WORK BEGINS.

The work of decorating the ground around the state capitol, to be continued through the morning.

Mr. Coote, the landscape gardener from the Agricultural college at Corvallis, was in the city with his plans for work, and a man was secured to stake out the ground in accordance therewith, and has been engaged setting pegs for the outlines of walks, flower beds, etc. The first important work and one that was essential to beauty, was the tearing down of the old fence, which is being done, and that alone throws a pleasing air of improvement around the premises. So much is this apparent that the next move will be directed at the fence around the avenue. Mr. Coote returned to Corvallis by the 11 o'clock train and is ready to respond at any time to call of the secretary of state to direct the progress of the required work.

CONTROL THE DOGS.

Salem is getting overrun with an immense number of many cur dogs that bark at teams and foot passengers; attack and worry the decent bird dogs and cattle dogs going along with their masters or minding their own business; tearing women and children and making general nuisances of themselves. Wouldn't it be a good scheme to have a law licensing dogs and have the law enforced? In that case a man with a good dog would pay his license and be responsible for him, while the owners of worthless or vicious animals would fall to take out licenses and these would soon go to the bone yard. This matter is worthy the consideration of the council and should be talked up.

SATURDAY'S SHOW.

Next Saturday, the 17th, the big show of blooded horse stock is to take place in this city, and the promise of the continuance of fine weather, which is now apparent, insures a large attendance. There is no part of the Coast in which more attention has been paid the past few years to the improvement in the breeds of horses, than right here in Marion county, and the result is, you can scarcely find a scrub colt under three years old anywhere in the county. There are very few cities in the West upon whose streets can be seen so many fine roadsters, carriage horses of grace and beauty, and draft horses handsome and powerful as are seen in Salem. Then, surely, a properly conducted colt show ought to be a good exhibition in such a city.

THE CONGREGATIONAL SOCIAL.

The receipts at the literary and musical social last night footed up to nearly \$40 gross. The literary part of the program was well presented. Miss May Boice read in an effective manner that shows her capable of expressing herself with true feeling and dramatic force. Miss Long's renditions were up to her old standard of excellence and she is always welcome before a Salem audience, rendering a difficult scene from "Ingomar," and several lighter productions. The floral decorations were very rich and tasty, and the refreshments were served with great neat.

RICKETY BRIDGES.

The bridges across the south mill race on Winter street, both the footwalk and wagon bridge are in a very unsafe condition, and unless repaired soon there is danger of an accident. The sidewalks in that neighborhood, the crosswalks and the crossing of the railroad track are all in a horrible shape, and the extensive travel constantly on that street suffers a large amount of inconvenience and discomfort.
