STEAMSHIP EXPLODES.

Forty-Five Dead, Injured and Missing.

TO-DAY'S SUMMARY OF THE DISASTER.

A Large Number Killed Who
Stood on Adjoining
Decks.

STEAMSHIP EXPLOSION.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 12.—The ex-
tent of the loss of life caused by the
explosion of the steamship Tigra yesterday is as
yet an unknown quantity. Just how
many were killed may never be ac-
curately learned. The list of laborers,
who were on the vessel at the time
of the explosion that is in possession
of the officers is admittedly inac-
curate and many have been blown
into the river from adjacent docks.
This morning the best information
obtainable placed number of dead,
injured and missing at forty-five at
least fifteen all known to be dead.
The Tigra was one of the largest freight
boats on lakes, her dimensions being
three hundred and twelve feet
length, thirty-nine feet beam, with
a capacity of 2000 tons. She was
built for the Erie R. Co. at a cost
of a quarter of a million.

VACUATING A SHIP LOAD.

NEW YORK, July 12.—The steam-
ship Welland reached quarantine
this morning and was detained
there on account of a case of small-
pox aboard. It is probable all the
passengers, 552 in number, will be
vaccinated and allowed to land
Monday.

POLK COUNTY COURT.

DALLAS, Or., July 12.—The coun-
ty court in session has transacted
the following business: Perry Gil-
liam, invalid, was put in care of M.
E. Landreth at \$55 per month al-
lowance. The R. J. Grant road was
established. In the matter of over-
assessments the sheriff was credited
with \$887.20. Ira S. Smith, sheriff,
and Wm. Ellis, treasurer, filed their
final accounts, which were accepted,
and their offices turned over to their
successors. In the matter of settle-
ment with Treasurer Turner, he was
credited with the sum of \$2,116.84,
canceled warrants. In the matter of
the J. N. Davidson road, established.
In the matter of bids for the erection
of the Independence bridge, were as
follows: G. W. McElroy, \$1,970; H.
M. Stone, \$1,825; J. E. McCoy, \$1,875;
John Teal, \$1,795; Bayard and Dim-
mick, \$1,894; H. B. St. John, \$1,649.
The court accepted the latter bid.

WAREHOUSE BURNED.

CROWLEY, Or., July 12.—The Rob-
erts grain warehouse, built by the
grange some years ago, was burned
last night. It had a small amount
of grain in it, and was valued at
about \$1000. Insured.

PART OF THE BOOTY FOUND.

JAMESTOWN, N. D., July 12.—On
the night of June 7th last the North-
ern Pacific train was boarded near
New Salem, N. D., by two masked
men who got away with several
pounds of registered mail matter.
One of the robbers was afterwards
captured. The postal authorities
probably know by this time the
amount they secured. The publish-
ed estimate was \$5000 or \$6000, but
as the amount is but a rude guess, it
is believed the robbers got away
with nearer \$50,000. The postal in-
spectors have searched over the
ground where they caught the rob-
ber, and they found torn bits and
ragged pieces of a large amount of
currency, including one bill of one
thousand dollars. There were found
a number of tens and twenties more
or less mutilated. A whole bundle
had been dropped in the robbers'
haste. The amount recovered the
inspector will not disclose, but it
runs into the thousands.

FREE FIGHT IN TEXAS.

EL PASO, Texas, July 12.—A fight
at Ysleta terminated in a peaceful
surrender at daylight, to the sheriff
here. The girl who resisted arrest
cannot be found. Sixteen men
were arrested and brought here to
the county jail. No further trouble
is anticipated.

WASHINGTON NEWS.

Action on the Mare Island Navy Frauds.

Postal Inspectors Discover Valuables Abandoned by Train Robbers.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 12.—As
a result of the investigation into al-
leged frauds in awarding of contracts
for supplies at Mare Island navy
yard, at San Francisco, a letter has
been sent by Paymaster General
Stewart to Commodore Benham,
commandant of the navy yard say-
ing: "Hereafter no bids for naval
supplies by James McCudden, of
Vallejo, Cal., will be considered."

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 12.—
Representative Anderson, of Kan-
sas, in the house offered for refer-
ence a resolution, revoking all leaves
of absence except on account of sick-
ness, after Tuesday next.

PASSES THE HOUSE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 12.—The
house has adopted the report of the
conference committee on the new
silver bill. The vote stood 122
yeas, 90 nays, thus finally passing the bill,
which now awaits the president's
signature.

GRAND LODGE OFFICERS.—ALAS-
toria yesterday the grand lodge A.
O. U. W. elected officers for the en-
suing year as follows: Grand master,
J. J. Daly, of Dallas; grand foreman,
D. Solis Cohen, of Portland; grand
overseer, J. D. Geoghegan, of
Vancouver, Wash.; grand recorder,
Newton Clark, of Hood river; grand
receptor, R. L. Durham, of Portland;
grand trustee, E. J. Plynale, of
Jacksonville. The next session will
be held at Victoria, B. C., the third
Wednesday of July 1891, and after
that the grand lodge will meet only
once in two years. Of the commit-
tees announced by Judge Daly
grand master, John May, of
Protection lodge, this city have a
place on that of "laws and super-
vision," and John M. Chase, also of
Protection, is a member of the com-
mittee on state of the order. By the
way, Protection is the third
strongest lodge in the jurisdiction,
with 221 members in good standing.

The African Explorer, Stanley, Weds To-Day.

DESCRIPTION OF BRIDE AND COSTUME.

A Ship Dispatched to Take Part in Guatemala Troubles.

LONDON, Eng., July 12.—As per
engagement announced, the mar-
riage of Henry M. Stanley and
Dorothy Tennant took place to-day
in Westminster abbey. Stanley
shows the effects of the illness by
which he was attacked yesterday
and was compelled to use a stick to
assist him in walking to and from
the altar. The abbey was crowded
with the friends of the bride and
groom.

CEREMONY—ACCIDENT.

The ceremony was performed by
the Very Rev. George Bradley,
dean of Westminster, Very Rev.
Frederick William Farrar, arch-
bishop of Westminster, and Rev.
William Hoyd Carpenter, bishop of
Ripon. Miss Tennant's dress was a
white corded silk, trimmed with
white satin, and embroidered with
pearls and orange sprays. She wore
a miniature of the queen which had
been presented by her majesty as a
wedding gift. A representative of
the king of Belgium was Stanley's
best man. All the officers of Stan-
ley's last expedition were present.
After the ceremony a platform,
which had been erected for the con-
venience of guests, collapsed and
several persons who were sitting or
standing upon it were bruised.

PENSIONS—WAR OF THE REBELLION

Under the act of June 27, 1890, all soldiers
who served ninety days in the U. S. service
during the war of the rebellion and are now
disabled physically (whether injuries or
disease was incurred during service or
since) are entitled to pensions at from \$8 to
\$12 per month.

Widows of deceased soldiers are entitled
to \$8 per month and \$2 per month for each
child under the age of sixteen years. Father
or mother of deceased soldiers who are now
dependent, are entitled to pension.

Soldiers who are now receiving pensions
at less than \$12 per month should apply at
once under this act.

Applications under this act will not affect
any pending claim.
