\$180,000 Bribery Unearthed
Among the Tammany Thieves
of New York City.

BRIAL DOUBLE MURDER.

BALTIMORE, Md., May 3.—Mrs. Sarah Blaney, a widow aged 77, and her daughter Caroline, were found murdered in their beds this morning. Their skulls were completely crushed in with some kind of a blunt instrument. William Blaney, a grandson of the old lady has been arrested and robbery is the supposed motive for committing the horrible crime.

THE CUSHING A SUCCESS.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 3.—Commenting on the fast run made from Newport by the new torpedo boat Cushing, Lieutenant Wilson commanding said: "I would not hesitate to say that the Cushing, under favorable conditions, could run 22 knots per hour all day long. I have seen vessels make 24.32 knots, which is equivalent to 28 miles."

CORRUPTION IN NEW YORK.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 3.—The senate committee on cities of which Fassett is chairman, sat again today to hear further developments concerning the workings of the city departments. Mayor Grant was present. Alderman McCann was again put upon the stand and cross-examined. He retold his story about furnishing supplies to the family of his brother-in-law Croker. When questioned as to the date when Croker came to him with the bribe of \$180,000 witness said he could not tell precise date. Croker said to him there were two aldermen whom he wanted to reach. Croker subsequently said he had seen these two aldermen.

"Who were those aldermen?"

Answer: "Pierson and Wendell."

Witness said he had been on best of terms with Croker until Mayor Grant came between them. Witness continued:

"Croker has been misled by his advisors. They are men who hold high positions in this city. I refer to Grant. I think it is a disgrace to this city that a man like Grant should be his mayor."

Said he could make charges which he did not care to put forward voluntarily at present, and that the less those gentlemen have to say the better for themselves.

BALLOT REFORM.

ALBANY, N. Y., May 3.—Governor Hill has approved the ballot reform bill. In his message accompanying it he says in part: "I have steadily opposed every effort to impose unnecessary restriction and impracticable relations on the election system, which would render our elections enormously expensive and vexatious. I have felt constrained to yield my views as to several provisions which, I must still deem imperfect. During all the controversy of the past three years, I have invariably insisted on the right of an elector to prepare his own ballot at home and bring it to the polls with him and vote it, and so long as this bill does not materially infringe on that right, I am content."

THE EDISON TORPEDO BOAT.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 3.—Thoroughly successful test been made of the Semis-Edison Torpedo boat which is operated and controlled from shore by electricity. Boat carries no crew, being controlled entirely by electrical apparatus on shore.

FAREWELL TO MILES.

SAN FRANCISCO, May 3.—A grand farewell reception was tendered last night to Gen. Miles, Admiral Brown and the officers of second cavalry and first artillery, and of U. S. cruiser Charleston, by California commandry of the military order Royal Legion.

DECLINE IN FAILURES.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 3.—Bradstreet's agency reports 78 failures in the Pacific coast states and territories for April, with assets of \$326,000 and liabilities \$575,231, as compared with 106 for previous month.

FIRE LOSS.

CHICO, Cal., May 3.—A fire last night destroyed the residence of Ben Owens, owner of the bank of Chico. Loss, \$1200, insurance \$700. Defective fue was the cause.

WHEAT AND FLOUR.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 3.—The receipts of wheat and flour at this port for April 1890 were 1,065,000 cents of wheat and 125,000 barrels of flour.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.—Senator Beck, of Kentucky, dropped dead in the Baltimore and Potomac railway station in this city at 4 o'clock this morning. He was one of the most prominent, fearless and distinguished of the Southern democrats.

MORE TROOPS IN FRANCE.

PARIS, May 3.—The great strike at Tourcoing has become general, and the strikers are parading streets and stopping all kinds of work. Large reinforcements of troops to quell the rioting have arrived.

RESUME WORK.

DUBLIN, Ireland, May 3.—The striking employees of the Great Southern and the Midland and Great Western railways resumed work to-day on the company's terms upon advice of Archbishop Walsh.

PART OF CREW LOST.

VALPARAISO, Chile, May 3.—A report has been received here that the British ship Inchrae Rock, from San Francisco February 24, for Quezestown when in latitude 55 s, longitude 75 w, experienced very heavy weather during which Captain Armour and four of her crew were washed overboard and drowned.

A BISHOP DEAD.

KALAMAZOO, Mich., May 3.—The Roman Catholic bishop Borgess, of this diocese, who was stricken with paralysis last Sunday, died this morning.

[Right Rev. Caspar H. Borgess was born at Adrup, in the Grand Duchy of Oldenburg, Germany, August 1, 1826. Coming to America in 1854, he made his clerical and philosophical studies in Philadelphia and at St. Charles' seminary. He finished his education at St. Xavier's college, Cincinnati, where he was ordained December 8, 1848. For ten years he was stationed at Columbus, O., being appointed in May, 1859, as rector of St. Peter's cathedral, Cincinnati, where he remained until his promotion to the See of Detroit. He was consecrated titular Bishop of Caledonia and coadjutor April 24th, 1870, and succeeded to the Bishopric of Detroit December 31, 1871. He resigned on April 16, 1887 and has been living in retirement ever since.]

A LATE SESSION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 3.—While Speaker Reed is in favor of expediting the work of congress as possible and adjourning by the 1st of June, there are a number of senators who believe the republicans should make the most of their opportunity and enact into laws all the proposed measures to which they have given their endorsement. Senator Hoar, who has made a survey of the situation, believes that congress will even remain in session till the end of August or beginning of September.

WASHINGTON, May 3.—Senator Paddock presented a pamphlet from the legislative committee of the National Grange continuing their memorial in favor of legislation to prohibit the adulteration of food, gambling in farm products, and the formation and continuation of trusts; also in favor of the re-monetization of silver and a revision of the tariff in the interest of agriculture. The memorial is signed by J. H. Brigham, Delta, O.; L. Rhone, Centrehall, Pa.; John Trimble, Washington, D. C., committee.

A RUPTURED CHURCH.

Exciting Scenes at the Evangelical Conference in Albany Yesterday.

THE STATEMENTS OF BOTH FACTIONS.

A Controversy That Will End
in a Lawsuit for Church
Property.

ALBANY, May 3.—[Herald report.]—At the annual meeting of the conference of the Evangelical church in this city yesterday there occurred a scene which resulted in the complete rupture of the church into two opposing factions. The trouble was simply the carrying of the eastern row in the church into the Oregon conference.

As soon as the church doors were opened an exciting scene was inaugurated. The suspended bishop, Thomas Bowman, at the head of one faction and C. C. Poling, the presiding elder, at the head of the anti-Bowman faction, each made a rush for the chair. Some very loud talking was done, and almost a physical encounter ensued, the majority, with the books and the money in the treasury in their possession, left the church after some half dozen of the ministers had been declared suspended by Bowman, and went to the M. E. church South and held a conference of their own, the others remaining in the Evangelical. As both sides appointed reporters, the statement of both factions is given.

The rupture will probably result in a lawsuit for the possession of the church property.

THE ANTI-BOWMAN FACTION.

The Oregon conference of the Evangelical association as is well known was called to meet in Albany, May 2, 1890. Having received an official notification that Bishop Thomas Bowman had been tried in a disciplinary manner by a committee of 15 elders, in good standing in the church, who, after careful, thorough and impartial investigation of the charges preferred against him, had suspended him from all official functions, this conference was left without a presiding officer. The suspended bishop, however, came to the conference session ignoring the verdict of the committee and determined at all hazards to preside in the face of the fact that a large majority of the conference held that the book of discipline of the church should be respected, wherein it forbids a suspended bishop to perform any official functions.

Ignoring the desire of the conference, he attempted to take the chair, and to accomplish his purpose declared members of the conference suspended, simply because they opposed his plans and stood by their convictions of right and by the law of the church. A majority of the members of the conference, eleven in number, however, organized by electing Rev. J. Bowersox, the pioneer missionary of the church, as president. This man who has labored with great self-sacrifice and unabated zeal for 21 years on the coast was summarily declared suspended because he dared question the suspended bishop's right to preside and lord it over the conference. Not satisfied with this a motion was passed by the bishop and his five adherents that Bowersox with several others be placed under arrest. Seeing that all efforts to have our rights recognized and the discipline of the church respected, we adjourned to hold our conference in the M. E. Church South. Does the public ask why?

1. Two applicants for the ministry were refused examination because they answered in the affirmative when asked whether they believed that Bishop Thomas Bowman had been legally suspended.

2. Two men being appointed by the board of missions to the Oregon conference during the year, and as it is customary for the conference to pay one-half of the traveling expenses of such appointees, the majority of the conference agreed to do so again, provided that two other men with proper credentials, be also received into the conference. To this the ex-bishop's adherents, voting his sentiments, positively refused to agree.

3. Threats were made that several prominent members of this conference would be suspended because they had circulated a religious paper known as the Evangelical, and because they had furnished evidence to the committee that tried and suspended Bishop J. J. Esler. All efforts to learn whether these threats would be carried out were met with such replies as indicated that they would be carried out at any cost.

4. The epithet "Publishing house robbers," applied to us by this would be bishop, we declare to be a base slander, as we demand nothing more than the money appropriated a year ago for services which were rendered during this past year.

These are but a few of the many reasons and facts which we might place before the public, and which have influenced us in taking the position we do.

We ask for nothing but what is right. We demand that our convictions be respected and the laws of our church be obeyed by our church officials, as well as the ministry and the laity, and we know that a thinking public will approve of our course in standing like men for what our consciences

THE OTHER SIDE.

A minister appointed by the Bowman faction furnished their version of the rupture:

One of the most disgraceful scenes ever witnessed took place this morning at the opening of the Oregon annual Evangelical conference. The conference is nearly evenly divided on the present trouble in said church. At the arrival of the hour for the opening of the conference the disaffected members planted themselves at the door of the church, evidently to prevent the bishop taking the chair. When the door was opened there was a rush by that element for the chair. The bishop, representing the church and in full authority of his office was the most fleet-footed, and was the first to reach the chair; but close upon his heels followed C. C. Poling, who stepped on the rostrum and moved that since the bishop was absent that T. S. Lock preside as temporary chairman. The bishop declared that he was there as bishop of the Evangelical association. But in a moment more the most disgusting scene took place, which was only equaled by the authority of the trustees, the bishops withdrawing to the M. E. Church South to hold a rival conference.

The loyal conference, after a painful lull, proceeded with its business. H. I. Bittner was appointed as secretary and L. S. Fisher as assistant.

Northrup, of the Ohio, and J. E. Stoop, of the Indiana conference, were received in the same relation they sustained in their respective conferences.

A. Ernest, M. Burlingame, J. M. Pries and C. M. McElroy were received into the conference.

S. E. Meninger, of the M. E. church, and E. R. Pritchard, of the Presbyterian church, were presented at the conference.

It was resolved that the conference be consolidated into one conference district, and be called the Portland district.

After attending to some minor business the conference adjourned until 2 p. m.

AFTERNOON SESSION.

The bishop regularly opened the session, after which the following resolutions were adopted:

WHEREAS, A number of our brethren withdrew this morning from the conference without any just or reasonable cause, yet as this conference is disposed not to act in any harsh manner, therefore

Resolved, That we recommend that H. J. Bittner and M. Burlingame be appointed a committee to wait on those brethren and in the name of the conference assure them that if they will return to the conference either in a body or as individuals they will be dealt with in a christian spirit and reasonable manner, providing they will return at the opening of this morning's session.

J. F. Catterlin, the photographer, made a fine picture of the band boys yesterday.

Mrs. Prof. Vancisey spent the past week visiting with her parents at Mt. Angel. She returned this morning.

E. J. Brown, accompanied by H. S. Rounds, went out to his home near Turner, last evening. They will spend a day fishing in the mountain streams.

The excursion to Albany by the University band next Saturday is an assured success.

There was a gentleman at the university yesterday from Portland talking very eloquently showing the advantages to be derived if the university should be moved to Portland. It is evident now from the rumors that are current that it would require an effort on the part of the people of Salem to sustain that plan. While Salem has advantages that Portland can never possess, yet there are two sides to the question and there are many arguments in favor of Portland, and she will not be slow in showing them. Salem has not duly appreciated the advantages of the school and may one day have occasion to regret it. Portland sees the value of such an institution and will not let an opportunity pass to secure the prize, and it may be safe to predict that if Salem is not alive to her best interests Portland will carry it off.
