THE WHIRL OF DEATH.

Latest News About Sunday's Great Cyclone.

A STEAMER SUNK ON LAKE PEPE.

The Minnesota Horror Likely to Surpass any in History.

A TERRIBLE DISASTER.

THE JOURNAL has the latest news of to-day of the most terrible accident that has ever happened on the inland waters of Mississippi—a cyclone last night destroyed a whole steamboat full of excursionists.

SEVENTY-FOUR BODIES RECOVERED.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 14.—The latest dispatch regarding the great steamer disaster in the cyclone in Lake Pepin, Minn., last night says seventy-four bodies have been recovered, and the work of rescue is being pushed by the soldier boys encamped up the river.

THE DEAD ARRIVE.

RED WING, Minn., July 14.—The dead bodies of those drowned in Lake Pepin last night, to the number of 52 have arrived in this city this morning. The whole town is in mourning, and the bodies are being carried to their respective homes.

DETAILS OF THE DISASTER.

LAKE CITY, Minn., July 14.—What will probably prove to be the most disastrous cyclone that has ever struck this community passed over the city at 5 o'clock Sunday evening, inflicting a loss of life perhaps of 100 or 200 people and damaging property to an extent that cannot at present be estimated. Your correspondent was visiting friends in Lake City, and was sitting in the yard when what appeared to be an ordinary electric storm was noticed coming up from the west. In half an hour the whole heavens were converted into a complete canopy of lightning, which was watched with interest by the braver citizens of the little village and with fear by the timid women and children. A little before dark a terrible wind struck the community.

While trees were heard to be crashing down, and missiles were striking against the houses, the building proved strong enough to weather the blast, and in half an hour the worst of the hurricane had passed. As soon as the trees had been cleared away from the front of the house your correspondent started out and soon learned that a horrible calamity had befallen the place that had not been equalled since the St. Cloud cyclone several years ago.

People began to gather in the streets, and in a few minutes the news was scattered about that an excursion boat with over 200 people on it was capsized in the middle of Lake Pepin. The boat proved to be the steamer Sea Wing, which came down the lake from Diamond Bluff, a small place about seventeen miles north of here, on an excursion to the encampment of the First regiment N. G. S. M., which is being held below this city. The steamer started back on the homeward trip about 3 o'clock and although there were signs of approaching storm it was considered not very serious, and no danger was anticipated. The boat was crowded to its fullest capacity, about 150 women, men and children from Diamond Bluff, being on board, and about fifty persons on a barge which was attached to the side of the steamer. When about opposite Lake City the boat began to feel the effects of the storm but the officers kept on the way.

The storm increased as the boat continued up the lake, and in fifteen minutes was at its height. Nearing Central Point, about two miles above Lake City, the steamer was at the mercy of the waves, which were now washing over the boat, and all was confusion. The boat ran on to a bar and the barge was set adrift and a large number of those on the barge jumped and swam ashore. As the barge also floated again into deep water, those on the barge saw the steamer as it was carried helplessly out into the middle of the lake, and as they were being tossed about on the raging waters, they were horrified a moment later to observe the steamer capsize, and its cargo of 150 persons precipitated into the lake. Those on the barge remained there until they drifted nearer the shore, and were all rescued or swam ashore. There were about fifty in all that were on the barge.

The events that transpired on the steamer after it separated from the barge are probably most clearly related by those who were rescued from it about half an hour ago. It is now twelve o'clock, midnight. As soon as the storm had begun to subside the progress of the boat, Captain Weathering gave instructions to run the boat into the Wisconsin shore, but it was found impossible to do so. In five minutes more the waves began to wash into the boat and filled the lower decks, and while half-stones as large as hen eggs came down on the heads of the poor and helpless creatures who were huddled together on the top, a huge wave struck the craft at the same moment that a terrific blast of wind more horribly forcible than the others came up and carried the boat over, all of the people on board, 150 or more, being thrown into the

water, some being caught underneath by the boat.

The boat turned bottom up and only about twenty-five people were observed to be floating on the surface. These caught hold of the boat and clung upon the bottom, those securing a position assisting others. In ten minutes more the twenty-five or thirty who had obtained momentary safety on the boat could observe no others of the boat's crew or passengers floating on the surface of the continuing high sea of waves. Afterwards, however, as a flash of lightning lighted up the surface of the lake, the sight of an occasional white dress of a drowning woman or child was observable, but it was impossible for those who witnessed the horrible sight to lend any aid. Those remaining began calling for help from the shore as soon as the storm began to abate, and in half an hour lights were observed flying about on the pier at Lake City, opposite which point the upturned steamer had now been driven. Before help could reach them, however, the poor creatures who yet remained to tell the horrors of the night were again submitted to another battle with the elements.

LATEST TOTAL OF DEAD.

MINNEAPOLIS, Minn., July 14.—It now appears certain that at least one hundred and twenty-five lives are lost in the disaster at Lake Pepin and about seventy bodies have already been recovered. It is thought that at least fifty more are fast in the wreck at the bottom of the lake and the list of the killed and injured at St. Paul does not so far differ materially from that already sent out, viz: five killed and a dozen injured.

FURTHER SICKENING PARTICULARS.

RED WING, Minn., July 14.—Tugs this morning pulled out the shattered wreck of the Sea Wing, releasing three bodies, one woman and two young men, making a total of 68 bodies now found. Estimates vary as to the total number dead. There were over two hundred on the steamer and barge when they started to return to Red Wing, a very few remaining behind on account of the storm, although many protested against the proposal to steam up the lake in the face of such a gale as was then blowing. Of the whole number it is known positively that about 50 were saved. More may have escaped but only this many are known at this time to be safe. That would leave about one hundred and fifty victims, but every one hopes the number may not go beyond a hundred and twenty-five. This number is still in the wreck and a great many in the bottom of the lake where the gale first struck the steamer; just how many will not be known for some time yet, possibly several days.

RAIL LARGE AS OLIVES.

ST. PAUL, Minn., July 14.—One of the features of last night's storm was the hail as large as medium sized olives at Red Wing. It is now quite probable that there are 50 or 60 people missing in addition to the list of identified deaths. It is thought that all those are in a track which lies off the landing point near Lake City. Undertaking establishments are crowded with friends of the dead and many cases of prostration have occurred. Business is completely at a standstill.

ESCAPE OF THE TWIN CITIES.

MINNEAPOLIS, July 14.—Minneapolis and St. Paul, almost by a miracle, escaped the severe effects of a cyclone. Late in the afternoon at 4 o'clock a funnel formed a few miles northwest of Minneapolis and dipped to the ground, but only for a moment, near the Twin City stock yards. No serious damage is reported from there. It then rebounded and came to earth again about five miles east and rebounding again struck the vicinity of Coleman's lake seven miles from St. Paul, with an intensity that was terrific. At this time the top of the funnel, as seen from a high building in this city, seemed fully two miles in circumference. At Coleman's lake six people are dead, five missing and nine wounded. At Little Canada, also near St. Paul, there are lives lost, but how many is not yet known. The cyclone cut a swath 200 yards wide, leveling everything before it. The damage to property is great but cannot yet be estimated. Large trees were broken like straws and carried hundreds of yards, and six houses were blown bodily into the lake. All the inmates of one house were killed. Hundreds of head of stock were killed, some very valuable, as some rich stock-farms lay in the path. Later advices indicate that at least twenty people were killed at Coleman's lake and perhaps as many at Little Canada.

The funnel was photographed from the top of a hotel in this city by F. A. Hogle during the time it was wreaking destruction at Coleman's lake, an excellent negative being obtained.

EASTERN NEWS.

President Harrison Signs the Silver Bill.

GENERAL JOHN C. FREMONT DEAD.

Trains Collide, Causing a Wreck, in Indiana—Gladstone Sick—Other News Matters.

GOES TO THE PRESIDENT.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—Speaker Reed and President pro tem Ingalls have both signed the silver bill and it now goes to the president.

MURRAY FOR HARRISON.

WASHINGTON, D. C., July 14.—The president approved the silver bill immediately upon its receipt at the White house.

GEN. FREMONT'S FUNERAL.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 14.—Arrangements for the funeral of General Fremont will be made to-day and it will take place at ten o'clock Wednesday morning from the Episcopal church of St. Ignatius, and it will be as quiet and unostentatious as possible. There will be no military display.

TRAINS COLLIDE.

NEW ALBANY, Ind., July 14.—The Gosport accommodation train of the Louisville, New Albany and Chicago express, collided with a freight train at Smithville, a flag station eight miles south of Bloomington, Ind. Ten lives were lost. There being no telegraph facilities at Smithville, no details have yet been received.

THE GREAT STATESMAN ILL.

LONDON, July 14, 2:20 p. m.—The Right Hon. Wm. E. Gladstone, England's great orator and statesman, is very ill. He is now past 80 and his sudden illness has caused much alarm.

IMMENSE IF TRUE.

DENVER, Colo., July 14.—A telegram from Lander, Wyoming, says two boys, Phil Harsh and Sam Davis, 16 and 17 years respectively, 20 miles south of here struck ore which assays from \$23,000 to \$40,000 per ton in free gold. This is the richest discovery ever made in the territory and miners have started for the new fields by hundreds.

FIRE IN DALLAS, TEXAS.

NEW ORLEANS, La., July 14.—A Texas special from Dallas says a fire which broke out this morning is now spreading rapidly. The Merchants' Exchange and Gould building are almost consumed, and the entire block is likely to be destroyed. These are the finest buildings in Dallas. The loss may be a million dollars.

LATE NEWS CONDENSED.

Floods in Northern Italy are causing immense damage.

Changes have been made in the staff of the Berlin Volks-Tribune, whereby Herr Conrad Smith becomes its editor-in-chief.

The daily output of the petroleum wells in Beloochistan has increased two fold, the quantity now stored at Khatian valley, 35,000 gallons.

Engadine valley, in Switzerland, is covered with snow to the depth of twelve inches, necessitating the use of sledges. The temperature is two degrees below freezing point.

Mrs. Paron Stevens' jewels were found in her house, at Newport, R. I., Sunday. They had evidently been taken by her servant who became frightened and restored them.

Wint Napier, a young farmer about 26 years of age, of Colusa, Cal., unmarried, was drowned at Grimes about twelve miles from there. While swimming he took a cramp. The body has not yet been recovered.

PENSIONS--WAR OF THE REBELLION

Under the act of June 27, 1880, all soldiers who served ninety days in the U. S. service during the war of the rebellion and are now disabled physically (whether injuries or disease was incurred during service or since) are entitled to pensions at from \$6 to \$12 per month.

Widows of deceased soldiers are entitled to \$8 per month and \$2 per month for each child under the age of sixteen years. Father or mother of deceased soldiers who are now dependent, are entitled to pension.

Soldiers who are now receiving pensions at less than \$12 per month should apply at once under this act.

Applications under this act will not affect any pending claim.
