It proved a free show of a rather undesirable kind.

A number took possession of the street car at Albany and having chartered that only vehicle of transport in the city, flew out to all the spacious suburbs at the furious pace maintained by a standard-well rule. THE OPENING GUN ON THE TARIFF.

Hon. John Minto's able article on the tariff and the farmers, which appears in this paper is dedicated to the republican press of Oregon, and they are at liberty to copy it. It should appear in every paper in Oregon that favors the protective tariff policy of the republican party. We feel a just degree of pride in having among our citizens a man who has the ability to handle this question as Mr. Minto does, and who is at the same time himself from the ranks of the toilers, having begun life as an English miner, and who is a practical farmer. His words ought to have some weight with laboring men and farmers.

The election this year in Oregon is both state and national. The most important seats to be filled are those of congressman and United States senator, and it is important that Oregon speak out as plainly for protection as she did two years ago when the state gave Harrison nearly ten thousand majority. The congress then elected has fairly got to work and the republican tariff bill now under discussion will probably not be enacted into law before the Oregon election is held June 2. This makes the verdict of Oregon all important. A republican defeat will be a check upon the good work so well begun and will be a detriment to the industries of the nation now on the point of being revived into wholesome prosperity, alone possible under a firm republican policy. A protective tariff on wool, hops, fruit and farm products generally, is of vital importance to Oregon. Let Oregon voters sustain it June 2.
