GRAND OLD MARION.

The Republicans Make a Clean Sweep.



THE GRANGERS DO IT.

The Election Returns up to Hour of
Going to Press—Comments.

The returns are coming in very slowly, but sufficient is known to permit a statement that the Republicans carry the state ticket except Governor. Governor Penneyer has received the almost solid support of the granger vote, and undoubtedly received the organized labor vote of Portland and other large cities. The Democratic candidate also received the united support of the Union party. The two parties made great sacrifices of all the rest of their tickets to get votes for Penneyer and have undoubtedly succeeded in electing him. The indications are that the legislature will be strongly Republican in both branches and that the Republican state ticket is safely elected, except Governor.

IN SALEM
The working republicans of Salem made a grand and successful rally of the full strength of the party here. The Democrats and Union men worked hard, too; but the capital city was splendidly organized, and no better work was ever done. They have set a splendid example again to the rest of the state. Besides displaying loyal republicanism—giving the whole ticket nearly 400 majority in the city—the republicans laid down all personal differences in devotion to the city's local interest. They felt that in working for Mr. Thompson they were working for Salem, and in doing their level best to defeat Penneyer they were not risking any loss to this city whatever. It was a splendid invitation to Mr. Thompson to come and reside at Salem. The republicans of Salem can be relied upon to stand by Salem interests.

ELECTION RETURNS.

Republicans Still Claim a Clean Sweep.

DEMOCRATS CONCEDE STATE TICKET

But Claim Penneyer's Election By 500 to 1,000 Majority.

THE ELECTION.

PORTLAND, June 3.—The count in this city will not be finished until this afternoon. It is necessarily slow owing to the great amount of scratching. Indications are that the republican majority in Multnomah county will not be large. Thompson running behind his ticket. Reports from over the state are scattered. The republicans still claim Thompson's election. The democrats concede the election of the republican state ticket, with the exception of Penneyer, whom they claim to be elected by a majority ranging from 500 to 1,000. The democrats also claim election of two or three on legislative ticket.

BENTON COUNTY.

CORVALLIS, June 3.—Ten precincts out of twenty-one give Penneyer 224 majority. Indications at present point to the election of the entire republican and legislative ticket. Penneyer's majority for Governor over Thompson in this county is 249, with 7 precincts to hear from. Hermann's majority over Miller 140, 7 precincts to hear from. Republicans will elect balance of state by 75 to 100 majority. Republicans will elect entire county ticket with exception of Treasurer and assessor. The vote on sheriff is very close.

JACKSON COUNTY.

JACKSONVILLE, June 3.—From careful estimates the democratic majorities on the state ticket will be about as follows: R. Miller 325; Penneyer 265; Webb 225; Townsend 200; LeRoy 175; O'Brien 220; Bonham 200. On the county ticket the democrats concede the election of the following republicans; Senator, Cameron; Representatives, McCall, Merritt, County Clerk Muller, Sheriff Birdseye and Assessor Hamilton.

FROM ARLINGTON.

ARLINGTON, Or., June 3.—227 votes were cast in this precinct which were distributed as follows: State ticket, Hermann 146, Miller 79; Bean 139, Bonham 88; Thompson 121, Penneyer 105; McBride 133, Townsend 88; Metcahan 143, Webb 84.

MALHEUR COUNTY.

VALE, Or., June 3.—Comparatively large vote polled in Malheur county the main fight was on local offices. The whole republican ticket carried in this county by majorities of from two votes to 125. This estimate is based on very close calculations.

LINN COUNTY.

ALBANY, Or., June 3.—Latest returns indicate that Penneyer's majority will be about 700.

PORTLAND, Or., June 3.—Dispatch from Albany says; Linn Co. will give Penneyer seven hundred majority.

LANE COUNTY.

EUGENE, June 3.—Complete returns in Lane county show that eleven precincts give Hermann 900, Miller 764; Thompson 880, Penneyer 880.

YAMHILL COUNTY.

McMINNVILLE, Or., June 3.—Republicans elect entire county ticket, except Judge. Thompson's majority will be about 65.

THE LATEST.

PORTLAND, Or., June 3.—Hermann's majority in the state is estimated at from 9,000 to 8,000. A majority of the republican state central committee concede the election of Penneyer by from 500 to 1,000. The remainder of the republican state ticket is elected by from 5,000 to 7,000.

VERY LATEST FROM PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, June 3.—At this hour 230 P. M. returns are very incomplete but enough have been received to assure the election of Hermann by at least 6 thousand, and probably 8,000 majority. The entire republican state ticket with exception of governor is elected, by majorities ranging from 5 to 7 thousand.

The returns are slow about coming in favor Penneyer and his majority will certainly reach one thousand and may reach two thousand vote in this city is close on Governor, though count so far gives Thompson small majority. In this county the entire county ticket is elected with exception of two of legislative ticket. Both branches of legislature are republican beyond doubt.

NO FREE TRADE WANTED IN AMERICA

A Pittsburg Labor Convention Demands a General Advance of Wages.

NO FREE TRADE FOR US.

BRUSSELS, June 3.—All delegates to Anti-Slavery conference except those representing United States formally adhered to the Congo tariff as defined by the convention.

LABOR CONVENTION

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 3.—The annual convention of the Amalgamated association of iron and steel workers opened this morning. There are about 280 delegates from all parts of the country present. The most important matter to be considered is the adoption of the new schedule of wages; a general advance will doubtless be demanded all along the line.

CENSUS VIOLATION.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—Census Supt. Porter to-day called the attention of the department of justice to violations reported to him of two sections of the census law. One imposes a penalty for refusing to answer census questions. The other penalty for the refusal on the part of enumerators to perform their duties after taking oath. Up to noon to-day he received information of 25 cases of persons in different parts of the country who refuse to furnish any information, and it is Porter's intention to prosecute with all vigor violations of law reported him.

THE KEMMLER CASE.

BUFFALO, N. Y., June 3.—In the general term of the supreme court the decision of Underwood of Auburn, in the Kemmler habeas corpus case was affirmed. This allows the case to go at once to the court of appeals. The only question is whether Kemmler can be legally executed by the warden of Auburn prison.

CANADIAN PACIFIC.

NEW YORK, June 3.—It is reported that negotiations are practically completed for the absorption of the " Soo " line by the Canadian Pacific. This line from Sault Ste. Marie through St. Paul to Boynton Dakota 800 miles. If the Canadian Pacific absorbs this road it will doubtless renew the subject lately discussed in congress of rights of Canadian railroad in this country.

CONGRESSIONAL NOMINATIONS.

PITTSBURG, Pa., June 3.—Hon. T. M. Bayne, congressman from the 23d district, filed a re-nomination to-day. Col. Wm. A. Stone, ex-U. S. district attorney, was nominated in 22d district. Hon. John Dalzell was also re-nominated.

BELL DISMISSED.

WASHINGTON, June 3.—John S. Bell, chief of the Secret Service having failed to comply with the request for his resignation, has been dismissed. His successor has not yet been selected.

NEW GUN BOAT.

CHESTER, Pa., June 3.—U. S. Gunboat Bennington, was launched at the Reach's ship yard at noon to-day.

THE MURDER TRIAL.

McMINNVILLE, June 3.—The trial of Wm. Scott for the murder of his wife in February, was begun at one o'clock to-day.
