BEATS ALL PREVIOUS RECORDS.

A Breezy Chat With the Champion Globe-Trotter.—How He Made Time.

NEW YORK, May 18.—Psycho has arrived. It only took him fifty-nine days to come from Tacoma by way of the antipodes.

Citizen Train has a story to tell, and he told it yesterday with a verve and snap which made his hearers tingle for some of the same electric experience.

He arrived at two o'clock this morning by the steam ship Eturia, and when he awoke two hours later he found a tug bobbing in the bay with a party of his friends aboard ready to take him ashore.

"Just in time to see the grand smash," he ejaculated. "Who's dictator?" When informed that the country was still safe he shook his own hands with everybody a Chinese and fell chatting.

"You know all about my leaving Tacoma," he said. "Of course, the whole country knew it. Then began my adventures. I intended to take the General Werder for Hongkong, but they told me that I had missed her by two days.

"I saw it was a special train of nothing, and so I went to our Consul, Clarence Greathouse, and said: 'Look here, Greathouse, I must have a special and get a passport right away.' 'Must?' He laughed at me, and told me it was impossible to get one in less than three days.

"Who can give it to me?" I asked. "The Micado," he replied. "All right," I said, shooting out of the door, "I'm off for Tokio."

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PACIFIC COAST NEWS.

Details of the Destructive Fire at Scio.

CHINESE BOUND FOR THE U. S.

Pacific Coast State News of Importance.—Other News.

DESTRUCTIVE FIRE AT SCIO. ALBANY, Or., May 21.—Later details from the fire at Scio show that the fire broke out at 2:30 in the morning in the rear of Mrs. Smith & Co's millinery store in Scio, which was quickly communicated to adjoining buildings and destroyed nearly all the buildings in the block, entailing a loss of about \$18,000.

The losses and insurance are as follows: Mrs. Smith & Co., store and millinery stock, \$3,000; no insurance. S. M. Townsend, grocery store, \$3,000; fully insured. S. M. Daniel, building, \$500. Edward Goin, building, \$500. L. Mayer, bakery, \$1000; no insurance. Motley & Carey, saddlery; building \$600, stock \$650; insurance on stock, \$600. Bilyeu & Shelton, saloon, \$2000; no insurance. Johnson, Hibler & Co., loss by removal of merchandise stock, \$500; no insurance. Gill & Smith, damage to stock, \$1000; no insurance.

The fire burned all the buildings on the west side of Main street, between Johnson & Hibler's dry goods store and Gill & Smith's hardware store. The citizens of Scio, aided by the political candidates who were in the city on the canvass, worked hard and saved much property. The fire is thought to have been of incendiary origin.

H. Brenner's smoke house was robbed of \$75 worth of hams and bacon during the fire.

Citizens of Scio say the burned block will be rebuilt of brick at once.

CHINESE FOR THE U. S. CITY OF MEXICO, May 21.—News is received here that the steamer Corrigan brought 111 Chinamen to Guaymas yesterday, probably bound for the United States. Guaymas is the port of entry and it is believed thousands of Chinese from there have been shipped over the border.

IMPROVING DALLAS. DALLAS, Or., May 21.—Last night the city council ordered a portion of the electric lights to be discontinued. A move was begun to have the streets cleared of posts and extensions of walks into the streets. It was the opinion of all the councilmen that the streets are not like unto a 40-acre lot, intended for accumulating of wagons, hacks, plows, harrows, wood, hop poles, etc., etc., and Councilmen Greaves and Plummer were appointed a committee to see that an ordinance was drawn by the next meeting requiring the streets to be kept clear; and also an ordinance for licensing Chinese washhouses.

SAILS WITH SEALED ORDERS. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., May 21.—U. S. Steamer Charlestown, Capt. Geo. C. Remy, commanding, left port to-day under sealed orders, her ostensible destination being Honolulu.

SILVER BOW SHERIFF. HELENA, MONT., May 21.—The supreme court to-day decided the Silver Bow county sheriff's contest in favor of John E. Lloyd, the republican.

NEW RAILROAD DEAL. NEWYORK, May 21.—All Wall street is talking to-day about the big railroad deal by which Atchison is to obtain possession of the St. Louis and San Francisco, and consequently of the Atlantic and Pacific, thereby securing a line which will eventually be extended to San Francisco.
