DIED.

McNAB.—At the Cook hotel, Salem, Monday morning at 9:30, July 7, 1890, Joseph McNab, aged between 35 and 40 years.

The deceased came here about two months ago from Portland, where he had worked as pattern maker in the Willamette Iron works. He was suffering from consumption and has been sick the greater portion of his time here. He obtained work at the penitentiary foundry, but could stand it only a few days. He was finally prostrated two weeks ago to-day and has been out of his room only a few times since. Nobody here knows anything about him further than above recited, except that he intended going to Denver after working a short time here. Telegrams to the Willamette Iron works from Mr. Anderson, of the Cook house, failed to bring any response, and the body is now in Rotan's undertaking rooms awaiting burial. Mr. McNab had with him money sufficient to probably meet all expenses so far. He was a good mechanic, gentlemanly and agreeable.

Since writing the above it is learned that Mr. Anderson received a dispatch last night from the foreman of Willamette Iron works saying that McNab's relatives live in Patterson, New Jersey.
