EASTERN NEWS.

Strike of Mill Hands at Yonkers, N. Y.
INTERSTATE COMMERCE VIOLATIONS.

Salary of New Senators.--Tammany's Leader Denies the Bribery.--Other News.
STRIKING AGAINST REDUCTION.
YONKERS, N. Y., June 23.—One thousand employees of the Patroon and Copeland silk mills struck this morning against the reduction of their wages.

THIS IS A "DRAW" GAME.
WASHINGTON, D. C., June 23.—In the senate, Ingalls offered a resolution which was agreed to, instructing the committee on privileges and elections to inquire as to the date when, under law and precedent, the salaries of the senators from Montana, Washington and North and South Dakota began to run.

VIOLATING THE STATUTE.
CHICAGO, June 23.—The case of the Michigan Central Railroad officials in the United States court for the violation of the interstate commerce law closed this afternoon. Judge Blodgett discharged General Freight Agent McKay. The cases of Nichols and Somers were taken under advisement.

DENIES THE BRIBERY STORY.
NEW YORK, N. Y., June 23.—The state senate committee this morning heard the testimony of Recorder Croker. Tammany leader, in rebuttal of the sensational evidence given by his brother-in-law, Patrick McCann, some time ago, involving Mayor Grant and others, Croker declared that McCann's story to the effect the witness had one hundred and eighty thousand dollars in a sack to bribe the aldermen to confirm Grant's appointment to the commissionership of public works, is absolutely false in all particulars.

GOSPEL ABOUT MONTANA MEN.
ST. PAUL, June 22.—A Pioneer Press special says: The Associated Press seems to have boycotted Representative Carter, of Montana, since he has been in congress. It is not known that in any of the accounts of the congressional proceedings his name has ever been mentioned. This was first observed when Carter made the fight for tariff on lead ore in the house. He had charge of the time for the lead interests, made two speeches, and it was generally regarded as his fight. The next time was on the silver break, when several republicans failed to stay with their party. Every republican who made a speech yesterday in favor of free coinage was reported briefly excepting Carter, and Carter was not even mentioned in the list of republicans voting with the democrats. The boycott is said to originate from remarks made by Carter in Chicago, in which he claimed that the Associated Press dispatches were not giving the republicans a fair show in the Montana election contest. But it seems to be effective.

PACIFIC COAST.
BANKERS FOR FREE SILVER.
SPOKANE FALLS, June 21.—At last night's meeting of the State Bankers' Association resolutions in favor of the increased coinage of silver were unanimously adopted, as follows:

WHEREAS, The business interests of the entire country are suffering depression by reason of a too contracted currency; and
WHEREAS, It is the belief of this convention that an expansion can best and most safely be accomplished by the increased coinage of silver; therefore, be it

RESOLVED, That the action of our representatives at Washington, favoring the coinage of silver of American production, has our unqualified approval.

THE POLK COUNTY BANK.
MONMOUTH, Or., June 23.—The Polk County bank was virtually reorganized at the annual meeting of the stockholders, held Monday, June 16. The stock books were opened and paid up stock was taken to the amount of \$25,000 by the leading business men and farmers of Monmouth and vicinity. The bank now represents one of the strongest combinations of capital in the county. The following officers and directors were elected: President, I. A. Macrum, of Portland; vice-president, P. L. Campbell; cashier, Ira C. Powell; directors, F. S. Powell, I. A. Macrum, L. F. M. Butler, J. B. Stump, P. L. Campbell, J. B. V. Butler, A. B. Griggs.

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.

Canadian Pacific Mail Steamship Wrecked.
A TUG BOAT BOILER EXPLOSION.

Train Derailed, Killing Two Men--Eastern Storms--Accidental Shooting.
PASSENGER TRAIN WRECKED.
READING, Penn., June 23.—Part of a passenger train on the Reading road was derailed this morning. The engineer and fireman were killed and three other trainmen slightly injured.

ACCIDENTALLY SHOT HIMSELF.
UKIAH, Cal., June 23.—James Holman, who lives at Willits, twenty-five miles north of here, while out hunting yesterday morning fatally shot himself. Holman was pulling the gun into the wagon after him when it was discharged, the ball striking him in the abdomen. He lived about two hours. He leaves a wife and two children.

TERRIBLY FATAL EXPLOSION.
NEW YORK, N. Y., June 23.—The tug Alice E. Crane exploded her boiler while lying at the dock this morning, causing its complete wreck. Captain Chas. W. Squires and crew of four men were all killed. A scow lying alongside was sunk and it is supposed the watchman went down with her. The explosion is supposed to be the result of a defect in the boiler.

BIG SHORTAGE ALLEGED.
OMAHA, Neb., June 23.—The attorney of the Union Pacific created a sensation by filing a petition in the federal court against C. H. McKibbin, late general purchasing agent, for \$60,000 alleged to have been stolen through fraudulent purchases of lumber. All his property is attached. McKibbin left for the East last week.

TORNADO SWEEPS AWAY A TOWN.
LINCOLN, Neb., June 22.—A special to the JOURNAL from Grand Island says the town of Sweetwater, a little hamlet of less than a hundred inhabitants, was swept away by a tornado which visited the place about 3 o'clock this afternoon. No one was killed, but a number were injured.

WORK OF A STORM IN INDIANA.
INDIANAPOLIS, June 22.—During a rainstorm this afternoon at Fairview Park, a number of people sought refuge in the depot which was being erected by the electric street railroad. The depot was blown down and a dozen people seriously injured, and one fatally. Reports from the suburbs show that many buildings were unroofed and much damage done to orchards.

STEAMSHIP WRECKED--EMBEZZLER ARRESTED.
VICTORIA, B. C., June 23.—A ship's boat has arrived at Departure bay with the news that the C. P. M. Navigation steamer, Sardonyx, is a complete wreck off Queen Charlotte islands. Only the most meagre details are obtainable, but it is said no lives were lost. It is supposed the steamship was wrecked in the storm of Tuesday last. Sardonyx was insured for forty thousand dollars. She was recently repaired at a cost of ten thousand dollars owing to damages she received from striking a rock in Northern waters.

C. C. Hogan, a young San Francisco collecting agent who has been here the past six weeks, was arrested yesterday accused of embezzling several thousand dollars, principally from the Nitrate Powder Co. He will be extradited to-day and returned to the chief of police of San Francisco.

PRISON BURNED.
NEW YORK, N. Y., June 23.—A fire in the King's county penitentiary workshops this morning did \$50,000 worth of damage. Four hundred convicts marched to their cells in order and were locked up.

LARGE COAL MINE ON FIRE.
MOUNT CARMEL, Pa., June 23.—The Pennsylvania colliery, the largest in this region, is on fire. There are hopes of subduing the flames.

Southern Oregon is filled with railroad activity.
England proposes to cede Heligoland to Germany.

The City Board of Charities at Portland received \$4104 and applicants for aid numbered 1481.
Miss Agnes M. Greene, of Seattle, received the second or Beckman prize, for excellence in her oration, \$100 cash.
Rev. G. L. Rogers, of the Albany Congregational church, has resigned and will return to his former home, New York City.
Indications are that the census has been very poorly taken in Portland and the thoroughness of the work of enumerators at Salem is called in question.
At the State University, Edward H. McAllister, in the graduating class, received the Failing, or first prize, for the excellence of his oration, of \$150 in cash.

FOREIGN NEWS.
IN HONOR OF GUTENBERG.
MAYENCE, Germany, June 22.—The great printing exhibition opened in the Electoral hall here to-day. This function is to commemorate the 450th anniversary of the invention of printing, and the display includes specimens of every kind of printing apparatus and products thereof, from the time of Gutenberg to the present. The state library contributes some bits of printing that were actually done by Gutenberg himself. Next Thursday is the anniversary of Gutenberg's birth, and there will be imposing demonstrations in his honor. The whole city will be illuminated, and there will be elaborate festivities in the Gutenberg casino, which has been built on the exact site of the house in which the inventor was born.

THE SALEM CANNERY.

A New Industry for Laborer and Employer.
A JOURNAL REPRESENTATIVE IN THE CANNERY.

A JOURNAL reporter while waiting for a delayed train finds a little time to take a run through Salem's new fruit cannery. The season has just begun and only a few hands are at work yet, but in the fruit season there will be about a hundred of Salem's people find employment in this establishment, comprising men, women, boys and girls. There is an abundance of machinery, much of which is not yet in use. Among the first pieces of odd looking machinery to attract the attention was a pea sheller, which will be started as soon as peas are in the market in sufficient quantity to can. The next apparatus to draw the notice of the observer was what he at first thought to be a fanning mill, but an inquiry and closer examination found it to be a "corn shucker" and near by it was a can filler. A trip through the boiler and engine room showed a 100 horse power boiler, attached to a 15 horse power engine, with Chas. Cook as engineer, a gentleman who talked freely in showing everything in that department. The boilers are of the McGregor patent, made in Detroit, Mich. The engine is the Taylor, of Chambersburg, Pa. The heavy boiler is used for furnishing heat in the cooking room of the cannery. Mr. Cook has management of the machinery of the cannery and evaporator, and has been in the employ of the company for two years.

THE PROCESS.
The process is substantially as follows, in cherries, the fruit now being used. The cherries are received fresh from the trees, and are first "stemmed," which is done by hand and by girls as they are apter at such work than boys. They are then put into the cans and the sweetening put in, which is sugar syrup made there, and the quantity of sweetening is governed by the condition of the fruit and the kind of fruit used, and the ripeness of the fruit. The less sweetening is required. They are then soldered air tight and put in a reservoir and steam from the boiler applied to cook them, which is only the first step. They are not here cooked, but when thoroughly heated are taken out and "tipped," by punching holes in the center of the tops of the cans to let the air out, they are again soldered up air tight while hot. They are now ready for the "retort process" which is done in a large cylinder about ten feet long and three and a half feet in diameter. They are run into this on a car, a ton or two at a time, and here receive the final cooking. After the car containing the cans is safely in the retort the door is shut, which is so accurately adjusted as to steam tight; the steam is then turned on from the big hundred horse power boiler in the engine room. The fruit here receives a thorough cooking at a temperature of about 250° F. The time required to cook depends much on the kind of fruit and also the degree of ripeness. The sweetening in the fruit, as is sometimes believed, has nothing to do with the keeping qualities; but it does depend somewhat on the condition of the fruit used and much on the knowledge of how to handle the fruit before it goes to the solder-men.

Every thing in the cannery is neat and clean and carried on in an orderly manner. Mr. A. Bird, who has had a great deal of experience in fruit canning in the east, is manager of the Salem cannery and thoroughly understands his duties, and the reporter found him to be very courteous and willing to explain the workings in that part of establishment. This is one of the best equipped canneries on the Pacific coast for working economically and yet doing a big lot of work. Salem hereafter will be able to use fresh canned fruit and vegetables of her own production and know that they are of the best quality that the market can afford. This is one of the industries which go to make a great city. The best way to make a city prosperous is to develop her natural resources, and this, Salem is fast doing.
