WASHINGTON.

CONGRESSIONAL PROCEEDINGS.

WASHINGTON, July 19.—In the
house, McCrea, of Arkansas, in-
troduced a joint resolution directing
the secretary of the interior to sus-
pend the issue of patents for lands to
the Union Pacific until adjustment
of the debt due the United States
from said company, and authorizing
the attorney general to institute such
legal proceeding as may be in his
opinion necessary to subject the
land granted to and held by said
company to the payment of the debt.
Resolution referred to the com-
mittee on public lands. The house
resumed consideration of the original
package law.

NATIONAL SOLDIERS' HOME MAN- AGERS.

WASHINGTON, D. C.—The senate
special amendment to the Sundry
Civil appropriation bill was agreed
to this afternoon, which appoints as
managers of the National Soldiers'
Home, Edmund N. Morrill, of Ken-
tucky; Alfred C. Pearson, of Penn-
sylvania; Lewis B. Gunkel, of Ohio;
Wm. S. Franklin, of Connecticut;
Thos. W. Hyde, of Maine;
John C. Black, of Illinois, and Sam-
uel S. Yoder, of Ohio.

STATE.

AN EXCELLENT WHEAT YIELD.

PORTLAND, Oregon, July 19.—
The report of the Oregon Weather
Bureau says in reference to the
wheat crop: Late wheat filling well,
very large and plump; early wheat
being harvested; yield excellent.

CRIMINAL.

AN INDIAN DESPERADO KILLED.

WILCOX, Ariz., July 19.—The
news is received that Lieut. Mackay
and his scouts in battle yesterday
afternoon with two members of the
Kid gang in the Apache mountains,
killed Wah Lan Tah, the others es-
caping into the mountains. Wah
Lan Tah's head was sent to the near-
est post for identification. He is one
of the Indians who killed Sheriff
Reynolds last fall and it is supposed
that he with the Kid gang, murdered
Dr. Hardie, of Los Angeles, a short
time ago.

SEIZURE OF ILLEGALLY SHIPPED NAPHTHA.

CHICAGO, Ill., July 19.—The U. S.
authorities this afternoon seized
55 barrels of naphtha belonging to
the Genesee Oil Co. of Buffalo, ship-
ped here in the Tigra. The seizure
was made because of violation of the
law regarding the shipping of fluid
by steamer. The statute under
which the seizure was made provides
for the sale of the oil, the sum de-
rived therefrom to be appropriated by
Uncle Sam. The section also pro-
vides for criminal prosecution.

FIRE.

AN ARMY OF THEM AT WORK.

NEW YORK, N. Y., July 19.—The
Western Union Telegraph company
has sufficiently recovered from yester-
day's fire to handle all business.
Temporary stations have been estab-
lished throughout the city. The
burned building presents the appear-
ance of a beehive. A small army of
men are engaged in repairing the
damage.

Rock Island in this city, struck to-
day over the discharge of one of
their number. All business on the
line is at a stand still.

BUFFALO, N. Y., July 19.—Mrs.
F. F. Fargo died this morning after

sum of \$1200 has been raised and the
ground secured. A church costing

A farmer drove to the barber shop
in Stephens' addition Saturday

had been inside but a few minutes
when a stranger jumped into the
wagon the farmer had just left in
the street and drove off at a rapid
rate. He was pursued by the owner
of the outfit and by others, and in
making a turn the wagon was upset.
The driver then ran, abandoning
horse and wagon, and made his es-
cape. If the wagon had not upset
he might have got away with the horse.

Hotel waiters are out on a strike
in St. Louis. Friday, 175 more men
were added to the strikers' league.

R. Y. Norton shot and killed
Willie and John Bird at Guyson,
Ga., Friday. The shooting grew out
of a mill trade.

Judge Ryan, of Paris, Texas, sen-
tenced nine men to death on July
18th.

The ship M. H. Grace left San
Francisco a few days ago with a
cargo of 200,000 gallons of California
wine, for New York.

The Portland officer Joe Day, re-
turned Friday, from New York,
with Boyle, the default contractor.

The remaining 54 Chinamen from
Mexico are making another hard
fight at San Francisco, to gain ad-
mission into the United States.

The steamship China is expected
to arrive in San Francisco in a few
days, from Hong Kong, with 233
Chinese on board.

Friday night in East Portland,
M. A. Broadbent was badly stabbed
by James Hurlbert. It seems that
Broadbent was mistaken for W. H.
Emons with whom he was board-
ing.

The trouble grew out of an old
feud between Emons and a certain
Mrs. Jackson. Hurlbert is in jail
under bail of \$1,500 to await the ac-
tion of the grand jury.

United States Marshal Brown
sold on Friday the sloop Annie,
seized some time ago by Inspector
Cocentz. This is the vessel that
was tied up at Sitka for carrying
whiskey to the Alaskan Indians, in
which illicit business the owner,
Andrew Holt accumulated the fair
fortune of \$80,000, and lost his life
in the attempt to defend his vessel
from seizure.

Word comes from Canada that
England has formally protested
against the seizure of Canadian seal-
ers in Behring sea. It is believed in
official circles that some sort of un-
derstanding has been arrived at be-
tween Secretary Blaine and the British
authorities.

The board of directors of the Pu-
get Sound University have decided
to negotiate an additional loan of
\$13,000 to complete the building.

Cutlery house inspectors have
seized 500 cigars, which were con-
cealed in an oil can, and shipped
from Panama to San Francisco on
the steamer Newbern.

BRINGING MARRIAGE UP TO DATE.

To bring the institution of mar-
riages up to date is among the next
great tasks of progressive civiliza-
tion. So much has it lagged behind
that this proposal sounds like a pro-
posal to break up society altogether.
So much the worse for society. Poli-
tically we have had to learn the
difficult lesson of liberty; to recog-
nize the enormous importance to the
state of the spontaneity of each
individual, and the uselessness of
the most perfect state machin-
ery, without citizens who are
free to make blunders if they
will, and to serve their
country with the intelligence and
the public spirit which are the out-
come of freedom. Politically, we
have learned our lesson well; so well
that we are disposed to think that
the principle of liberty forbids us to
reconsider or alter our industrial sys-
tem, because the change would in-
terfere with certain rights enjoyed
by individuals under the present or-
der, and therefore strictly condition-
al upon it—an idea showing a
strange confusion of thought. But
we have not learned to apply
this wholesome and
bracing principle to social and
still less to family life. As soon as
we do apply it boldly, unswerv-
ingly, the present marriage system
stands arraigned, offending, as it
does, against every principle of lib-
erty and equality, against the rights
and duties of the individual, against
the strength and vitality of the
state, which lives or languishes as
its individuals grow or decline in
the qualities of independence, of
original power and vigor of charac-
ter.—Mons. Caird in North Ameri-
can Review for July.

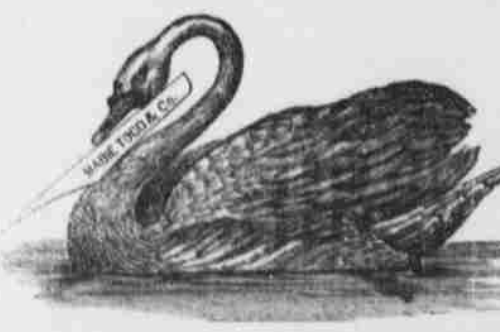
