

CASUALTIES AND CRIMES.

A New York Poor House With Seven Inmates Burned.

ITEMS OF EUROPEAN AFFAIRS.

Great Frauds Committed on a Massachusetts Estate.—Other Important News.

FATAL FLAMES.

BINGHAMPTON, N. Y., May 8.—A special dispatch from Norwich, Chenango county, brings the news that the poor house burned last night. The loss is a total one and seven inmates burned to death. The report is that the fire started in the insane department.

The poor house insane department and a large barn are completely destroyed. All the departments were crowded with inmates and but for hard work on the part of the keepers the loss of life would have been terrible. The total loss is \$300,000.

The names of the dead discovered are: Sarah Mills, Sarah Gallagher, Sarah Bailey, Laura Gray, Della Benedict, Deborah Dibble, Mary Ann Dibble, Lucy Warren, Amelia Atwood. Great difficulty was experienced in attempting to rescue the poor creatures, many of them old and feeble, others wild with terror. It was no easy task and a great wonder is so many were rescued. The people went at it haphazard, appalled by the awfulness of the cries and groans of inmates and the magnitude of the catastrophe. Two women, idiots, are burned but their names cannot yet be given. A session of the board of supervisors will be held to-night, in order that immediate provision may be made for the exposed inmates. The city marshal has sworn in a large number of deputies and is searching for the missing. The number of dead may possibly reach thirteen.

FRAUD ON AN ESTATE.

SALEM, Mass., May 8.—Litigation involving \$1,500,000 and the reputations of three executors of the will of Thomas W. Pierce, of Topsfield, Mass., who died in '85, was opened in the supreme judicial court to-day. Eight legatees' names in the will claim the executors have not been faithful in the discharge of their duties and ask for their removal.

PRATT NOT GUILTY.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 8.—The jury in the case of George C. Pratt, charged with an assault with intent to murder for shooting L. L. Bromwell, president of the California Insurance company last January, has returned a verdict to-day of not guilty.

FINED FOR LIBEL.

NEW YORK, N. Y., May 8.—O'Donovan Ressa recently convicted of criminal libel was to-day fined \$100.

AFTER THE MONOPOLY.

COLUMBUS, O., May 8.—To-day Attorney General Watson has brought suit to take from the Standard Oil Co., its charter for isolation of laws of the State in various ways. The petition refers to General State laws against monopolies, and cites the fact that the Standard Oil Co. had forfeited its right by going into the Standard Oil trust of New York.

THE FASTEST AFOAT.

PHILADELPHIA, Pa., May 8.—The new steel cruiser Philadelphia has returned from her trial cruise with a record which promises that in her official trip she will prove one of the fastest war vessels afloat. The main object of this trial was to see that all machinery worked smoothly. Captain Steele threw his log at frequent intervals during the trial and the result gave the cruiser a maximum speed of 20.74 knots per hour. This speed was obtained with 118 revolutions per minute of the twin screws, under a head of steam of 115 pounds.

THE STRIKERS IN FRANCE.

PARIS, May 8.—Twenty thousand strikers who have been conducting riotous and forcible demonstrations at Roubaix have resumed work and the May Day strike is practically ended.

LONDON, May 8.—O'Brien has refused a new trial in his libel suit against Salisbury. On the first trial a verdict was returned for Salisbury.

GOLD IN CORK COUNTY.

DUBLIN, May 8.—The Irish Times says that rich gold mines have been discovered at Dunmore, in the western part of the county of Cork.

CONGRESSIONAL.

Debate on the McKinley Tariff Bill Continued.

\$10,000,000 OFF ON INTERNAL REVENUE.

Miscellaneous News of To-day From All Parts of the World.

THE DEBATE YESTERDAY.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—Mr. McKinley's speech in continuing to outline the republican tariff policy was a great success. He declared that the proposed bill did not propose to abolish internal revenue taxes, but did abolish all special taxes. It does not reduce the tax on tobacco. This reduces internal taxation \$10,000,000. The bill creates more liberal draw backs on imported raw material when used in exported manufactures. This practically dispenses of the free raw material question. The bill would shut out \$25,000,000 of Canadian farm products and make that much better market for American farmers.

MR. MILLS MADE A SPEECH IN REPLY EMPLOYING THE USUAL FREE TRADE ARGUMENTS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—The republican senatorial caucus this morning was very largely attended. The silver question was again the subject of excited discussion and again no agreement was reached. The silver men refuse to support any bill containing a clause which will permit the redemption of notes bullion under any conditions. They demand that silver bullion certificates be made redeemable at par by the government in any lawful currency or coin.

IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., May 8.—In the senate to-day special consideration of the silver bill has by unanimous consent been postponed until next Monday when it is to be taken up and not be laid down again until final action is had.

WOOLEN TARIFF.

WASHINGTON, May 8.—The senate has passed without amendment the house bill, providing for new classification of worsted goods as wooleens. It now goes to the president for signature.

CIVIL SERVICE REFORM.

NEW YORK, May 8.—The state civil service reform association held its annual meeting here. President George Wm. Curtis credited President Harrison with good intentions, while condemning first assistant Postmaster General Clarkson for having made 30,000 removals for political reasons, more than administrations ever before had made in the same length of time.

POOR CROPS.

SERASTOL, Cal., May 8.—The prospect for a grain crop here is very gloomy. Vine pruning is usually completed by Feb. 20th, but some vines are still unpruned on account of the wet and cold condition of the soil. The railroad is just finished here from Santa Rosa.

A COAST LINE ROAD.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 8.—A proposition to build a coast line railroad from Portland, Oregon, to Lower California is at present occupying the attention of a syndicate of capitalists on the Pacific coast. Albert Houghton, of San Francisco, is the leader of the syndicate.

STATE AFFAIRS.

Showing of Polk County Finances Very Good.

TWO LITTLE GIRLS DROWN AT ALBINO.

Murder in Self-Defense Near Pendleton.—The Preliminary Hearing To-day.

POLK COUNTY FINANCES.

DALLAS, Or., May 8.—The semi-annual report of Polk county finances just made public shows expenditures, \$10,920.58; unpaid warrants and interest, \$20,583.80; received for taxes in six months ending April 1, \$19,609; taxes unpaid on that date, \$30,066.53; cash on hand, \$10,547.79. The showing of county finances is a very healthy one.

TWO GIRLS DROWNED.

PORTLAND, May 8.—Two girls named McDonald, aged 9 and 12 years, fell off the trestle over Montgomery slough in Albino, yesterday and were drowned.

The girls were playing on the trestle, and, seeing a train approaching they became frightened and in their attempt to seek a place of safety, fell off the trestle into the water some twenty feet below. When the bodies were found about an hour afterward they were clasped tightly in each other's arms.

The little three-year-old sister of the unfortunate girls was on the bridge, but succeeded in getting out of the way of the train.

THE VENSON MURDER.

PENDLETON, May 8.—R. A. Moody, who shot and killed John McElrath at Venson, is in custody awaiting examination, which occurs to-day having come to town and surrendered. Moody claims he acted in self-defense. He is postmaster and merchant at Venson. The cause of the shooting was supposed to be complimentary remarks made by Moody about Miss Leona Peterson, the young woman with whom McElrath kept company. He denies that he made the remark attributed to him. He has resided in the country several years and is known as a peaceful and honorable man.

BISHOP BOWMAN.

Defends Himself in the Oregonian in a Vigorous Manner.

PORTLAND, Or., May 8.—Bishop Bowman, who has just returned from presiding over the Albany conference, has this communication in this morning's Oregonian:

THE DEPOSED BISHOP.

Whereas rumors have been industriously circulated on this coast, that the undersigned, who has been one of the Evangelical church for fifteen years, had been "suspended" from his official functions, a brief explanation ought probably be given to the public in justification of myself and those who have acted with me.

The general conference of our church, which is composed of delegates elected by the different annual conferences is the highest tribunal in the church. Its decision on all questions is authoritative and final, there being no higher court of appeal. This body fully represents the church, its delegates being elected by ballot in accordance to the numerical strength of the conference represented. The last session of this body was held in 1887, in Buffalo, New York. With the findings of the same, in a certain case coming up for adjudication, a number of delegates were dissatisfied, and instead of accepting its decision and working peacefully in harmony with the church, organized an independent publishing company, and have since published a paper of their own, in opposition to the official publication of the church. In this paper fierce assaults have been made upon the general conference, and especially upon the officers elected by that body, but more particularly against me.

This paper continued its assaults upon me and my character so persistently, and in such coarse and vulgar language, that it was believed to be necessary to make an inquiry into the correctness of their assertions, in accordance with the directions of the discipline of our church. This court, after a thorough examination, gave me the following verdict:

"As a result of our investigation, made agreeably with the foregoing facts, we state:

1. That we are fully convinced that said rumors and accusations, one and all, are unfounded and utterly unjust.

2. That there is therefore no cause whatever for any further investigation or trial of Bishop Bowman concerning such rumors or accusations."

These proceedings in accordance with the law of our church, as well as the generally accepted law, that a person can be tried on the same charges but once, ended all further proceedings until the next general conference, to which I am amenable, and which meets in 1891.

However, the dissatisfied faction above mentioned, notwithstanding the above legal proceedings, constituted another court of individuals in sympathy with their ends and purposes and cited me for trial upon the very same accusations from which I had been fully exonerated. I took no notice whatever of their proceedings. I could not have done

so even if I were personally inclined, as I had no right to set aside the findings of a legal ecclesiastical court, whether favorable or unfavorable to me but must abide by the verdict rendered until reversed by a higher court.

Since this sham trial has been held, the findings of which I have only discovered by reports published in the public press, not having received from the so-called trial conference any notice of their action, a large number of annual conferences have been held, all of which denounced the illegal action of these parties in strong language, as a gross slander upon me and an outrage upon the church. Two of the participants having been suspended from all their official functions, and one deposed from office and expelled from the church, by the annual conferences of which they were members. Moreover, these conferences, since in session, have unqualifiedly endorsed me in my position, and requested me to proceed in my work, and give no heed whatever to the so-called suspension. This I have been doing, and shall continue to do.

It was our purpose to avoid all friction in our local societies as much as possible, guarding, of course, all property rights, until our general conference has decided the question at issue. A large majority of the annual conferences having already given expression to their sentiments it is easy to foresee what that decision will be. At any rate, my mind is quite calm and undisturbed, while, however, I very much regret the trouble the "seceders" have given themselves and us, and our people.
