The Marquis De Mores as An-
archist.

THREATENED REVOLUTIONS IN FRANCE

The Duke of Orleans Issues a
Manifesto and is Again Ex-
iled from France.

EXCITEMENT IN FRANCE.

PARIS, France, June 5.—Excite-
ment is great in France over the
simultaneous appearance of two of
the stormiest characters in the
world's history, the Marquis De
Mores and the Duke of Orleans. They
are both daring agitators and have a
great following. It will require the
greatest vigilance on the part of the
government to keep them in sub-
jugation the Anarchist elements
that seem to flame into activity at
the slightest word of their leaders.

DE MORES AS ANARCHIST.

PARIS, France, June 5.—The
Marquis De Mores and Anarchist
Vallee, who were both accused of
exciting Parisians to rise on May 1st,
and who were sentenced, one to
three months, and the other to one
month imprisonment, were again
placed under arrest last night.

PUBLISHED A MANIFESTO.

The Duke of Orleans, who has
again been exiled from France, has
sent to the Duke De Castles requesting
him to publish the following ad-
dress: "To Conscription of my class:
Dear comrades,—I had asked to
serve my three years as a soldier and
the only reply has been to condemn
me to two years of imprisonment. I
did not complain. Before the end
of my term of imprisonment, I have
been taken to the frontier. My par-
don restores me to the sorrows of
exile; the only change is in the
nature of my captivity.

My resolutions remain unbroken.
Nothing will make me renounce my
ardent hope of serving our country.
Keep me the place which I de-
sired in the ranks in your midst,
near the flag, and I will come one
day and occupy it. Yours, for God
and for France, Philip, Duke of
Orleans."

CHANCELLOR CAPRIVI HURT.

BERLIN, June 5.—Chancellor Cap-
rivi was thrown from his horse
and slightly hurt to-day. Rumors
stating that he was seriously injured
caused agitation on the Bourse.

FAVORING ARBITRATION.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—
Secretary of State received a dispatch
from the U. S. legation at Rio
Janelo announcing that the cabinet
had passed a resolution enthusiastically
approving the action of the in-
ternational American conference in
recommending arbitration in all
questions of difference between the
several governments of America.

The Bill Pushed to Immediate
Action.

SILVER ADVANCES TO \$1.03 PER OUNCE

The Previous Question to be
Ordered on Satur-
day.

REPUBLICAN CAUCUS.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—
The republican members of congress
went into caucus last night upon
adjournment, to consider a free silver
bill.

Congressman McKinley came to
the front with a compromise propo-
sition. He proposed the treasurer
purchase \$4,500,000 worth of Ameri-
can silver each month; that certifi-
cates in payment thereof shall be
full legal tender quality, redeema-
ble in lawful money and silver bullion
may be coined to meet the de-
mands for redemption. His propo-
sition to fund is a feature of the
Dorsey bill, and also the
provision that when gold and
silver reach par there shall be free
coinage. It omits the bullion re-
demption provision of the caucus
bill and was therefore immediately
assailed by several members on that
account. A vote was taken, result-
ing in its insertion in the McKinley
substitute.

When the caucus adjourned there
was a good deal of confusion in the
minds of members as to whether or
not they were bound to support the
caucus proposition.

THE SILVER ISSUE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—The
silver issue is now the prominent
factor of national politics, and will
not be disposed of until settled. For
a wonder the political leaders seem
to have got a sudden inspiration
from the masses, and all action tends
toward a broader and fairer plan.
We may look for the free silver bill
to go through the House as rapidly
as did the tariff bill.

IN THE HOUSE.

Chairman McKinley from the
committee on rules reported a reso-
lution, providing that the house
shall proceed immediately to the
consideration of the free silver coin-
age bill and that consideration of the
same is to continue until Saturday,
when the previous question shall be
ordered.

The vote was taken and the
House, by a vote of 129 to 117, adopt-
ed the resolution to proceed to the
immediate consideration of the
silver bill.

THE DEBATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—
The previous question having been
ordered on the resolution by McKin-
ley forty minutes debate was allow-
ed. Blount of Georgia had no ob-
jection to the time being limited for
debate, but he was informed that
the chairman of the committee on
coinage will be allowed to offer
amendments, which were admissible
under the rules of House.

When these were offered there
would be left no opportunity for the
minority to offer any amendment.
There would be given no opportu-
nity on the part of the minority to
ask the House to vote on the free
coinage of silver. There are many
men on the other side who would
vote for free silver, but for the fear
that the president was in accord
with the secretary of the treasury
and both were in accord with Wall
street.

SILVER ADVANCES.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 5.—On
Wall street quotations of bar silver
jumped to \$1.03 per ounce, this
morning. This advance is due to
the action of the republican caucus
last night, in acceptance of McKin-
ley's proposition that the treasurer
shall purchase \$4,500,000 worth
American silver each month and that
silver bullion may be used to
meet the demand for redemption.

IN THE SENATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—The
Silver bill was taken up in the
Senate for free coinage. He believed
a majority of people were opposed to
opening the mint to free coinage.
The national conventions of both
political parties would by decisive
majorities repudiate such a propo-
sition.

REED ENDORSED.

PORTLAND, Me., June 5.—The re-
publicans of the first district have
re-nominated Hon. Thos. B. Reed,
at present Speaker of the House, for
congress by acclamation.

THAT INDIAN MASSACRE.

DENVER, Col., June 5.—J. H.
Holt, purchasing agent for the Im-
porting Cattle Co., of Wyoming, ar-
rived here this morning and gives a
brief account of the Indian mass-
acre which occurred in the Upper
River country several days ago. He
says that a party of Indians, that
had become intoxicated with whisky
furnished by ranchmen, came to
the camp of the government sur-
veyors, and demanded more fire
water. It being refused the In-
dians attacked the party, killing
Chief Engineer Crittenden, in
charge of the third division govern-
ment survey, and chain bearers E.
W. Timberlake, George Woods, and
Henry Overmeyer, Jessie Lee, an
assistant engineer, was left on the
field for dead but recovered suffi-
ciently to get to neighboring ranch,
where he is now in a precarious con-
dition.

THE STORM KING.

Terrible Cloud Bursts in Iowa
and Nebraska.

A POSTMASTER FOR PALOUSE CITY.

Further Detail of the Penroyer
Cyclone That Struck
Oregon Monday.

A CLOUD BURST.

COUNCIL BLIFFS, Ia., June 5.—A
special train from Underwood, S. D.,
about two o'clock yesterday morning
a cloud burst occurred nine miles
north of there, nearly over Mosquito
Creek. When day broke the lower
and western half of the town pre-
sented a pitiable plight. Scores of
dwellings were totally wrecked. In
the lower part of the city houses
stood in ten feet of water. Many
bridges were swept away, and many
persons narrowly escaped from
drowning. A large number of cat-
tle and dogs were drowned.

The total loss in Underwood and
vicinity aggregates \$150,000.

At Weson a village seven miles
below Underwood, and on Mosquito
Creek, the damage is not less great.
The best part of the town is under
from 5 to 15 feet of water.

A TOWN IN RUINS.

LINCOLN, June 5.—The State Jour-
nal party returned from the scene of
the tornado in Bradshaw yesterday,
and brought confirmation of the
worst reports received from there.
The storm struck the town at 8:30
Tuesday evening. The roar of the
wind was the first notice the people
had of the disaster. Not a single
building is left. Every business
house was made a total wreck, and
the principal street is filled with
ruins.

A special train was dispatched
from Lincoln with physicians and
other relief. It was found that a
Russian settlement near town was
struck and the report is that nine
were killed there outright.

The doctors say that in all twelve
are dead, eight mortally hurt and
perhaps twenty are hurt less seriously.

The killed are: John Miller, child
of J. Bromster; wife and child of I.
Perher; child of Mr. Chapin; two
members of Wm. Shaw's family;
wife and child of Mr. Minke, and a
hired man.

Gov. Thayer has sent tents and
other supplies to the sufferers.

POSTMASTER NOMINATED.

WASHINGTON, D. C., June 5.—
The president sent to the senate the
nomination of Thos. Smith, to be
postmaster at Palouse, Washington.

MALHEUR COUNTY.

VALE, Ore., June 5.—In this county
Hermann has majority; Liding, re-
publican for representative is elect-
ed. The democrats elected clerk and
sheriff. The republicans the balance
of the ticket. Vale is chosen county
seat.

Multnomah county complete, with
the exception of three small pre-
cincts, gives Hermann 8236, Miller
4238; Thompson 6131, Townsend 4-
144; Metcalf 7862, Webb 4319
Bean 7994, Bonham 4538; McKinley

4543; district attorney, Stephens (R),
6769; Murphy (D) 6357. The entire
republican county ticket is elected by
majorities ranging from 876 on state
senator to 5366 on sheriff.

Returns from all precincts in Ben-
ton county give the following ma-
jorities: Penroyer 269, Hermann 219,
McBride 96, and balance of state
ticket republican by about 100. Re-
publicans carry the legislative ticket
by 15, also the county ticket, except
sheriff, treasurer, assessor, and com-
missioner.
