BOAT INSPECTION.—Frank Mc-

Demott, U. S. local inspector of steam boilers; Edward S. Edwards, U. S. local inspector of hulls, of this district, and Mr. Merton, an officer direct from the custom house, as announced in yesterday's JOURNAL, were here and last evening inspected the new steam ferry just completed by Mr. Thos. Holman, of this city. The duties of the first two are partly apparent from the title of their offices, but their work is very important to the traveling public, as they test the boilers and machinery thoroughly at a capacity far greater than is ever afterward allowed to be used. They establish the highest limit of steam power to be used, the tonnage to be carried and other rules governing the use of the boat. Also designated the number of water buckets to be carried, lights, etc. They were well satisfied with the boat and its construction and said it would be a safe conveyance. Mr. Holman had expected to start it to-morrow, but he will only get up steam and make a trial run, as his cable is not yet in order. He went to Portland this morning to get his cable and make other arrangements. Walter Holman is to be the engineer and George Hastings pilot, which will insure good service. The boat will be started in regular action early next week.

FILING AND APPOINTMENTS.—

In the secretary of state's office today articles of incorporation were filed by the Franklin Building and Loan Association, with John A. Child, D. S. Cohen, N. Versteeg and H. W. Monnas, incorporators; capital stock \$2,000,000; principal office, Portland. Thos. W. Folsom, of New York City, was appointed commissioner of deeds for Oregon. Albert O. Bates, Oretown, Tillamook county; John A. Guyer, Pendleton; H. W. Hicks, Portland, were appointed notaries public.

GOING TO HOLLAND.—Jacob Be-

emer, father-in-law of Mr. Harritt, of the firm of Brooks & Harritt, will start to-morrow for a trip to Holland, which he left 34 years ago. He owned a fine farm in Polk county, which he sold some months ago and he has since made his home with his daughter in this city. He expects to be gone about five months.

THE REPUBLICAN TICKET.

A Partial Review of the Men Who Compose It—Others Coming in Next Issue.

FOR SENATORS.

J. B. Looney came to this state in 1845 and was one of the well known and popular Looney family, that has grown in numbers and public favor in the vicinity of Jefferson. He was formerly county commissioner and served the people in such a manner that he did not have to leave his farm to be elected senator four years ago. His action in this capacity is best indicated by the unanimity with which he received the nomination this time. "J. B. Looney can't be beat" is the expression generally heard.

Edward Hirsch was born at

Wittenberg, Germany, May 3, 1836 and came to America in 1855 and about three years later came to Oregon. He was several years engaged in mercantile business in Dallas, Silverton and this city, having lived here continually since 1868. He was elected state treasurer twice, in 1873 and 1882, serving in that capacity in a manner creditable to himself and the party. He has been city councilman at different times and is now in that position. He is a brother of Hon. S. L. Hirsch, the present U. S. minister to Turkey. He has the respect, confidence and high regard of all who know him and has a liberality and public spirit that are strong factors in the advancement of our county and state.

FOR REPRESENTATIVES.

J. H. Seltzer is an intelligent nurseryman at Woodburn. He is of German extraction, with the good qualities of the Teutonic race predominant in his make up. He will prove a careful legislator with a keen eye for the interest of the farmer.

Wm. Armstrong was born in County Tyrone, Ireland, in 1829, but is so well preserved that he thinks he is only about 40. He learned the trade of shoemaker in the old land and came to New York in 1845 without accompanying kindred or influence, but has made his own way successfully. He came to Oregon in 1870 and settled in Salem, where he still lives. He was elected to the legislature two years ago, after a creditable canvass and his position in that body was characterized by independence and a recognition of the people's rights. At the end of the session he resumed his place as shoemaker in Wm. Brown & Co's, where he pulls was ends successfully.

T. T. Geor is a native of Marion

county, having been born March 12, 1851, within one mile of the farm he now owns in the Waldo hills. He has lived here all his life except from 1866 to 1877, when he resided in Union county. While in that democratic stronghold he had the tenacity to run for the legislature and of course met with defeat. He has had considerable legislative experience, having been elected from this county in 1880 and again in 1888, when he was a terror to democratic stump orators. He will be heard from effectively again this year.

COUNTY COMMISSIONER.

John M. Watson, the county commissioner, is a prosperous farmer of Turner precinct and the strong support he received from all parts of the county in the convention is sufficiently indicative of his general worth and good reputation.

COUNTY SHERIFF.

Native sons of Marion county make good enough timber for a fair share of republican nominations. E. M. Croson was born 35 years ago the 27th of March on the Croson homestead three miles up the river from this city. His father was a German by birth and came to Oregon in 1846 with the Danbar party, who came through by what is known as the Applegate route. Ed. tilled the soil until six years ago, when he was appointed deputy sheriff under John W. Minto, where he served four years. Two years ago he was elected sheriff by a good majority, and there is one fact that will leave him no uneasiness as to this year's result—the people of Marion county know a good officer when they have found him so to be, and do not propose to let him go without just cause.

FOR COUNTY CLERK.

Capt. F. J. Babcock, the nominee for clerk, was born in Caledonia county, Vermont, in 1843. When the civil war broke out he joined the 3d Vermont infantry as a private and carried a musket three years, during which time he was promoted through the various grades to captain, so the title is not an empty one. He came to Salem in 1868 and has lived here continually since, being engaged in the furniture and cabinet making business up to two years ago, when he was elected to the office for which he is now nominated. There is no person who claims that he has been other than a faithful, efficient and obliging officer, and a second term will be his without much question.

COUNTY TREASURER.

A. O. Condit, the man now holding this office and nominated for another term, was one of the youngest county officers in the state when elected two years ago. He is a native of this county, having been born near Aumsville on the 28th of April, 1862. He is a graduate of the State University at Eugene, class of '84, having held a scholarship from this county. His father and other relatives reside on farms near Aum-

ville. Mr. Condit was elected two

years ago by a good majority and has made such a popular officer that he will be treated the same way this time.

COUNTY SURVEYOR.

There are few instances where a young man is elected to an important county office the first year of his majority, yet such was the case with W. J. Culver, the present county surveyor and candidate for re-election. He is now only 23 years old and is also a native of this county, his father, W. B. Culver, being still a respected farmer near Macey. He has a fine education, understands land surveying well and has made a satisfactory record, so much so that he had no opposition in the convention.

FOR CORONER.

Dr. J. S. Stott, the nominee for coroner, is a physician of good practice at Gervais, enjoying the confidence of the community and showing marked intelligence in his intercourse with his fellow-citizens.
