In order that farmers may be fully posted as to the great difference of the two bills, as to protection to farm products, the comparison above made should be placed in the mind of every farmer and kept convenient as a stuffed club to beat down democratic falsehoods during the coming campaign. The Tribune gives further details as follows:

The duties on the first named articles and of a few others following in the Mills bill are the same as exist under the present law, but the Mills bill puts many articles on the free list which the present law protects. The new republican tariff bill, known as the McKinley bill, increases the protective duties above those of the present law on all farm products, while the Mills bill, as will be seen above, strips many important farm products of all protection entirely.

To the farmer the difference between the Mills bill and the McKinley bill is the difference between the loss and profit. Even under our present tariff law, there were imported into this country last year (according to the Statistician Dodge) foreign agricultural products to the value of over \$38,000,000. If one-half of this sum has been saved to our farmers last year it would have been very acceptable. The McKinley bill proposes to hold back these vast importations of foreign products and give our farmers a better show in the home markets. The Mills bill would vastly increase the importations of foreign farm products and rob our farmers of their home markets.

This is the difference between the two bills, and the farmers of this country are not going to be deceived by the foolish assertions and falsehoods of the free trade organs that are trying to convince them that "the McKinley bill affords but little more protection to the farmer than does the Mills bill."
