FIRES.

FIRE IN NEW YORK. ROCHESTER, N. Y., July 30.—A Western Union operator here states that the village of Seneca Falls at 8:35 a. m. was on fire and that half of the town is in ruins including the Western Union office.

LOSS GREATER THAN SUPPOSED. AUBURN, N. Y., July 30.—A report received here from Seneca Falls places the loss at a million dollars. Fifteen acres were burned over, covered principally by three-story brick buildings.

A COSTLY FIRE TRAP. SENECA FALLS, July 30.—A new building, against the erection of which three or more years ago earnest protest was made fulfilled its mission as a fire trap this morning, and it is feared it also proved a death trap. A few minutes after three a. m., the building was discovered on fire. In a few minutes the entire structure was in flames, approachable from but one direction and the atmosphere quickly became so hot that the firemen could not endure it.

SERIOUS INCENDIARISM IN AN OHIO VILLAGE. TOLEDO, Ohio, July 30.—The most extraordinary condition of affairs prevails at Bairdstown, an oil village twenty miles south of this city.

FOREIGN. AMNESTY GRANTED. PARIS, July 30.—Dispatches from Buenos Ayres, dated last evening, announce that the government has granted a general amnesty to all persons who took part in the insurrection.

VICTIMS OF A MINE HORROR. PARIS, France, July 30.—Pellissier pit, at Slettenon, which exploded from fire damp yesterday, has been cleared and fifty-nine persons rescued. The bodies of victims to the number ninety-eight have been recovered.

FLOOD AT VIENNA. VIENNA, Austria, July 30.—The Salvator river has overflowed its banks and inundating the surrounding country by which many persons along the line of the river were drowned and many houses have been destroyed.

POLITICAL. PRESIDENTIAL NOMINATIONS. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—The president to-day sent the following nominations to the senate: Thaddeus Sharretts, of Maryland, general appraiser of merchandise; Louis Desmarais, of Louisiana, coiner of U. S. mint at New Orleans.

TENNESSEE REPUBLICANS. NASHVILLE, Tenn., July 30.—The republican state convention was called to order at 12 m. A large attendance of delegates present with a few number of colored men on hand than usual.

MISCELLANY. AROUND THE WORLD. TACOMA, Wash., July 30.—George Francis Train has made arrangements with the Tacoma Ledger to make an attempt to beat the record for a trip around the world. He will leave Tacoma August 7th on the steamship China and calculates to make the circuit of the globe in 57 days.

THE WORLD'S FAIR BILL. SPRINGFIELD, Ill., July 30.—The World's Columbian exhibition passed the senate this morning.

LATE SUIT FOR DAMAGES. SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., July 30.—Two suits were filed to-day in the superior court against the Occidental and Oriental Steamship company to recover in aggregate a sum of \$95,275 as the result of a collision which occurred in this harbor on August 2nd 1888, between the steamers City of Chester and Occa-

WASHINGTON. EXTENSION OF FREE DELIVERY SYSTEM. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—Senator Mitchell, from the committee on postoffices and post roads, reported favorably with amendments the bill to extend the free delivery system. The committee changed the figures to 5,000 population and \$7,000 postoffice receipts.

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PLEASE DO SO FOR SALEM. WASHINGTON, D. C., July 30.—The population of Salt Lake City is increased in the census office 45,025.

STATE. AN UNLICENSED ENGINEER ARRESTED. PORTLAND, Or., July 30.—The steamer Alliance, plying between this city and Puget sound points, was arrested this morning by federal authorities. It is alleged that the chief engineer was unlicensed.

PARAGRAPHS. The people's independent party in Nebraska met in state convention yesterday. About 900 delegates from all over the state were present. The platform adopted demands a restoring of silver to its old time place in currency as free and unlimited coinage and on an equality with gold.

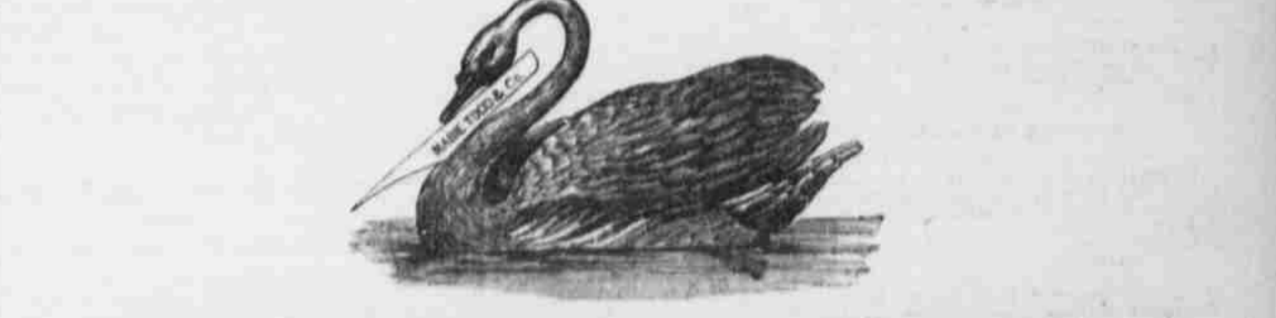
