OUR STREET RAILWAY CO.

The System to be Much Improved Under the New Management.

A meeting of the stockholders of the Salem Street Railway Co. was held last evening at the office of the State Insurance company, for the purpose, as was announced, of a dissolution of the company. As is generally known, the company is in need of funds, and the meeting was called to induce the stockholders to subscribe pro rata to meet the needs or sell the remaining \$10,000 of unissued stock at par.

The present debt is about as follows:

Mortgage	\$15,000
Overdrafts	1,200
Horses etc.	500
Total	\$16,700

In addition to this, the following expenditures will be necessary to put the property into the best condition for profitable work:

3 additional cars	\$3,000
10 horses	1,000
Extra grounds at barn	500
Feed for 1 year	2,000
Repairs needed	500
Total	\$7,000

The total value of the plant, with above improvements, franchises, etc., is estimated at \$40,000, hence it cannot be looked upon as poor property. However, it will take considerable time and good management to put it in shape to be considered a paying investment. On the other hand, if our city continues to grow at its present rate, the franchise alone will be worth more than the present entire valuation. As the stock is non-assessable, the only way funds can be raised among the present stockholders is by subscription or sale of new stock, but as the latter can only be sold at par it is liable to prove slow sale.

A committee was appointed to notify all stock holders to be present at a meeting to be held at the Insurance office next Thursday evening at 7:30, to devise some means of raising the further needed funds.

Dr. Minthorn, who is now president of the company, says the service will be kept up and improved at all hazards. The Oregon Land Co., of which he is also president, owns a majority of the present stock, and he says they will take as much pride in keeping the road up and making it a credit to Salem, as they do in their real estate business. No new lines can be built while the company is in debt, but the tracks are being improved, and as soon as the new cars arrive, the old ones will be repaired.

BIG FIRE AT SCIO.

Nearly all the Business Part of the Town in Ashes.

Word was received to-day by Mr. H. A. Johnson, Jr., from A. J. Johnson, who has a store at that place that the business part of the town of Scio was almost entirely destroyed by fire. The dispatch says: "All from the brick store to the hardware store on the west side of the street." This we believe includes all the business houses but two. Mr. Johnson says they saved their stock, but with some damage.
