UNITY OF ACTION.

Let the Towns and Cities of the Valley Combine their Efforts of Immigration.

It is suggested elsewhere with a good sense that makes it worthy of earnest consideration that one of the most practicable means of increasing the right kind of population in the Willamette valley would be for the several growing cities to unite in the raising of a fund for the payment of three good men to be placed during the spring and summer months at the three principal turning points of travel on the coast—Sacramento, Seattle and Portland.

These men should receive good salaries, so that a suitable office could be maintained for the keeping and distribution of all literature from either of the cities contributing toward their support. It should be their duty to be impartial toward the several cities, giving all an equal show and having an eye single to the interests of the valley, commercially and otherwise.

This suggestion is made for the consideration of the Salem board of trade, that it may be brought up at the next meeting. The Capital City should originate movements of this character when deemed advisable. It should be a leader and not a follower. It has passed the stage of village limitation and is within the reach of sufficient dignity to be a city originator.
