CRIMINAL.

ASSISTING A FORGER TO ESCAPE.
LOS ANGELES, Cal., Aug. 2.—The
preliminary examination of City
Justice Walter C. Lockwood, on a
charge of harboring from justice a
man wanted on a charge of forgery,
was concluded yesterday and Justice
Savage took the case under advisement.

ARMY OFFICERS ON TRIAL.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 2.—A
Washington special says of the
army officers recently court mar-
tialled at Tucson, Arizona: "It is un-
derstood that Capt. Millmore has
been found guilty of charging the
government \$150 for a typewriter he
never bought and is dismissed from
the army, and that Major Kimball,
charged with neglect of duty, was
sentenced to a reprimand. Majors
Wham and Tower were acquitted."

SYSTEMATIC SWINDLING BY EMPLOYEES.

NEW YORK, Aug. 2.—Clement J.
C. Haller, treasurer, and William C.
Chandler, Jr., manager of the Erie
Transfer Co., this city, have been ar-
rested on a charge of systematically
defrauding the company. It is es-
timated they have succeeded in
swindling the corporation out of not
less than ten thousand dollars.

MISCELLANY.

GREAT FLOODS IN ARIZONA.
TUCSON, Ariz., Aug. 2.—Rain fell
in this section during the last three
days to an unprecedented amount.
All the streams are flooded and there
has been much destruction to prop-
erty in the valley. The Santa Cruz
river is a mile and a half wide oppo-
site Tucson. Many thousand dol-
lars' worth of garden truck is lost
and there have been several narrow
escapes from drowning. The river
is still rising.

NOW IT IS BLEEDING KANSAS.
STREELY.

ABILENE, Kas., Aug. 2.—The
Farmers' Alliance of the eighth judi-
cial district has put in circulation
the following petition: To the Hon.
M. B. Nicholson, judge eighth judi-
cial district of Kansas. In view of
disastrous failures of crops and gen-
eral stringency in money matters, we,
the undersigned petitioners, hereby
most earnestly request that proceed-
ings in the foreclosure of all real
estate mortgages now pending, or
that may commence within one
year from date, be delayed.

SACRIFICE OF THE AUSTRALIAN

TRADE.
SAN FRANCISCO, Cal., Aug. 2.—
Adolph Spreckles, treasurer of the
Ocean Steamship Co., when inter-
viewed concerning the prospects for
a continuation of the Australian
mail service, said: "I cannot say
the outlook is encouraging. The line
cannot be run without a sub-
sidy and if the colonies with-
draw and congress does not
pass the Farquhar bill and give
American ships a chance against
foreign ships, direct mail communi-
cation will be cut off between this
country and Australia, and Aus-
tralian trade will be ruined."

POLITICAL.

HE'S PROBABLY A BRITISHER WITH

CITIZEN'S PAPERS.
VICTORIA, B. C., Aug. 2.—Capt.
Winants, of the American steamer
Michigan, who is not interested fi-
nancially in the sealing industry, is
taking a strong stand in favor of the
British contention, in his utterances
to the local and American papers.
He does not see the advisability of
protecting the seals, which are only
a luxury at best, if such protection
costs the United States a violation of
international law. He affirms that
many citizens of the United States
are interested in schooners fitting
out at Victoria for sealing, prefer-
ring to change flags and secure the
coming protection of England
against their own country.

FOREIGN.

THE CZAR'S LIFE IN DANGER.
PARIS, France, Aug. 2.—It is re-
ported that a fresh nihilist plot
against the czar has been discovered
at St. Petersburg. Prof. Gorlewski,
of the University of St. Petersburg,
and a number of students at that
institution have been arrested.

RISKED AND MADE UP AGAIN.
LONDON, Eng., Aug. 2.—Lord
Dunlop, who was unsuccessful in his
efforts to secure a divorce from his
wife, had an interview with Lady
Dunlop since the trial and a reconcili-
ation has been effected. Lady
Dunlop will make a tour of the
provinces, appearing in character of
views.

STORE, ELEVATOR AND MILL
BURNED.
LA CROSSE, Wis., Aug. 2.—A. A.
Freeman & Co.'s large store, eleva-
tor and mill burned at noon to-day.
The loss is \$300,000; insurance
\$100,000.

PARAGRAPHS.

A company has been formed in
Rio Janeiro for the purpose of as-
suring the stability of the coffee market
and to facilitate the business in the
commodity.

A milkman was instantly killed
by a train while driving across the
track in Oakland, Cal., Thursday.

A revolution is about to take place
in the newspaper business in Seattle.
What the outcome will be is not
known.

A guest at a Sacramento hotel was
relieved of \$125 by a night clerk who
disappeared taking with him in ad-
dition to the \$125, \$10 of the hotel
money.

A report comes from Dallas that
W. L. Dalton, who has been visit-
ing in the east, has returned bring-
ing thirteen families with him, who
will settle in Polk county. Mr. Dal-
ton says that many families will
come to Oregon this fall from Iowa,
Missouri and Kansas. Polk county
is endeavoring to start an immi-
gration board with a branch office
in Portland.

A sailor's strike involving every
craft on the lakes is threatened at
Chicago.

The Delaware peach crop which
runs from 1,000,000 to 5,000,000 bas-
kets will this year hardly be large
enough to market.

Fire destroyed Dutch Corner's hotel
about half a mile northwest of
Newman, California; loss, \$5000 in-
sured for \$1500. The property be-
longed to Mrs. Caroline Gesin.

J. B. Doane, a brakeman on the
Northern Pacific was probably
fatally stabbed by a tramp near
Spokane Falls yesterday. Doane
refused to allow him to steal a ride
on the train when the tramp drew
a long knife and stabbed Doane just
above the heart.

The hot weather in New York is
unbearable. Eleven persons are re-
ported killed and twenty-eight
others prostrated.

Joseph Silva's house and barn,
four miles west of Grass Valley, Cal.,
burned Wednesday night. A son
of Silva, who is an idiot, set fire to
the barn to see it burn, and the
flames caught the house.

At Los Angeles, Cal., William
Donahoe, a painter, fell from the
top of a building forty feet to the
ground, breaking both legs and
crushing both wrists. His injuries
are not regarded as fatal.

Wm. Cliver, treasurer of the
Barren, Minn., school district, has
been arrested for embezzling \$3500 of
the school funds and obtaining
\$9000 from banks and private in-
dividuals in Duluth under false pre-
tenses.
