BOARD OF TRADE TO-NIGHT!

An Important Session—Let there be a Good Attendance. To-night will take place the election of a permanent secretary of the Salem Board of Trade.

The proper kind of permanent secretary, would no doubt be a great institution. A man of broad knowledge of the whole country, of grand executive ability, and tireless energy is what is wanted.

Let the efforts of the past to enlarge Salem and extend our city's wealth and property be rebuffed. The way to do this successfully is to do it systematically and business-like.

Commissioners' Meeting. The Marion county commissioners' court met Thursday in full session and transacted a large amount of business.

In the matter of the opening of the Shepherd and Bowland road, the report of the viewers was read the first time.

A rebate of taxes was allowed Mr. Elliott on a \$500 mortgage to Jeff Myers.

A petition was read for a road from the O. & C. R. R. track at Dan Clarke's d. l. c. to the Parrish gap road, and the viewers and surveyors were appointed.

In the matter of the Kerr and Choquette road a motion to strike out the report of the viewers allowed and referred back to same viewers and surveyor to re-survey said road, they to meet on the 17th day of June, at 10 a. m.

The court allowed Wm. Manning a rebate of \$7661 on taxes of 1889. A petition to allow Townsend \$25 for surveying Pudding river bridge.

Mr. Dawson, supervisor of road district No. 39, having been removed, William Byunts was appointed in his stead.

It was ordered that Brown, supervisor near Mt. Angel, be directed to rebuild the bridge over Simmons creek and shorten the same as much as possible.

Ordered that the county treasurer be ordered to turn over the revolver taken from the man Smith, who committed suicide by drowning, to H. R. Mason, the owner.

In the matter of the road from the Salem and Argenti road to the southwest corner of sec. 14, T. 8 S., R. 1 E., it was ordered that Sam Arnold, S. Brown and G. Schram be appointed viewers and W. J. Culver surveyor, to meet at the place of beginning on the 24th day of June, at 10 a. m., to locate the same.

The taxes of Mrs. Whitney, a blind woman, were ordered remitted. It was also ordered that Sol Cox, supervisor of district No. 1, be allowed \$50, for re-opening county road in his district.

Ordered that J. E. McVey be allowed \$80 for work on the Salem bridge wreck. The county clerk was ordered to send a bill to the city of Salem for \$165 for work on the bridge.

The court is to-day viewing bridges in the northern part of the county. They convene again in this city Saturday at 9 o'clock a. m.

Mr. W. H. Wilde, who has been living across the street from Elder Wire, has moved into his new house in Yew park. Mrs. A. C. Hadley, a sister of Mrs. W. H. Ryars, who has been visiting in the city for a few days, went to Portland this morning.

Hon. W. H. Ryars came down from Mehama last evening, and was greeted by the intelligence of his nomination for surveyor general of Oregon. Rev. F. P. Tower is expected to arrive on the evening train from Helena, Montana, where he has been during the winter and spring, laboring in the interest of the Wesleyan university of Montana.

THE JEFFERSON MILL.

A Strong Effort Made to Effect a Settlement and Close Up the Business. Some fifty farmers of the Jefferson neighborhood, who had had wheat stored in the mill warehouse there and who recently closed it up, met in the town hall of that city Wednesday afternoon for the purpose of ascertaining the exact condition of affairs, and if possible come to some agreement as to the proper basis upon which the proceeds of the available assets can be divided.

It was an important meeting, and as several JOURNAL readers are directly interested in the outcome, a reporter of this paper was on hand to work the doings, and was given the courtesy of the hall, although all not directly interested were excluded from the deliberations.

Hon. Timon Ford, of this city, was sent for to examine into all the facts and give legal and friendly advice as he deemed most likely to lead to a fair and amicable settlement.

Mr. F. Bagley, chairman of the five trustees, was the heaviest depositor, and the great point of contention is over this gentleman's grain. It is claimed by some of the parties that a portion of his wheat was purchased from the mill company after the shortage began to occur and that he knew of the shortage, therefore that his receipts are invalid and should not be taken into account in the division of the assets.

A large number of others are for sustaining Mr. Bagley in his claim. After deliberations reaching to almost dark, Mr. Ford made out an agreement which allows Mr. Bagley all the wheat he claims, and provides that all resources shall be divided equally pro rata among all depositors who had wheat there at the time the shortage was discovered.

The money for flour and wheat sold is not yet all in, but it is calculated that under the above arrangements about 48 cents per bushel will be netted to all parties. They are all earnest, and honorable, and will settle matters honorably and placidly.
