ROUSING MEETING.

Board of Trade and Citizens Make a Start for a Fourth of July Celebration.

A special meeting of the board of trade and citizens of the city was held in the council chamber last evening for the purpose of taking the preliminary steps for the proper celebration of the Fourth of July.

President Wright, of the board of trade, presided and Secretary Davey of the board, took the proceedings.

A motion was made by C. H. Monroe, seconded and carried that a committee of general arrangements be appointed, consisting of five members, of which President Wright is to be chairman and the other four to be appointed by the president.

Several enthusiastic speeches were made pending the appointment of the committee, after which it was announced as follows: John G. Wright, C. H. Monroe, J. C. Thompson, H. S. Simon, W. L. Wade.

The duty and powers of this committee are to appoint the necessary sub-committees and see that every arrangement is properly made for the biggest celebration ever held in the Willamette.

Mr. W. F. Seaver made a rousing speech announcing his determination, and his reasons therefor, to bring before the board of trade at its next meeting an idea in relation to the several towns and cities of the Valley uniting for the support of competent immigration agents at Sacramento, Seattle and Portland.

He asked that every person present talk up this matter for next meeting and urge it upon the favorable consideration of all with whom they come in contact.

Crop Weather Bulletin.

The Oregon state weather bureau, co-operating with U. S. signal service, has issued the following bulletin for the week ending Saturday, April 26th, 1890.

WEATHER.

The temperature has been slightly above the normal for the week. There was no rainfall. The days bright, with warm sunshine, which was about the average. The nights were cool, light frosts, which did no apparent damage, occurred on the 23d. This has been the first week of good, growing spring weather, this season, and the result is that vegetation has made marked progress.

CEREALS.

Winter wheat is invariably reported to be in excellent condition. Spring seeding in Umatilla county, and in sections of the valley counties is done, but most of it is about being finished up. Early spring grain is up. Showers are desired in the Walla Walla valley to give the late spring sown grain a start. The effect of too much rain on wheat, on the low lands is shown to have been slightly injurious in the Willamette valley. Larger

spring acreage than usual is and has been sown.

FRUIT.

All varieties of fruit trees in all parts of the state, save in the more mountainous sections of eastern Oregon, are in full bloom, and in many sections, the peach and cherry blossoms are falling. The frost on the 23d did not injure the fruit.

Wild strawberries are in bloom, and grape vines are budding out rapidly.

In Wasco, Sherman, Morrow and Gilliam, back from the river, and counties to the south, the apple and cherry trees are budding. The present outlook is that peaches will be a short crop, but the other fruit will be plentiful.

AGRICULTURAL OPERATIONS ETC.

Spring seeding is being finished. The weather is favorable for the lambing season. Sheep shearing will begin within the next ten days.

The grass is growing very rapidly affording good grazing. Vegetables are becoming very plentiful, and gardening is generally being very rapidly pushed. The weather for the week has been all that could be desired and all growing vegetation shows the favorable changes. The season continues about two weeks later than usual.

On April 7 the Kansas cities of the fourth class held their elections. The returns indicate that about two-fifths of the total vote was cast by women. At Edgerton, after one of the most warmly contested campaigns ever known there, a city government consisting entirely of women was elected, as follows: Mayor, Mrs. W. H. Kelley; police judge, Mrs. Thomas Greer; city council, Mrs. S. F. Ewart; Mrs. Stewart, Mrs. Holden, Mrs. Ross, and Mrs. Brown. In most of the cities, no women were candidates.

Eleven young Danish women lately matriculated at the University of Copenhagen. Miss Anna Hude, a graduate of that institution, has been appointed assistant in the historical department of the imperial archives, and has taken the golden medal of the university for historical proficiency.

In the extradition treaty between Canada and the United States, which has been officially announced, rape and abduction are among the extraditable offenses. The Union Signal says: "If honestly interpreted and faithfully executed, this will arrest the infamous underground traffic in young girls which has been carried on across the border."

Miss Margaret H. McCalla has served fourteen years as the superintendent of the Bloomington, Ind., city schools. During much of the earlier portion of her service she was the only woman in the State holding the position of superintendent of schools. Her devotion and ability have given the Bloomington schools a high standard, and her recent resignation, because of failing health, is deeply regretted.

In South Dakota, a bill providing that the State board of charities and corrections should be composed in part of women passed the House, but was defeated in the Senate. A bill was passed instead providing for an "investigating committee" of three women, whose duty it will be to visit all the State charitable and penal institutions, report any abuses, and make suggestions to the board, but who will be without a vote.

Mrs. Philena Everett Johnson says: "Dakota women are, however, perverse enough to think that the state institutions would be better served if two or three women had been put squarely on the board."
