WASHINGTON NEWS.
Congress Adjourns Until Next Monday.
NO AGREEMENT REACHED ON SILVER.
Blaine and Romero Make An International Agreement as to Catching Indians.

IN THE HOUSE.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—The President has approved the joint resolution extending the unexpended balance for letter carriers for extra compensation under the eight-hour law to June 30, 1901. Another unavailing conference over the silver bill was held this morning. An adjournment was taken at noon, until Saturday morning, no agreement having been reached.

IN THE SENATE.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—Messages from the president as to postal and cable communication between the United States and Latin-American states, as to the celebration of the fourth centennial of the discovery of America, were presented and referred. Senator Allison moved that the adjournment today be until Monday, which was agreed to.

PERMISSION TO CATCH INDIANS.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—Agreement has been entered into by Blaine and Romero, the Mexican minister, providing for reciprocal crossing of international boundary line by troops of United States and Mexico when in close pursuit of hostile Indians.

THE FEDERAL ELECTION LAW
has passed the lower house. When the time came for the final vote Outhwaite moved an adjournment, which the speaker ruled out as dilatory. Springer demanded the reading of the engrossed bill.

The speaker was prepared for this demand, the bill having been engrossed in advance, and a burst of applause came from the republican side when the clerk began reading. Two hours were consumed in reading and the question then returned on the passage of the bill.

As the call was in progress great interest was manifested on both sides of the house. As Coleman of Louisiana cast his vote with the democrats, he was greeted with applause from that side of the house, and the applause was reinforced with cheers when Lehman of New Jersey also cast a vote against the measure. The republicans retaliated in kind as the southern representatives, Hunt, Taylor of Tennessee, Waddell, Mudd of Maryland, and Wilson of Kansas, recorded their votes in the affirmative, after a cheer which was given.

The bill passed; yeas 155, nays 149.

Weather Report For June 1890.

During June 1890, there were 10 days on which rain fell and 1.18 inches of water. There were 8 clear, 7 fair, and 15 cloudy days. The highest temperature for the month was 92° on the 30th; lowest, 39° on the 10th; mean, 57°.

Monthly range of temperature 53°; greatest daily, 37° on the 5th; least, 6° on the 15th; mean, 20.9-30.

Average mean temperature for June in 21 years, 60.1; that for this year is below normal by 4.5°; deficiency since January 1st, 1.48.

Average precipitation for June in same time, 1.26 inches; that for this month is below normal by .08 in.; excess since January 1st 1.61 inches.

Solar halo on the 10th. The prevailing winds for the month were from the southwest during 11 days; north 10 days; south 9 days. The rainfall during the month was very much needed, and has been of great benefit to the growing crops, and if not followed by extremely hot weather will insure fair crops. The fruit crop will probably not exceed 75 per cent. of the general average.

During June 1889, there were 2 days on which rain fell, and .45 inch of water. There were 17 clear, 7 fair, 6 cloudy days.

Highest temperature for the month 90° on the 10th; lowest, 47° on the 23rd; mean, 64.9°.

TO-DAY'S NEWS.
A Horrible Deed Committed in Texas.
GAMBLING QUARREL ENDS IN MURDER.
Other Important Eastern News
---Developments of the Day.

WANTON MURDER.
EL PASO, TEX., July 3. Joseph D. Brown an expert telegrapher, was wantonly murdered at the Gem saloon this morning by Wm. G. Colwell an engineer at the steam pumping station. He had been out drinking and gambling all night and about three o'clock this morning left the Gem in an irritable mood, having met with losses at a faro table. The man he killed was standing outside of the door and cheerfully asked Colwell how much he had lost, to which Colwell says he replied it was none of his business. After a few more words Colwell whipped out his pistol and fired twice. The man ran into the saloon and Colwell pursued him inside and found him lying on his face and hands on the floor. Walking deliberately up to the prostrate man Colwell placed one foot between his legs and bending forward fired two more bullets in his back. They entered his heart and killed him instantly.

CONSCIENCE OR LAW.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 3.—The Lutheran synod closed its session today. The resolutions are in substance that the Lutherans feel in conscience constrained not to send their children to the public schools because they are conducted upon a non-religious basis; they disapprove however of any attempt to distribute the public school funds among parochial schools; they approve the opposition made against the recently passed school laws of Wisconsin and Illinois and declare that they do not feel bound in conscience to obey such laws.

AN UGLY SCHEME.
NEW YORK, N. Y., July 3.—A circular letter sent out to all boards of trade in the United States by the New York Produce Exchange. It is a protest against a new form of bill of lading which all railroads adopted on the first of July and sprung upon shippers without warning.

TO BE ELECTRICISED.
BUFFALO, N. Y., 1:40 p. m., July 3.—For the third time sentence of death was today passed on Wm. Kemmler, for murder. Judge Childs ordered his previous sentence to be carried into effect at Auburn prison during the week of August 4th.

THE LOTTERY BILL WILL PASS.
BATON ROUGE, La., July 3.—The senate amendment lottery bill was concurred in by the house by a vote 68 to 25. The struggle is now over, as the bill can now be passed over the governor's veto should one be written.

KILLED IN TUNNEL.
NEVADA, Cal., July 3.—John Driscoll was killed yesterday by a cave in on the tunnel of the Boston Mine, near Graniteville. Miners were four hours digging out his body.

Idaho Admitted as a State To-Day.
SEVERE STORM IN EASTERN ONTARIO.
Cloak-Makers' Strike Ends in Bloodshed in New York--Other News.

IDAH0 ADMITTED.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 3.—President Harrison has signed the act of congress for the admission of Idaho as a state of the Union at 10 o'clock this morning.

TERRIBLE STORM IN CANADA.
TORONTO, Canada, July 3.—A dangerous and destructive storm prevailing in Eastern Ontario yesterday. In Campbell ford and that neighborhood hailstones of the size of hen's eggs fell, destroying all crops and exposed glass in that vicinity. The howling wind levelled trees, fences, and unroofed many buildings. The water washed out many railroad bridges and culverts, delaying trains badly. In the vicinity of Picton and Springfield lightning set fire to many barns and killed much stock.

CLOAKMAKERS' STRIKE.
NEW YORK, N. Y., July 3.—There is great danger of labor riots spreading in this city. Two hundred striking cloakmakers gathered on Broadway, between Leonard and White streets, this morning, when the hands in Meyer Jonassens, and in the Mercantile Cloak Co. shops were going to work. The strikers surrounded and threatened them. Some of them took to their heels and escaped. Others were seized and shuffled away by force. Several fights resulted, and Broadway for blocks was a scene of confusion. There were many broken heads. The working cloakmakers were generally worsted.

A MARE'S NEST.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 3.—The Examiner to-day devotes thirteen columns to an alleged exposure of the fraudulent methods in furnishing government supplies to the Mare Island Navy Yard. The article contends that the coal contract has almost invariably been given to James McCudden. It is claimed that a newspaper representative, while acting as tally clerk or bookkeeper in the yard, was approached by McCudden who, if he would report the amount of coal delivered as being of full specified weight, to divide with him profits arising from shortage in weight, and under this agreement the representative received about five hundred dollars which is now on deposit with the Examiner. The matter has been laid before the department at Washington and will be investigated.

SUICIDE.
PORTLAND, Or., 2:50 p. m., July 3.—A dispatch from Tacoma states that R. H. Passmore, cashier of Security Bank of Tacoma, committed suicide this morning. The only cause assigned is despondency. His accounts are said to be straight.

KERR RELEASED.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 3.—James W. Kerr, the foundryman who shot and killed Edward Cogan, the molder's apprentice last Thursday, has secured release from the city prison this morning on \$75,000 bonds.

GOVERNMENT CRISIS IN SPAIN.
MADRID, Spain, July 3.—There is a crisis in the Spanish cabinet. Probably a conservative ministry will be formed under the presidency of Canovas del Castillo.
