURNAL: Yesterday being a model spring day and the beauties of nature inviting me out to partake of her bounties, after dinner, at noon, my wife and I boarded the street car and rode out to the Highland addition, arrived at the platform opposite Dr. Minthorn's residence. The car stopped and the score of passengers disembarked. My spouse and I followed the crowd along a grass-grown street running north, and a few minutes, walk brought us to the welcome shade of the park. Hundreds were there on our arrival, and accessions were constantly arriving by private conveyance and on the cars. I have seen handsomer parks in the Eastern cities and in some of the capitals of Europe; but I don't know that layish expenditure and the tricks of the landscape artist are necessary to rural enjoyment.

Here we have a charming piece of forest land, fifteen acres in extent, cleared of superfluous trees, a carriage drive around the circumference, rustic seats for the wearied and abundance of pure cold water for all. A merry-go-round was kept in constant motion and affording an unending amusement for constant crowds. The visitors were well behaved, all were on the same errand bent, and each one constituted the others' enjoyment.

As I understand, this pleasure ground is a part of the Highland park purchase, and is owned by the Oregon Land Co., who have given it up to the public use. The few and inexpensive improvements made have been at the expense of that company. As a citizen of Salem I appreciate the public service rendered, and can see much good in store for the people of this city in this pleasure and health resort being placed at their service.

That quaint philosopher, Sancho Panza, cautions us against looking a gift horse in the mouth. But appreciation of a good deed is not qualified by suggesting improvements. A few flower beds and ornamental shrubbery would add many attractions to the place, and a grove and fountain and such scenic devices would be very delightful to the pleasure seeker.

I have encountered one or two tender consciences who object to this popular resort to the park on the day of rest and hint at Sabbath desecration. It would be well for the people of Salem to understand one another at the opening of the summer season. Sabbath desecration does not consist in those who live within city walls, and spend six days in the week in stores and workshops, enjoying the charms of nature on Sunday. Health demands fresh air and change, and the church need not be neglected to indulge an afternoon trip to the park. In England the picture galleries, parks and museums are open on Sunday, because it has been found if you shut up all the healthful and intellectual resorts, the people will have recourse to the tavern. I do not advocate swings, whirligigs or cigar and lemonade stands in the park on Sundays, as they savor of the fair ground and cannot help giving offense to a certain class of our citizens. But I do heartily favor the park as a Sunday and everyday resort, and would impose no restriction or the natural attractions that a judicious expenditure of money can add thereto. Why, yesterday I noticed at least half a dozen pairs of young men and their ladies seated on the unpicketed fences of one or two unfinished houses, enjoying the charms of out-of-door life, and abandoning themselves to the Italian's paradise of dolce far niente, which means an agreeable way of doing nothing.
