FISHERY TROUBLES.

HALIFAX, N. S., June 16.—A cor-
respondent at Little Lorraine, N. B.,
writes that on the sixth instant
three American fishing vessels came
into the harbor, cut away nets and
buoys of local fishermen and stole
their seines, also taking 600 barrels
of mackerel.

CHOLERA.
MADRID, Spain, June 16.—Much
alarm is occasioned by the continued
spread of cholera at Puebla De
Rugat. The authorities are making
strong efforts to stamp out the dis-
ease, but so far they have been un-
successful.

GREAT STRIKE.

LONDON, Eng., June 16.—Thir-
teen thousand dock laborers at
Swansea have to-day struck for
higher wages. The shipping busi-
ness of the place is at a standstill.

STEAMER WRECKED.

SYDNEY, NEW SOUTH WALES,
June 16.—The steamer Yow Yangs
from Port Parle, South Australia,
destined for this place, has been
wrecked off Willoughby Cape. Part
of the crew are missing.

INTERESTING PORTLAND NEWS.

City Election in Progress.—The Oregon
Transcontinental and O. R. & N.
Elect Directors.

PORTLAND CITY ELECTION.

PORTLAND, OR., June 16.—The
city election is being held to-day
for the purpose of electing a city
treasurer and three councilmen for
the ensuing year. For city treasurer
the republican candidate is the only
one in the field. The only fight
being made is in the First and Third
wards. In the Second ward the
republican nominee has a walk over,
having no opposition. The demo-
crats are concentrating most of their
strength on the Third ward con-
test, endeavoring to beat Filmer,
republican, for re-election. Polling
is being conducted slowly
and quietly.

RAILROAD DIRECTORS ELECTED.

PORTLAND, OR., June 16.—The
annual meeting of the Oregon Trans-
continental company was held in this
city to-day. The old board of di-
rectors were elected with the ex-
ception of Messrs. Bartlett, Hall
and Charlton. In their places
Rufus Mallory, C. A. Dolph and T.
H. Tyndale, of Portland, were elect-
ed. The Oregon Railway and Navi-
gation company held its annual
meeting to-day and elected the fol-
lowing directors: Edmund Smith,
C. F. Adams, W. B. Fostick, H. R.
Reed, F. L. Ames, G. M. Lane, D.
P. Thompson, C. J. Smith, Wm.
McIntosh, W. W. Cotton, A. L.
Mills, Lloyd Brooks and H. C.
Campbell.

WILL PROBABLY COME.—A letter
was received last evening from Gen.
J. S. Clarkson, first assistant post-
master general, from Seattle,
saying that it may be possible for
him and his party to make a stop
at Salem, a fact he says, which
would please him very much if
he can so arrange it. To further
induce him to strain a point and
make Oregon's capital a visit, the
board of trade this afternoon
telegraphed him an urgent invitation
to do so. Should he so determine,
due notice of the time of his arrival
will be given and all former towns
will doubtless be pleased to join in
a hearty reception to the man who
has done so much to build up that
great state.

CASUALTIES AND CRIMES.

Another Woman Uses Coal Oil for Kindling, Etc.

TRAIN WRECKED IN KENTUCKY.

Terrible Mine Horror in Pennsylvania—40 Lives Lost—Other Matters.

TERRIBLE MINE EXPLOSION.

PITTSBURGH, Pa., June 16.—An
explosion in Farm Hill mine, near
Dunbar, Pa., occurred this morning.
Only ten men escaped. At least 40
are still in the pit and it is believed
they have been suffocated.
It is feared all of the 40 men still
in the mine are either killed out-
right or have been suffocated. The
excitement is very great. It has
been impossible to render any as-
sistance up to the present time. Full
particulars of the actual loss of life
cannot be given. Another dispatch
from Connellsville says: An explo-
sion of damp gas occurred to-day in
Farm Hill mine at Dunbar. "All the
men were in the pit. Fifteen have
been taken out badly injured; the
others are thought to be dead. A
volunteer party are digging for
them." A private dispatch says
that sixty-five men were in the
mine and fifteen were rescued, and it
is believed the others are dead.

YACHTING PARTY PERISHED.

PITTSBURGH, June 16.—A small
steam yacht bearing a pleasure party
went to the bottom of Lake St. Clair
yesterday. The entire party is
said to have been drowned. The
names of the unfortunate and of the
craft on which they went down are
not yet known.

TRAIN WRECKED.

PADUCAH, Ky., June 16.—A
freight train on the Newport News
and Mississippi Valley R. R., was
derailed at Kerville, Tenn., this
morning. The engine and ten cars
were badly wrecked. Engineer
Glynn Perkins and an unknown
negro tramp were crushed to death
and Rush Marshall, fireman, was fa-
tally hurt.

HER FIRE EXTINGUISHED.

SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., June 16.—
Mrs. Dora Gamma, who attempted
to light a fire with the aid of coal
oil at her home Saturday, died yes-
terday from the effects of the explo-
sion.

ARRESTED FOR ABDUCTION.

NEW YORK, N. Y., June 16.—Sam
Kee, a Chinese laundryman, twenty
years of age, at Providence R. I.,
was arraigned in police court yes-
terday, charged with having ab-
ducted Annie Lawrence, aged fifteen
years.

Steadily Improving.

The Astoria & South Coast rail-
road is being graded to Hillsboro' by
a force of three hundred men. There
has been no let up on this un-
dertaking, and it is kept moving
right along. Last week the rails
were delivered in that city for the
street car track, and men were at
once put to work laying them down.
Astoria is moving right along, and
property there is steadily improving.
