NEWS OF TO-DAY.

Council of German Catholic Societies in Milwaukee.

STAGNATION IN THE CATTLE TRADE.

Important News Condensations From all Parts of the World.

THE CATHOLIC SOCIETIES.

MILWAUKEE, Wis., May 27.—In the convention of the German Catholic societies this morning H. J. Spannhorst of St. Louis said the Bennett law presented a political question Catholics could not ignore, because it directly affected the welfare of their institutions. Bishop Flasch in an address referred to the Bennett law. He upheld the rights of the church to go into politics when its interests were attacked. He was followed by Bishop Katzer of Green Bay, who attacked the Bennett law in the bitterest manner. He said the law practically denied the right of Chili to obey its parents by putting its claims before those of parents. "This Bennett law," Bishop continued, "is conceived in the minds of free thinkers and those opposed to the Catholic church and her schools." "I was told recently," he said, "by a mason, that the Bennett law first suggested by the mason in the Grand Lodge of Masons in the state of Wisconsin." In closing he urged his hearers to oppose all measures like the Bennett law to the best of their ability and stand firmly by the church.

THE CATTLE TRADE.

NEW YORK, May 27.—The shipments of American cattle to Europe alive and dead last week amounted to 15,000 head, a falling off of 25 per cent. from the week before, at the low estimate of \$30 per head. These shipments represent a clear loss of \$45,000 to exporters. Never before has there been such demoralization among shippers. One shipper offered \$30,000 to cancel his contracts with one line. Shippers also fear that parliament will pass a law placing a duty on cattle to protect English cattle men.

NEWS FROM MEXICO.

CITY OF MEXICO, May 27.—Financial circles are agitated from apprehension as to what may be done with the silver bill in the United States senate. The Mexican press simultaneously takes up the discussion of the filibustering scheme against Lower California. The conservative journals are making the affair an excuse for attacks against Americans.

THREATENS TO SQUEAL.

BINGHAMTON, N. Y., May 27.—In the judgment of citizens the shortage in the accounts of C. A. Thompson, cashier of the Oswego National

Bank, is \$75,000, others state that it will not exceed \$20,000. He speculated in stocks and declares if pushed to the wall he will expose two of Oswego's most substantial citizens implicated in the shortage.

CONDENSED TELEGRAMS.

At Omaha, Neb., Bishop James O'Connor of the Catholic diocese of Omaha, died this morning, aged 66. The congressional conference on the general pension bill had another meeting to-day, but accomplished nothing and adjourned until Monday.

The President has sent the senate the following nominations for U. S. consuls, Counsellors Wildman, Idaho, Singapore; Samuel L. Gracey, Mass. Chow Chow, China.

President Harrison has directed the secretary of war to take prompt and effective measures toward bringing to punishment the Apache Indians concerned in the killing of Robert Hardie.

At New York this afternoon John Keegan, of '84 Boodle alderman, potter, walked into the district attorney's office, and surrendered himself. He had been in Canada since indicted. Bail was given at \$4,000.

At Jackson, Miss., Mr. A. N. Kimball, receiver of public money, was murdered last night on his way home. His body was found this morning, and it is supposed that the crime was committed for the purpose of robbery.

Dr. Ruggles a member of the California state board of health called upon the surgeon general at Washington to have quarantine established along the Arizona border to prevent the coming into the country from Mexico of persons suffering from contagious diseases.

At Saratoga in the Presbyterian General Assembly this morning the report of the committee on narratives showed the total number of communicants to be over 586,000, a gain during the year of 103,000. The benevolent contributions to all causes are not less than \$13,000.

Warrants for teachers' salaries now signed by the board. Several matters of importance to the district were discussed, when the board adjourned, to meet on Saturday next, at 2 p. m.
