CYCLONE RAVAGES.
Fargo, North Dakota, Swept
to Desolation,
MEASURE REPORTS YET OBTAINABLE.

The Wires Down for Several
Miles, and Great Devasta-
tion all Around.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 7.—A re-
port is current here that the town
of Fargo, North Dakota, was com-
pletely swept away by a cyclone this
morning.
All indications seem to confirm
the report. A railroad man who
arrived from that vicinity this
morning says a terrific wind storm
prevailed this morning by which
several trains were blown from the
track. All wires to Fargo are
down and the Western Union office
report about two miles of poles near
Fargo, and between there and here
to have been blown down. West of
Fargo, they say worse conditions
exist, and that miles and miles
of wires and poles are down. The last
report received by the Signal service
from Fargo was 7 p. m. Sunday, and
they showed low barometer, tempera-
ture of 80 degrees, wind velocity
of six miles an hour with conditions
good for a severe storm.

FURTHER PARTICULARS.
ST. PAUL, Minn., July 7.—Gen-
eral Passenger Agent Fee, of the
Northern Pacific railway has received
the following telegram from
Jamestown, Dak.: About 2 a. m., a
severe storm struck the Dakota divi-
sion. Train No. 1 was blown from
the track at Fargo, and destroyed
the shops. The roof was blown off
the depot at Mapleton and one of
the elevators at Dargyple was
struck by lightning and burned.
Cars were blown out on the main
track at Butteville.

MORE PARTICULARS.
MILWAUKEE, July 7.—Advises re-
ceived at Chicago, Milwaukee and
St. Paul offices are to the effect
that the town is pretty well wrecked
out. Several people are killed and
a large number injured. The Northern
Pacific train was blown from the
track.

LOSS OF LIFE FEARED.
One report received says that sev-
en children were killed by being
caught under a roof. Nearly all re-
turns report heavy loss of life, based
on the fact that nothing has been
heard from Fargo and Moorhead
since two o'clock this morning, and
the further fact was, undoubtedly,
that the storm is the same which
blew down the wires in every direc-
tion.

The Northern Pacific furnishes
this information: Several people
injured on train No. 1, none fatally;
most of them only slightly. Col.
Thompson, of Purdy's party, also a
lady of their party, were severely
shaken up. The porter of their car
is seriously injured. Purdy is secre-
tary and treasurer of the Rock Is-
land road. His special car was
attached to the train which was
blown from the track.

LATEST—SEVEN LIVES LOST.
MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 7.—The
Western Union just got into Moor-
head, Minn., across the river from
Fargo, Dak., and the signal obser-
ver there telegraphed to Washington
that seven lives had been lost in the
cyclone and thirteen injured.

CRIMES AND CASUALTIES.
AS THEY DO OUT WEST.
OTTINNE, Montenegro, July 7.—
Col. Martinovic, commandant of the
royal body guard of Prince
Nicholas, ruler of Montenegro, and
cousin of the prince, was murdered
in the market place this morning.
The murder was the result of a private
vengeance. The murderer was seized
by the people and lynched on the
spot.

YOUNG DRISCOLL DEAD.
SACRAMENTO, Cal., July 7.—Yester-
day John Driscoll received a let-
ter from Capt. Bedford, of the steam-
er M. J. Hume, confirming the
news of the death of his 19 year old
son John Driscoll, Jr. The young
man sailed some time in April for
a tour on the Arctic ocean, and at
Ounaska May 17th he accompanied
a party on a coal fishing expedition.
The boat capsized and the occupants
were thrown into the water. Several
men were drowned outright but
Driscoll and others clung to the boat
and after being in the water five
hours were rescued and taken on
board the steamer, where young
Driscoll died in the mate's arms.

TEXAS EXCURSION WRECKED.
KANSAS CITY, Ill., July 7.—An ex-
cursion of fourteen cars from Texas
was derailed on the Illinois Central
railroad at Mauteau, Ill., this morn-
ing. Several persons were injured
but nobody killed.

R. O. P., KILLED.
MILWAUKEE, Wis., July 7.—Gen-
eral Carahan, Commander of the
Uniformed Rank Knights of
Pythias, has received a dispatch
from Mauteau, Ill., announcing that
four knights were killed and many
injured in the wreck of the Illinois
Central special train, containing 60
prominent Illinois knights. Among
the wounded is Chancellor Ward,
who will be unable to attend the
Eggsanment in consequence.

GOLD! GOLD!
Wonderful Discovery at Tin-
cup, Colorado.

TWO MEN TAKE OUT \$5000 A DAY

A GOLD BONANZA.
DENVER, Col., July 7.—A Denver
daily News special from Tin-
cup, Col., gives an account of the most
wonderful discovery of gold ever re-
ported in the world. The lowest as-
say from this rock is \$440 per ton of
quartz, and there are specimens
which put through a common bray-
ing mortar return \$20,000 in gold to
the ton. Two men are now taking
out \$5,000 per day. If this streak is
only one yard in depth and extends
to the full length of the claim, 1600
feet, there is \$865,000 of gold in it.
If the dip goes down 1000 feet it is
worth \$1,730,000. The average
value is \$1,000 per ton. The excite-
ment over this discovery is intense
and thousands of miners are rush-
ing into the new camp.

TO USE FORCE.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 7.—A
Washington special says: From late
intelligence received there is reason
to believe that the report stating
the British fleet has been instructed
to use force if necessary to protect
British poachers on sealing islands,
is not without foundation.

A SPLENDID COMPROMISE.
WASHINGTON, D. C., July 7.—In
the conference committee an agree-
ment upon the silver question has
been practically reached. It will
provide for the purchase of \$5,000,000
ounces of silver a month, no bullion
redemption, certificates to be
redeemable in coin and full legal
tender. A meeting of the full con-
ference committee to consider the
agreement has been called and it
will no doubt be ratified.

AMERICANS WIN PRIZES.
BERLIN, Ger., July 7.—In the rifle
contests yesterday prizes were won
by Zimmerman and Klein, of New
York, and Jacob, of San Francisco.

LONDON POLICE STRIKE.
LONDON, Eng., July 7.—Several
policemen who were suspended for
refusing to go on duty here to-day
have been dismissed. There is
much excitement among the entire
city police and they threaten to
strike to-night.

BEGINNING OF THE TROUBLE.
On Sunday night the metropol-
itan police of Bow street division re-
fused to perform duty because one of
their number had been removed to
another division for agitating the
grievances of the force. Subse-
quently the constable was reinstated
in his old division and the policemen
returned to work, with the exception
of forty-nine, who still refused to
perform duty. These latter were
suspended to-day. The others
worked to-night and were hooded by
crowds on the streets.

EMBEZZLER SENTENCED.
BALTIMORE, Md., July 7.—Ex-
State Treasurer Archer to-day plead
guilty to the charge of embezzele-
ment of the funds of the state. He
was sentenced to five years in the
penitentiary.

CRIME AT JEFFERSON.
Robbers Raid a Chinese Sec-
tion House.

THEY SECURE 300 DOLLARS

SPECIAL TO THE EVENING JOURNAL.
JEFFERSON, Or., July 7.—Last
night three men entered the Chi-
nese section house at this place.
One held the Chinamen outside at
the point of a revolver, while two
men searched the house for money.
They secured about three hundred
dollars and then poured coal oil on
the floor and fired the house.
The robbers held the Chinamen
until the fire was under good head-
way and then made their escape.
The Chinamen recognized the men
as three town hoodlums and swore
out warrants. They are now under
arrest. The examination is set for
nine o'clock to-night. They plead not
guilty to the charge but the evidence
is very strong against them.
The men are named French, Car-
ney and Hill and the trial will be
before F. Bagley, Justice of the
Peace. Hon. Geo. Bingham of Sa-
lem, has been sent for to prosecute.

One San Bernardino aply is ex-
pected to send sixty tons of honey
to market this year.
Charles Ellis, a drinking, desper-
ate cowboy at Folsom, N. M., shot
and killed W. H. Riley, aged 18.
Phil, Askies of Tonto Basin, in
Gila county A. T., has killed over
100 lions and a large number of bears.
Newly set rabbits in Sierra valley
peached last winter, but the few
left will soon soak the country.
One man has shipped five tons of
mobs from Dallas, Or., this season,
the prices ranging from 20 to 28
cents.

New postoffices have been es-

Or., Newel S. Washburn, post-
master; Frankfort, Pacific county,
Wash., John J. Biggs, postmaster.

A large crop of honey which bees
have been laying up during the
past two years in the gable of the
Presbyterian church at Pomona was
gathered Thursday of last week.

An effort is being made in San
Jose to compel the prosperous
merchants to keep their goods off
the sidewalk as well as the small
fry. Many of the former have been
arrested, and they are very in-
dignant.

Last Saturday Charles Bell, a
Colusa negro, stabbed his wife, cut-
ting a gash five inches long in her
face, cutting the lower part of her

arm. He was arrested.
