CASUALTIES AND CRIMES.

**Cloudburst and Train Wreck-
ing at Maysville, Ky.**

A BOY DEFENDS HIS MOTHER.

**Miscellany of Importance of
the Day's Mishaps and
Accidents.**

CLOUDBURST AND DERAILMENT.
MAYSVILLE, Ky., June 13.—This
forenoon a train on the Chesapeake
and Ohio railroad ran off an em-
bankment by reason of a washout.
Engineer Roadchap and Fireman
Honaker were killed and another
trainman drowned. The bodies are
not yet recovered. The accident was
caused by a cloudburst at Bull
Creek six miles above Maysville.
The creek rose suddenly and swept
away several dwelling houses and
washed out a stone culvert. The
train ran into the washout and a
dozen persons living on the banks
of Bull Creek are reported drowned.
The following bodies have been
found: John Raggies, fisherman;
Lucy P. Estler, widow, two daugh-
ters, Bettie and Julia, and two sons.

TRAIN WRECKED.
CLEVELAND, Ohio, June 13.—A
passenger train on Compton Valley
railroad was run into this morning
by a switch engine at Newburg, a
suburb two miles from here. No-
body was killed, though twelve or
thirteen were injured and some seri-
ously. A freight train plowed
through the passenger train at cross-
ing.

NOGALLES, Ariz., June 13.—The
special Chinese Inspector, Schell,
has arrested two more Chinese near
Loana custom house. This makes
twenty-six that have been captured
at that locality within the past
three days.

KILLED HIS FATHER.

Warren, a traveling man, was shot
and killed this morning by his six-
teen year old son for abusing his
mother.

**Mexico Denies the Presence of

THE CHINESE IN MEXICO.
CITY OF MEXICO, June 13.—The
report that Mexico is over-run by
Chinese is sheer nonsense. There
is not a thousand Chinamen on the
entire coast of Mexico, and the ma-
jority of these arrivals simply pass
through here on their way to the
United States.

RUSSIA'S PRINCE COMING.
ST. PETERSBURG, Russia, June 13.
—The most important piece of
world news to-day is the proposed
trip around the world by the heir
apparent to the Russian throne. It
is officially stated that the Czarovitch
will start on a tour of the world
August first. He will return by
way of the United States.

NEWS FROM ALASKA.
NANAIMO, B. C., June 13.—Alas-
kan advices from Juneau, June 9th,
state that the United States authori-
ties have captured an illicit still of
Hawthorne & Co., on Admiralty
island. Great depression prevails.
Not since 1884 have such hard times
been known in Juneau.

INDICTMENT AND ACQUITTAL.
MONTREAL, Can., June 13.—Judge
Desmeys this morning committed
Hale to the grand jury, which will
probably indict him. He will be re-
leased on bail and if Cowles does not
appear at the trial he will be acquit-
ted.

A FATAL TRAGEDY.
A Wife Shoots Her Husband and Then
Suicides at Her Home Near
Lebanon.

Lebanon special to Albany Her-
ald June 13.—A terrible tragedy
was enacted near this city this
morning. About daylight Mrs.
Aurnsprugh shot and killed her
husband, Grant Aurnsprugh, and
then shot and killed herself. The
cause of the shooting is supposed to
be jealousy on the part of the wife.
Justice Wallace has been called
upon to hold an inquest on the par-
ties.

They reside some seven miles
north of Lebanon, in Sautian pre-
cinct. They were well respected in
the community, and the fatal end-
ing is greatly deplored. They leave
two young children. He was shot
through the heart and then she
shot herself through the head.

Aurnsprugh was aged, about 30.
His father and brother lived in
houses near his own, both the
brothers being married. About 3
o'clock this morning the woman
who did the shooting arose and
found her husband in her sister's
apartments. Both were sitting
upon his lap. The young wife, out-
raged at the shameful wrong of her
husband, procured a gun and
committed the tragedy as related.

The husband lived only long enough
to say that his wife had killed him.
She fell dead upon his dead body,
and he was too weak from his own
wounds to remove her body, and in
this position they were found.

The deed had been premeditated,
as the wife had written a letter the
day before to her parents in Cali-
fornia, stating that she had repeat-
edly witnessed such exhibitions of
perfidy on the part of her husband,
and that she intended to kill him
and herself. The letter was taken
out of the Lebanon postoffice this
morning and read, setting forth the
above facts.

LATER PARTICULARS.
Mr. O. H. Black, who was at the
scene of the shooting, was seen in
this city last night by a Herald re-
porter. He said that the first re-
port of the particulars sent out was
somewhat incorrect. Mrs. Aurn-
sprugh, he said, shot her husband
while he was asleep, and he did not
speak afterwards. The wife had
found her sister and husband in a
compromising situation the previous
morning. She had upbraided her
sister about it during the day,
and the girl and the girl's
perfidious husband had taunted
her with the threat of running off
together. Goaded to desperation,
she waited until her husband was
asleep in the morning and shot him.
Her sister, who had quickly fled when
the unfortunate woman shot herself
in the head. The letter had not
been sent to the postoffice, but was
yet in the hands of a neighbor, who
had been requested to take it to
Lebanon.

An infant child was lying upon
the bed, but it was unharmed.
