MEMORIAL DAY

Orders from Headquarters Sedgwick Post No. 10.

GENERAL ORDER NO. 2.

Sedgwick Corps No. 1, W. R. C., and Sumpter Camp No. 8, S. O. V., and all Union soldiers and sailors are invited to participate with us in attending by our presence our respect for our fallen comrades and our devotion to the cause for which they died.

In obedience to National and Department Orders, Memorial Day, Friday, May 30th, 1890, will be observed with appropriate ceremonies by this Post. Let each Comrade so conduct himself on that day as to reflect credit upon the Grand Army of the Republic and the brave men whose memory we delight to honor.

The 2nd Commander requests a full attendance of the Comrades and desires that each Comrade make an effort to bring out every old soldier on that occasion. The Post will assemble at 1 o'clock p. m., sharp, and the head of the column will move promptly at 2 o'clock p. m.
