A. D. Gardner has the contract to build our new school house and we learn that he will dispose of his drug store and devote his future life to his trade, he being a thorough stone mason, carpenter and painter, a first class architect and chairman of the school board.

Three churches represented here Methodist, Baptist and Christian all have pastors, the latter has recently employed G. L. Sutherland of Seio, for two Sundays in each month—the Baptist and Christian churches both have flourishing Sunday schools.

We will build considerable the present season. The new buildings will be a town hall, which will be commenced this week and be ready for use by July 4th. This will be built by a joint stock company. Size 30x70, and we are informed that the Whiteaker Mill company has rented it for its monthly bills. This hall will be erected on lots in the beautiful addition recently laid out by Mr. Geo. Holt's.

The Christian Sunday school gave a picnic on May 31 from King's to Mill City. They obtained special rates on the O. P. R. About 125 took in the trip. The Station corner band, with Prof. Hollister as leader, accompanied the school and furnished some choice music at way points and on the grounds. Also F. O. McCauley furnished some fine vocal pieces, being assisted by some fine vocalists from Stayton. The stand was located on Dr. Sill's land in Linn county, overlooking Mill City and the Santiam Lumber Co.'s mammoth mill. We arrived at the grounds about 10 a. m., and after music by the band, adjourned for dinner. On being called to order one hour was devoted to short talks, music, recitations, etc. We then took in Mill City and your reporter jotted down a few items which we will give below. Mill City is located on north bank of the Santiam, about forty miles from Salem on the O. P. R. in the heart of the timber belt, and contains about 250 people, and one of the largest mills in the county is located here. It has unlimited water power, and the mill employs thirty hands, and when the new machinery is put in will add ten more men in timber cutting; fifty men are at work. Amount of lumber cut per day is 50,000 feet; 10,000 shingles; 10 to 12 lath; 2 large planers are run to their full capacity and two others on hand to be put in soon. Taken as a whole, the trip to Mill City was indeed a pleasant one, the citizens of Mill City prepared the grounds and tendered the pioneers a warm reception to which, in behalf of the Stayton Sunday school, we tender them our sincere thanks also to the managers of the O. P. R. and especially to Mr. Stewart, the general traveling ticket agent and to the conductor, we would express our thanks for their kind treatment while on this trip.
