THE BRIDGE.

Polk County Asks \$6,666.67

More of the City of Salem.

TO GET A \$60,000 BRIDGE.

The Courts to Meet Again next Wednesday to Await the Action of the Council.

The joint county courts were in session Saturday forenoon and have adjourned to await the action of the city council. The Marion County court is still in session dispatching regular business. The bridge arrangement so far as completed is given below.

THE PLAN adopted is Hoffman & Bates, Portland, No. 6, steel bridge according to plans and specifications on file, price, \$60,000 and the old material. The courts have required some changes in the plans, the west pier is to be as large as the middle pier, and the piles are to be shod.

THE FINANCES, as at present proposed, are to be about as follows: The first talk was for a \$40,000 bridge; Salem \$20,000, Polk \$10,000, and Marion \$10,000. This plan proposed was to rebuild the old bridge. It has since been concluded to put in a steel bridge. Now Polk county proposes for each county to stand one-third the expense, in addition, which leaves the other \$20,000, to be raised by the two counties and the city, each sharing equally.

SPECIAL SESSION. The Marion and Polk county commissioners' courts will meet again next Wednesday at 10 o'clock to finish the business, and give the city council an opportunity to pass on the matter of raising its one-third of \$20,000 more required.

THE OFFICIAL ORDER. The following is the joint order of the courts in regard to the construction of the bridge:

"In the matter of the rebuilding or repairing the bridge across the Willamette river, at Salem, between the counties of Marion and Polk, now at this time this matter comes on regularly to be heard upon the report of W. A. Grondahl, the engineer to whom were referred the bids, plans and specifications heretofore submitted herein. And after considering the suggestions and recommendations of said engineer, and with the concurrence of the county court of Polk county, it is ordered by the court that the proposition No. 6, of Hoffman & Bates, to construct an all-steel superstructure, with crib and concrete piers, for the sum of \$60,000, be accepted; provided that certain changes be made in the plans and specifications by said contractor to accord with the recommendations of said engineer."

By a careful reading of the above it will be seen that, as far as the order goes, no final result was reached beyond accepting a certain plan. The bids were all received with a contemplation of having the bidders accept the material of the old bridge

as a part of the compensation and part of the consideration in payment of the new contract. So in considering the relative share to be paid towards the new bridge by each party the appropriations so far provided are divided as follows:

HOW IT WILL STAND.

We have outlined the above entirely as the Polk county commissioners understand it, the facts being furnished us by Mr. Com'r McBee. We believe it is best for all our Marion county readers to understand exactly the basis upon which our neighbors are operating, so that there may be no misunderstanding.

While we believe Salem will and should do her full share towards building this bridge, so unfair division of taxes should be permitted. Paying \$20,000, and all her share of the county taxes besides, ought to be enough, when it is remembered that this is in reality a county bridge, and that county bridges are almost universally built at the expense of the counties.

IN THE WORLD OF WOMAN.

What Earnest and Gifted Ladies are Contributing.

The Ladies' Saturday Morning club, of Boston, cleared \$2,200 by their performances of Antigone. The money goes to various charities. The Georgia Normal and Industrial college for girls, at Milledgeville, will be ready for the reception of pupils by the first of January next.

The McGill university, at Montreal, is to receive \$1,000,000 from Sir Donald Smith. He gives a third of a million for the woman's branch of the university.

For the first time a woman, Mlle. Palbotier, has presented herself for the teachers' examination at the Oriental academy at Paris. She has passed the examinations in Persian and in Turkish.

Through the labors of the "associated committee of women on police matters" of the New Century Club, six police matrons were placed in the police stations in Philadelphia. A committee report says: "The monthly reports of matrons have demonstrated the necessity for their existence, and the personal supervision of our members confirms all that has been written, and demonstrates that this department of municipal government is one which no city can afford to neglect."

It will be remembered that in Oskaloosa, Kan., two years ago, a woman mayor and a city council of women were elected, with a special view to putting an end to certain abuses; and their administration was so satisfactory that last year they were re-elected by a large majority. This year the women declined to stand for a third term. They said they had placed the city's affairs in good condition, and were willing to let the men try to keep them so. They worked at the polls on election day and helped to carry the election for the successful candidates.

It is rumored that a new woman's paper is soon to be started in Cincinnati.

In six counties of Kentucky, ladies are candidates for superintendents of schools.

A deaconess' home is to be founded at Washington in memory of Mrs. Lucy Webb Hayes.

The women of Fort Scott and Hutchinson, Kan., voted in large numbers at the late election.

There is a movement by prominent men and women in Toronto to establish a girls' industrial school in that city.

Mrs. E. W. Lord, assistant principal of the ladies' department at Oberlin, has given \$10,000 toward the erection of a building to be known as Lord hall, which is intended to furnish board and rooms for the children of missionaries.

I think the animus of this movement for woman's freedom has been mistaken largely, through the idea that it meant a competition between men and women. To my thought

it simply means co-operation in the work of the world.—Mrs. Zeralda G. Wallace.

Miss Lelia J. Robinson, the first lady lawyer of Massachusetts, and the author of several law-books, was married a few days ago to Eli A. Sawtelle, a well-known business man of Boston. The wedding took place at the house of the bride's parents. Mrs. Lelia Robinson Sawtelle visited Washington on her bridal tour, and on April 8th was admitted to practice before the U. S. Supreme Court on motion of Senator Hoar. She expects to continue the practice of her profession.
