BIG DEMONSTRATIONS EVERYWHERE.

The JOURNAL Honors the Event by Appearing in Enlarged Form With Press Dispatches.

THE SITUATION IN PARIS.

PARIS, France, May 1, 9:30 a. m.—No disturbance here up to this hour on account of the demonstration on Labor Day. All is quiet on the boulevards in outlying sections of the city, while the central quarters wear their usual aspect. Shops with the exception of those devoted to the sale of fire arms and ammunition are all open and all kinds of business is being carried on as usual.

THE PARADE IN THE EMPEROR'S HOME.

BERLIN, May 1, 9:30 A. M. At this hour small groups of working men are quietly gathering in the streets to be ready to join in the monster labor parade. No disturbances are reported from any quarter of the city, and no trouble is anticipated. The government is prepared, however, to suppress riots and offensive socialist demonstrations, should any occur.

SERIOUS AUSTRIAN STRIKE.

VIENNA, Austria, 1:30 p. m.—Despite general belief the labor demonstration in this city will be attended by grave disorder. There has yet been no disturbance whatever.

LATER.—Meetings are being held in various halls, attended by large portions of workmen in the city. No afternoon papers will be issued, as the printers are all taking part in May day fetes.

It is calculated that throughout Austria and Hungary one million men have already struck or threaten to strike.

IN SPAIN.

LISBON, Spain, May 1.—International Labor Day is being observed with extreme quietness by the workmen in this city.

LESS THAN EXPECTED.

LONDON, May 1.—The procession of workmen fell far short of the number expected. The line was composed of only a few hundred men.

BELGIUM CELEBRATION.

BRUSSELS, May 1.—An immense meeting of workmen was held at Charleroi, where thirty thousand men marched to the place of meeting, all singing "Marsellais." The men were orderly.

OREGON NEWS.

Gathered from Many Points in the State.

STORMY CONFERENCE AT ALBANY.

The Union Pacific Certain to Reach Silverton—Other Important Matters.

SNOW GOING EAST.

GATESVILLE, OR., May 1.—Snow is going off very fast, and the streams are all much swollen. The Santiam is at a very high stage of water. Jo Turnidge had his leg broken Tuesday, by falling off a wagon.

SILVERTON JUBILANT.

SILVERTON, Or., May 1.—Silverton is jubilant over its railway prospects. Real estate is advancing in value, and a steady improvement of the place is assured. Huntington will convert the narrow gauge into a standard gauge, and build another line from East Portland to Silverton. Should the Union Pacific build to Salem via Silverton, the latter place will be a junction of no mean importance.

SERIOUSLY INJURED.

SILVERTON, Or., May 1.—Mr. John Whitlock, an old pioneer of this county, was seriously injured yesterday by a runaway. He was driving into town in his buggy, and when on the top of DeGuire hill, the animal became frightened and ran, throwing Mr. Whitlock out and injuring him severely. The wounded man was conveyed to town and cared for by a physician, but as yet the extent of his injury is not known. It is feared, however, that he is internally injured.

LEONARD NOT THE MAN.

TURNER, May 1.—A reporter of the JOURNAL interviewed the station agent here, as to the identity of the dead body found in Mill creek and he said: Referring to Mr. R. J. Sharp's statement in the EVENING JOURNAL of the 30th, I will say that the man he mentioned, R. H. Leonard is not the man found in Mill creek. Mr. Leonard came through all right and on the 19th of February I sold him and family tickets for Portland, and also shipped his household goods the same day.

HOT COUNTY SEAT FIGHT.

DALLAS, Or., May 13.—The fight between Independence and Dallas for the supremacy on the county seat question is becoming very warm; business men of those two places have become so much interested that they have been allowing their stock of goods to run down and almost abandoned business. The action of our county court in the Salem bridge matter is giving general satisfaction. The \$20,000 of Polk county bonds will be issued for a long term of years and a very low rate of interest, so that the taxes in payment therefore would not be felt by the people.

EVANGELICAL CONFERENCE.

ALBANY, May 1.—All the members of Conference are present. P. Bittner preached on last evening. The Educational Association also held its annual meeting. Principal W. C. Kauser of the Lafayette Seminary, reported the new institution in a flourishing condition. The highest number of students enrolled during the year was sixty.

The following officers were elected: C. C. Poling and W. E. Woodward trustees of the Seminary for three years. The Association's officers for the coming year were elected as follows: Pres. J. Bowersox; Vice Pres. J. L. Heishner; Sec. E. S. Bollinger; Treas. A. Odell.

Bishop Bowman arrived this morning ready to preside to-morrow. Concession seems to be out of the case. Several applicants for work, refused examination because they believed Bishop Bowman to be legally suspended.

The Session to-morrow morning will no doubt be a stormy one. All preliminary proceedings indicate this. ALBANY, May 1.—The seventh annual session of the Oregon conference of the Evangelical association will convene in the Evangelical church in this city to-morrow at 8:30 a. m. Bishop Thomas Bowman, of Chicago, will be present and preside. A cordial invitation is extended to all who wish to be present at the devotional exercises, and hear the opening address by the bishop. There will be preaching at the Evangelical church every evening during the conference session, commencing with Wednesday evening. Bishop Bowman will preach on Sabbath morning.

COOS BAY RAILROAD.

ROSEBURG, May 1.—Roseburg has raised over \$50,000 as a subsidy for the Coos Bay Railroad. There are many things to indicate that Roseburg will be the coming metropolis of Southern Oregon. The opening of a railroad to Coos Bay means a great deal to the whole state, for it will bring into communication with the rest of the state a country remarkable for many resources, such as coal and timber.

IN THE UNION.

The 8-Hour Movement Turned Loose to-Day.

SOCIALIST DEMONSTRATION IN N. Y.

Large Strikes Inaugurated in Boston and Meeting Some Resistance.

THE SOCIALISTS IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 1.—Up to ten o'clock this morning few, if any, signs of the proposed inauguration of the eight-hour movement are noticeable in this city. At the labor headquarters all is very quiet. Great interest centres in the parade and demonstration at Union Square. It is expected that fully 15,000 men will engage in the meeting under control of the Socialist organizations.

SUCCESSION IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 1.—The impending strike among members of carpenters and framers union has been avoided. The bosses announced this morning that they would agree to the terms of the men, that eight hours should constitute a day's work. The men are all at work and general good feeling prevailed.

STRIKES IN BOSTON.

BOSTON, Mass., May 1.—The situation here grows more complicated and serious. The strike of the carpenters for an eight-hour day was fully inaugurated this morning. In all there are 18,000 men out, and it is estimated that at least 2000 men have been granted, the request by 100 firms not members of the Master Builders' Association. The indications are that the eight-hour move will be successful here.

IN RHODE ISLAND.

WESTERLY, R. I., May 1.—All granite cutters in the large state and private quarries at this place struck this morning.

AT ST. LOUIS.

ST. LOUIS, May 1.—It is expected that fully 25,000 men will be in line in the great labor demonstration under the auspices of the American Federation of labor. The parade will be swelled by the presence of Knights of Labor.

QUIET IN CHICAGO.

CHICAGO, Ill., May 1.—The amicable settlement of the carpenters' strike, and the consequent satisfaction among the labor elements, causes a comparatively quiet state of affairs. It now appears evident that the number of strikers here will not be nearly so numerous as was anticipated. Up to noon no trouble reported.

AT PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, May 1.—No labor demonstration of any kind has taken place in this city to-day and the situation as regards the locked-out carpenters remains virtually unchanged.

THE LATEST TELEGRAPHIC NEWS OF TO-DAY.

SHE LABORED IN ICE.

MONTREAL, CANADA, May 1.—Beaver Line Steamer Lake Nepigon with a large number of emigrants arrived yesterday from Liverpool. April 7th this ship encountered a field pack of ice off Cape Ray and for six days was at the mercy of the ice in which she became tightly jammed, finally the ice began to shove under ship. She began to careen and was in danger of capsizing but finally got off safely.

NEW RAILROAD DEAL.

BOSTON, May 1.—The stockholders at the annual meeting of the Union Pacific railroad re-elected the entire old board of directors, and in the place of David Dowes, of New York put Marvin Houghton, president of the Chicago and North-western railroad. The selection of such an out and out Vanderbilt man occasioned much comment. The company assert that as the Union Pacific has entered into a traffic combination with the Northwest, it was therefore fixed that the latter company should have a representative. The street did not see it in that light, and insist that it is the beginning of a combined attack of the New York Central and Union Pacific to capture the Oregon Transcontinental road and fight the Northern Pacific and the Canadian Pacific by virtually duplicating it, and all sorts of deals and combines are seen in the air.

Sorrow Kills.

DETROIT, May 1.—Minister to the court of Spain Palmer, who had been mentioned as candidate for the governorship of Michigan and was en route home to take part in the campaign, cables his withdrawal from the race. The death of his niece, his last living relative, has completely broken him down.

EDITORS INDICTED.

NEW YORK, May 1.—The grand jury yesterday handed in indictments against J. Pulitzer, J. A. Cokerill, J. Chambers, and J. F. Graham of New York, for criminal libel of ex-Judge Hilton. The World has for some time past been publishing sensational articles about Hilton's relations to Stewart and also insinuations against the character of Mrs. Stewart. Messrs. Graham and Chambers gave bail this afternoon. Mr. Pulitzer and Cokerill are out of the city.

THE NEW PENSION LAW.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 1.—The new pension bill which has just become a law authorizes the secretary of the treasury to place on the pension roll the name of any officer or enlisted man of sixty years or over, who served ninety days or more in the war, and shall have received honorable discharge, the said pension to commence from the date of application and continue during life at \$8 per month. All persons who served ninety days in the war and were honorably discharged and are now or may hereafter be suffering from mental or physical disability, shall, upon due proof be placed upon the list of invalids at the rate of \$9 per month. The bill also provides for a pension for the widow of any soldier who shall have arrived at the age of sixty years, or be without support than their daily labor.

CANADIAN CORRUPTIONS.

QUEBEC, May 1.—A great sensation has been created by charges which have been brought against the government department of public works, presided over by Sir Hector Langvin and against Thos. McGrevey, members of parliament. McGrevey is alleged to have received nearly a quarter of a million dollars from government contractors in the shape of commissions for his assistance in securing contracts. McGrevey's brother claims he paid his brother \$215,000 for using his position as a member of parliament.

MYSTERY CLEARED UP.

OSHKOSH, Wis., May 1.—The mystery surrounding the disappearance of Joseph Chote, a wealthy Oshkosh lumberman, has been cleared up. Mrs. Chote has received a letter from her husband, who it is supposed was murdered near Tomahawk last July. The letter said that Chote was in the lumbering business at Helena, Mont., and doing well.

PROHIBITION IN DAKOTA.

PIERRE, S. D., May 1.—At 12 last night the saloons all over South Dakota closed, the prohibition law having gone into effect. The fact that druggists can secure no license before June 1st leaves the state almost absolutely dry.

GEN. ALGER'S RECEIPTS.

ELLENBURG, Wash., May 1.—The parade of the state encampment of A. R., moved at ten this morning, with two hundred veterans in line. General Alger, commander in chief, marched with the old soldiers. Mrs. Logan reviewed the parade and all the old veterans saluted her with uncovered heads. She replied by waving her handkerchief. Gen. Alger and party left for home at one o'clock this afternoon. The election of officers and the location of the next place of meeting is the order for this afternoon. Grand ball to-night completes the program.

MURDER AT SALT LAKE.

SALT LAKE, Utah, May 1.—Alma Pratt, an insane patient at Provo asylum, this morning killed Sing

Lee, a Chinese inmate, with a razor. One of the attendants had left a razor where Pratt could get it, and going into the dining room he found the Chinaman washing dishes and thinking he was the devil, as he afterwards stated, he threw the Mongolian to the floor and in an instant he had whipped out his razor and with one swing he almost severed the Chinaman's head from his body. Pratt was seized and disarmed. He is a son of the late Parley P. Pratt, who for many years was one of the apostles of the Mormon church.

ENTERTAINING PIONEERS.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 1.—The visiting pioneers were employed in seeing San Francisco's many attractions. Trips to the park, the Presidio, Cliff house, Chinatown and to the city's suburbs pleasantly occupied their time. By special invitation there were also visits to the Art Association exhibition, to the Viticultural headquarters, to the State Mining bureau and to the State Board of Trade exhibition. On Friday the Masons of the party will be tendered a reception at Masonic temple. According to arranged plans the party, after visiting Stanford university, will reach San Jose on Saturday next. Sunday and Monday will be passed at San Jose. Some of the party plan to take this time for a trip to Monterey, and others will climb to the great observatory on Mount Hamilton. Monday evening the special train will take the visitors to Sacramento, and thence they will start eastward Tuesday morning, crossing the Sierras by daylight.

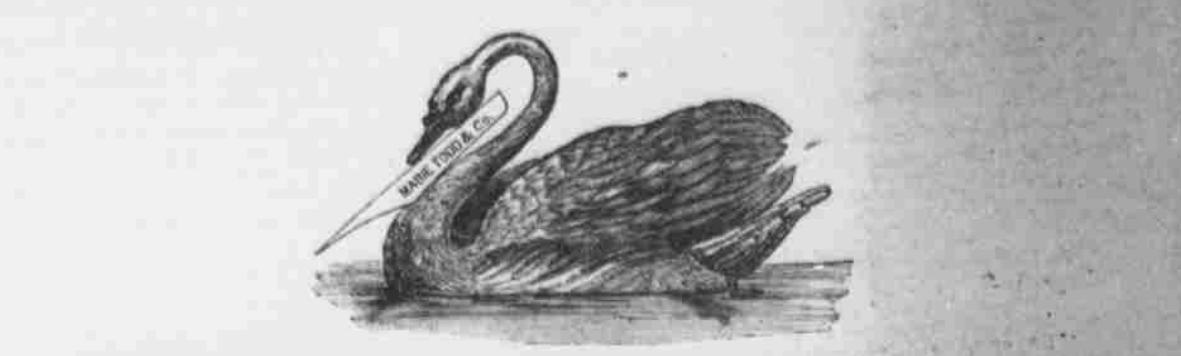
