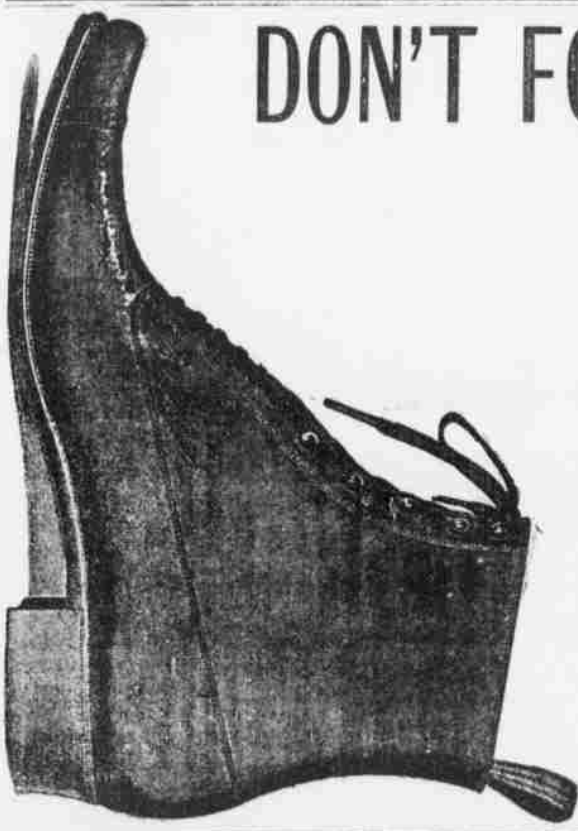

SPURS NOT THE WORM.

Not the apple worm at least. He may turn and destroy the whole apple crop. The JOURNAL has called for facts. It has sought to suppress personal controversy. While we are downing one another's pet theories, the codlin moth may down our apple crop.

Facts are leaking out and accumulating. The discussion stimulates investigation. Orchards are being looked into. That is a gain. Let us gain still more.

One writer in the Statesman says: "In the eastern states they claim that only two broods develop in a season, in Oregon we have at least three, while in California they claim four. At all events they are the greatest pest the fruit men of Oregon have to contend against. Above all things let us not be lulled into a quiet indifference as to their presence, but by using every effort possible try to stay their ravages as much as may be. The Oregon Horticultural society has given out some useful suggestions in this line in the past and will send to anyone interested their circular giving the remedies and the method of applying the same."

Mr. G. W. Thissell "of far-famed Pleasant Valley" has contributed to the Pacific Rural Press some valuable facts on the codlin moth. He has made a study of this "ferocious insect" and says they begin to hatch out April 15th, and keep up that despicable practice every day in the year until Oct. 15th. There are three regular crops and intermediate arrivals on the installment plan. "Three moths can increase to a million in one season under favorable circumstances," says Mr. Thissell. Before laying eggs the moths emerge with new wings from their hiding places, having passed the larval state in some dark place, out of the way of birds, under the sedge bark, in knot holes, or rotten cavities. Mr. Thissell mails a band of barbed around each tree. "This he protects with a cage made from a strip of wire gauze securely tacked above and below. When the little fellow is only 5-8 of an inch long and has no wings he passes through easily. When he has grown to 7-8 of an inch and has nice large wings he escapes not at all." We quote the exact language because we do not exactly comprehend specifications of this bug trap but presume apple growers will. This trap costs 3 to 5 cents a tree and is recommended for its simplicity and efficiency. It is well worth trying.

CARE OF THE BABIES.

Plenty of baths in tepid water, plenty of good water to drink and plenty of simple food and fresh air day and night are what the babies want. Because a great many do not get these simple requirements they die and we engrave on their tiny headstones that hollow mockery which ascribes their death to an act of Providence.

The other day a pamphlet was scattered all over the city. "How to make your babies teethe easily," just as if nature had not provided for their teeth coming through as easily as do the teeth of colts, calves and puppies. If they do not teethe with the health of the mother, or because she has not kept the above simple requirements. The quack nostrums to help babies teethe or do anything else that a baby is called upon to do, and a great deal of the nauseous medication given children by so-called physicians is what speckles our graveyards all over with infant mortality. So-called stimulants for babies are all poisons. People might as well get straight on this subject, call things by the right name and travel to the fact by the fewest words.

The stimulants enumerated in the first paragraph are enough to make any baby fat, rosy, strong, growing and growing—if you don't kill it with too many clothes. And these remarks are just about as true for grown persons.

THE MODESTY OF EDITORS. That proverbial modesty which buries itself in the traditional "we" again shone out on the Fourth of July. Of all the dignitaries and functionaries that were invited to ride in the triumphal procession the editors alone refrained.

Whether it was for fear of not making a good appearance beside the bearded Honorables, Lords and Gentlemen, or because of their youthfulness, the Salem editors modestly declined to take the seats of honor which were allotted them by the thoughtful committee. Whatever the purpose or motive of this exhibition of modesty on the part of the journalists, it should not be ascribed to a lack of confidence in advertising—we all believe in advertising when you have a good thing to advertise.

ENTIRELY AMERICAN, YOU KNOW.

The English syndicate that has bought the Chicago stock yards, and paid about \$30,000,000 for a monopoly of handling the live stock that comes into that market, are in haste to announce that the control of those stock yards will remain in America!

The associated press solemnly informs the public that the "financial re-organization will be upon the American basis, with a large majority of the securities owned by this country and the management will be American, etc."

The mere fact that the British syndicate manipulators put twenty millions into it should not blind anyone. That was all done to allow the stock yards to remain "American," you know, and for the sole purpose of benefitting the American farmer. In short it is one of those "beneficent monopolies" that the Oregonian is so fond of talking about.

When will the American farmer get his eyes open to the fact that the organization of these syndicates to handle and control the products of the country are nothing but skinning disguises, by which he is robbed of millions beyond the legitimate earnings of honest trade?

When will the people awake to the further fact that the metropolitan press, as now organized, is no more than the powerful lever by which these toll-gathering plutocrats squeeze the millions out of the producer?

But it's entirely American, you know. The skinning process goes on just the same, whether it is British or American.

BE MORE THAN A "COLLEGE MAN."

When you get out of college, young man, get clear out. You can get back for half a day or so at any time—at a boat race, a foot ball match, at commencement—when ever there is a reasonable excuse; but in your daily walk and conversation be something more than a college man—be a citizen. Be even an alderman, if you can. Take the world to be yours, as Bacon took all the learning to be his, and don't forever limit your view of it by what was once visible from some point in New Haven or Cambridge. Go out and be a man somewhere. Don't be satisfied to be a mere "graduate" for all time. Of course you owe your alma mater a debt that you are always ready to pay, and a loyalty that should have no breaks in it. When you have grown to the size of Daniel Webster, and your Dartmouth asks you to defend her in court, you are going to be proud when you do it. That is all right. You can't do too much for her, or do it too well. If you accumulate any reputation that is worth having, feel honored indeed, when she offers to share it with you, but don't be too persistently anxious to strut in her plumes to the disparagement, it may be, of worthy men who have no claim to any similar privilege.—Scribner.

A TRICK OF THE TRADE.

One of the greatest tricks an editor can practice to make his paper a success is to fill it with interest. This is a secret! Not ten per cent. interest, but universal interest.

Every profession has its tricks, so why shouldn't the editorial chair be a perch where on to cogitate its subtleties. The editor plants himself early and scratches his capacious cranium for schemes, for they do not lie in the ink pot nor at the root of his pen, and he doesn't dare let slip any one of the side issues of the day from the new baby up street to the latest phase of the tariff. Write, write, he must till the chair gets blistered and the ink dries up, that the big hungry public may devour its fill and the house wife have tidies for her pantry shelves.

There is only one trick that an editor can successfully practice and that is hard work. Every stroke of his pen is for the public and every act he commits is open to comment. It is an honest profession and a hard one. Love your editor and patronize him for he serves you unceasingly six days in the week, studying how he may please you and meet your desires before they are half formulated.

PRESS COMMENTS.

S. F. Chronicle: Now is the time for the republican party to justify the confidence of the people in its financial wisdom and ability. Since the question has been dragged into politics, let the republican party in congress stand square up and assert itself. If free coinage cannot be adopted, pass a bill providing for the monthly purchase of more silver and making the paper representative of that silver full legal tender and redeemable in coin. The most silly and destructive kind of all politics is the shillyshally kind, and that seems to be the republican style in congress at the present time.

The San Francisco Chronicle, (Rep.): If there be any one thing certain in American politics it is that the democratic party is actuated by no broad national principle, but simply by an ambition for partisan success and a greed of political power. It is all things to all men, in the hope of securing votes and thereby gaining office. It has no hesitation whatever in denying to-day what it affirmed as a declaration of principles yesterday, and will be equally ready to-morrow to return to its first love if it thinks the reclamation will be popular.

The republican party is by no means perfect, but it is at least a party which believes in this country and which has some higher aspirations than the securing of the loaves and fishes. It has made mistakes and had to suffer for them, but these mistakes have been made in an honest endeavor to improve the condition of the people of the United States as a whole, and such honest blunders are infinitely better for the public safety than the traitorous and unamerican do-nothingness of the democratic party.

Congressman Hermann in the New York Star: Those pretended free coinage men who voted to refer, did so because they had not the courage to resist the caucus largely dominated by mono-metal influences. This is not a party question, it had no place in a caucus. The representatives of the people should have an opportunity, as in the senate, to consider the measure, untrammelled by party caucus or technicality of rules.

A Chicago weekly journal says in a letter from Washington: "A large majority of the house would go for free silver with a yell if ever they got a chance, but the thirteen democrats will not allow the majority of the house to do what it wishes." This may be an extreme view of the case, but it is certainly true so far as the action of the house on the bill as amended by the senate is concerned. No conference would have been necessary had these thirteen democrats not thrown off their disguise. This makes it certain that the country must look to the republican party and to that party alone for a silver bill at the present session of congress.
