The horse became excited and got Mr. Rankin's buggy into the ditch, upsetting it and breaking it about \$50 worth. Mr. Rankin and son, were both thrown out, and the young man is pretty badly hurt. Mr. Rankin's bad luck was to be in between the other two rigs, and all were driving at a good gallop.

ADVERTISING.—The resources and advantages of Salem are to be further advertised to the extent of \$500 a month. The subscription of last year ends July 1st, and are now to be renewed. The advertising committee are canvassing the city and should meet with good success. At the meeting next Friday evening there should be a full attendance, as the election of a permanent salaried secretary will then be decided upon. An energetic and faithful man to conduct the advertising department and properly scatter about \$5000 worth of literature will pay this city well.

ACCIDENT.—On election day an old man was struck on the forehead by a plowman while walking on State street. The plow was standing up on the side-walk and fell of its own accord, and the old gentleman was pretty badly hurt. The cut bled a good deal and he had to get a basin of cold water to wash it away. This should be a good lesson against lumbering up the sidewalks with wax of all kinds. There is an ordinance against this and it is time some of these ordinances were enforced.

TELEPHONE.—A representative of the Sunset Telephone Co. is in the city arranging for an extension and completion of a first-class exchange. Forty-foot poles will be used and that will put most of the wires above the shade trees and free from contact with moisture which interferes so much with successful telephoning. Work on the line to Portland will begin next week, and the purpose is to make a system so perfect that a pin dropped at one end of the line can be heard at the other.

POSTAL TELEGRAPH.—This company showed enterprise in accommodating the citizens at the Capital with election returns. Special wires were run to the Chemekete hotel, the Favorite cigar store, and the Pacific cigar factory, democratic headquarters. Dispatches were received direct from Portland on the night after election day up to about an hour after midnight, and posted on bulletins for the public. The same was done Tuesday until about noon when the contest was over.
