

BEAUTIFUL SIGN.—The effect of artistic skill on the part of the designer and mechanical ability on the part of the painter was never more impressively illustrated than in a sign now adorning the southwest corner of Commercial and Court streets and announcing the presence in that fine new block, of the Willamette Investment company, ready to handle real estate for buyer or seller. The sign is an oil painting on canvas. On the south side is presented a valley farm scene in perspective, surrounded by a pleasing Oregon sky and carrying the eye for many miles with farm houses and farm scenes at regular intervals. On the reverse side stands out prominently a splendid farm house with fields and fences surrounding, in the lower center a nice body of water with sail boats enjoying its half placid surface, and in the distant background a section of the majestic peaks of the Cascades. The borders on each side contain in unique letters the name and business of the Willamette Investment company, whose managers, Messrs. I. A. Manning and R. P. Boise, Jr., deserve great credit for the attractive and suggestive design, while Painter Bell shows himself a thorough artist in the execution.

EXTENSIVE BUSINESS.—Those who do not take pains to make personal investigation are not properly aware of the extensive and beautifully arranged business houses now existing in Salem. One of the most noticeable of these just now is that of Krause Bros., at 275 Commercial street, in Brye's new block. The room is 90 feet deep and 22 feet wide with a 16-foot ceiling. Fifteen feet in the back part is partitioned off for a repair shop and the balance from floor to ceiling on either side is filled with a stock of boots and shoes that would be creditable to any city of any size. It is arranged, too, in regular metropolitan style, and the whole store is kept in the most attractive order. The firm of Krause & Klein has been fully dissolved and the three Krause brothers are doing business at the place above described, having no interest at any other point. They are gentlemen it is always pleasant to meet and the person who cannot be accommodated from their present immense stock must be difficult to please.

MEETING OF COMMITTEE.—There will be a meeting of the Fourth of July committee this evening to decide upon the proper sub-committees and the general plan to be followed. The intention is to make the celebration elaborate and attractive, and the probabilities now are that there will be large numbers present from Corvallis, Albany and other neighboring cities. One feature which the committee will endeavor to secure and which would be a very pleasant one, is the participation of the Knights of Pythias, of the several towns, to appear in the procession on horseback. The regular program will appear when decided upon.

GOOD PROGRESS.—The committee of real estate men whose meeting was held yesterday afternoon, appointed a sub-committee consisting of T. H. Barnes, W. A. Shaw and Wm. Wilde to canvass the city for subscriptions. These gentlemen went around a portion of today and succeeded beyond their expectations, but they did not make a thorough canvass and will increase the list by a large amount to-morrow. Another meeting of all the real estate men will be held this evening to hear the report of the committee and devise further ways and means.

THE BRIDGE MATTER.

Adjourned Joint Session of the County Courts.

The county courts of Marion and Polk have been in session since 1:30 p. m. and there is considerable excitement among the people of Salem to know what will be the outcome. It was learned immediately upon the arrival of the Polk county men that the statement of the situation made in the EVENING JOURNAL of Saturday was substantially correct.

A COMPROMISE REACHED. After consultation between the courts the Polk county commissioners and judges advanced for their offer of \$16,866.67 of last Saturday to \$20,000, or one-third of the \$60,000 of the contract. The city of Salem is to pay for the foot bridge or sidewalk and Marion county for superstructure.

THE CONTRACTOR. Mr. Hoffman, informed a JOURNAL reporter that the water was too high at present to put in piling, but that they would get the material on the ground and begin work within 30 days and Major Williams made a memorandum to that effect. The bridge will be completed if water will permit, in time for the fall trade.

CONGRATULATIONS were extended all around, as the contract was so happily closed up and all were satisfied. Great praise is due Judge Shaw, the Marion county commissioners, and Mayor Williams for their energy and devotion in the whole matter. Judge Stouffer and Commissioners McLench and McBee, of Polk county, are equally entitled to credit for carefully and in so public spirited a manner meeting the situation.

Portland Telegram: It is probable that John L. Sullivan and Peter Jackson will meet in the prize ring in San Francisco in a few months. It would be a fortunate thing, indeed, for the country if the black fellow should succeed in whipping the champion. Sullivan demands that the entire purse \$20,000 shall go to the winner and it is probable this will be agreed to. Then should Jackson knock the big fellow out, Sullivan would be without either reputation or money, and once down he would receive innumerable kicks and cuffs to place him lower if possible. In fact, he would never be heard of again. If Jackson is the winner he will, so he declares, take his money and go home to Australia, where he will remain. A death blow will thus be dealt prize fighting in this country and consequently we say, in the hopes that Sullivan will be whipped, let the fight come off.

Oregon Blade: The Blade's dispatch on the silver bill, given Thursday morning was somewhat misleading, it appearing therefrom that silver certificates were, by the bill to be made redeemable only in silver bullion at the market price on day of redemption. It appears from later telegrams that the silver certificates are to be made redeemable in lawful money also, and that they are made "receivable for customs, taxes and all public dues," but are denied the full legal tender quality, thus leaving all interesting-bearing paper still payable in gold as at present. This measure may and probably will raise the price of silver, and thus benefit the silver producer. It will fall to bring wheat and gold any closer together than they are now, and thus fail in that measure of justice which is due to labor products. Nothing short of free coinage on the basis of 412½ grains of silver, nine-tenths fine, to 258-10 grains of gold, is, or can be an honest treatment of this question.

Two Thugs Perform an Evil Deed in Japan.

SAN FRANCISCO, April 23.—The

steamer Gaelic brings the following

advices: On the morning of the 6th

odist mission at Azabu, Japan, killed

the minister and dangerously

wounded his wife. The deceased

supposed murderers have been cap-

tured. One of them was formerly

in the minister's employ.
