IN THE LABOR WORLD.

Late Report From the Farm Hill Mine.

CARPENTERS WIN A 9-HOUR VICTORY.

The Hot Waves Subside and Cooler Breezes Prevailing East-Other News.

LATEST FROM THE MINE

DUNBAR, Pa., July 2.—The work of smothering the fire in the Farm Hill mine has commenced. The mine cannot very well be flooded. The highest cover the bodies of the two men who were brought out of the upper slope begins Monday. What is most needed now is relief for the twenty-one widows and seventy-seven orphans of the victims. There is much suffering.

A NINE-HOUR VICTORY.

CINCINNATI, Ohio, July 2.—The striking carpenters have agreed to return to work. The bosses are willing to give ten hours' pay for nine hours' work after July 15th. Of the 1500 men unemployed, 1600 will be able to obtain work.

DEATHS FROM HEAT.

CINCINNATI, O., July 2.—The temperature moderated last night and is still lower to-day than at this time yesterday. The accumulated effect of the previous hot weather, rather than heat of that day, caused nearly twenty prostrations from heat yesterday and four deaths.

CHICAGO COOLER.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 2.—The long promised cool wave has arrived, bringing relief to the sweltering inhabitants. At 9 this a. m. the thermometer was 68 degrees, a drop of nearly twenty degrees since yesterday.

A GOLD PANIC AVERTED.

BUENOS AYRES, Arg. Rep., July 2.—The sale of the Western railway has been completed. Three million pounds sterling, the balance of the English purchase money, has been paid. This transaction has arrested the panic in the gold market.

PROVIDENCE, R. I., July 2.—George Wells, a gilded youth of 19, has eloped with Jessie Arnold, aged 14, and gone off to New York to get married. There is a tremendous hubbub about little Rhody's 400 over what they term a misalliance. Ten days ago at a promenade given by the Brown university students, young Wells met Miss Jessie Arnold and the two straightway fell desperately in love. Wells proposed the same evening and was accepted. The youthfulness of the couple prevented them getting united legally in this state, hence their flight to New York. Papa Wells is in hot pursuit.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Equal Suffragists Appeal to the President.

PROGRESS ON THE SILVER BILL.

Other Important Eastern News From Every Section of the World.

HOLDING BACK THE SILVER BILL.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The Herald's Washington special says that a conference on the silver bill cannot be held for several days. Senator Harris is ill and Congressman Walker, of Massachusetts, is out of town. The conference may not come to so ready an agreement as is commonly expected. Chairman Conger, of the house committee, is reluctant to abandon the bullion redemption feature of the house bill, and if he stands out Walker will undoubtedly be with him, for he has been one of the most persistent opponents of the movement for more silver money. Silver senators declare that the senate will never accept the bill with the bullion redemption feature in it. They would rather see legislation defeated and the subject referred back again to the people than to accept the bullion redemption bill. The provision giving a legal tender character to outstanding certificates is not so much insisted on but silver men will insist that certificates issued under the new law shall be legal tender. Senator Harris, who is counted somewhat of a silver man, may oppose this but Senator Sherman will probably favor it.

THE SILVER CONFERENCE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—The joint committee of the houses in conference on the silver bill met this morning and spent an hour in discussing the differences between the two houses. They separated at noon having come to no conclusion. It is said there were three propositions presented for consideration. The house resumed consideration of the pending federal election bill.

APPEALING TO THE PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 2.—A committee of representatives of the National American Woman Suffrage association and National Woman's Christian Temperance Union called upon President Harrison to-day and asked him to sign the bill providing for the admission of Wyoming on the 4th day of July. The Wyoming bill provides for perfect political equality without any distinctions of sex and the advocates of woman suffrage say that they desire to celebrate the 4th of July in honor of this beginning of the republic in connection with the event for which the day is already commemorated. It is their intention to have the Wyoming and Idaho bills sent to Cape May Point where the president will pass the Fourth and request him to sign the same.

PENNSYLVANIA DEMOCRATS.

SCRANTON, Pa., July 2.—The democratic state convention for the nomination of state officers met this morning.

MURDER IN ROMANIA.

BRIGADE, Servia, July 2.—Markinkovich, the Serbian consul at Prestina, Romania, has been murdered.

NEW YORK, July 2.—The health board is engaged in making analysis of samples of the ice cream which poisoned the residents of Yorkville Sunday and Monday. It is reported to-day that all the patients are not yet out of danger.
